Icy blast chills South Plains

The first Arctic blast of the season roared down Tuesday night leaving much of the region swathed in a sheet of ice. And Plains was no exception as icy streets make driving, and even walking, hazardous.

According to Olan Heath there were no accidents reported to him but several motorists said that there were numerous cars and trucks in the ditches along the highway leading into Plains.

Mrs. Ty Field and Kenneth McGinty both received cuts that required stitches after receiving

a fall on the icy ground. Mrs. Field remained over-night in the Denver City hospital. Kenneth was released from the local clinic after stitches were taken in his head due to the results of a fall at school.

Thursday morning found many Plains residents without electricity as ice-coated lines fell during the night. It was reported that lines were down between Plains and Lovington and several poles were snapped along the Plains-Denver City highway.

It was also reported that a school bus from Plains turned

over Thursday morning, but there was no report of injuries. The accident was said to have taken place on the Allred road. The only damage to the bus was scratches.

The cold blast hit Plains late Tuesday night causing streets and tree to become ice-coated. Wednesday saw little relief in the weather as the temperature stayed around the freezing mark all day.

Since November 30, Plains has had five nights of below freezing temperature with the lowest recorded on December 4.

1961 cotton allotments released for the county

The 1961 cotton allotment has been released according to W. M. Overton, office manager of the local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office.

Yoakum County received an increase of 6,178.7 acres over the 1960 allotment. The total allotment was issued to 370 old cotton farms in the county with 19.9 acres set aside for corrections and adjustments.

No allotment was set from the state for adjustments or trends and no acreage was set aside on the state level for new growers. The 1960 upland cotton acre-

age allotment is based on the history acreage in the county for the years 1955 through 1959. The deadline for final filing for new grower cotton applications is February 15, 1961.

ELECTION

This coming Tuesday, December 13, local cotton farmers will again vote in a referendum on marketing quotas for the 1961 crop of upland cotton. Those eligible to vote are those who have engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1960.

Cotton farmers will be able to vote at the old courthouse in Plains, Bronco Gin, Silgo Community Building, Hilburn Spears Gin, Wayside Gin, and C.G.&S. Gin. All eligible farmers are urged to vote for or against the referendum.

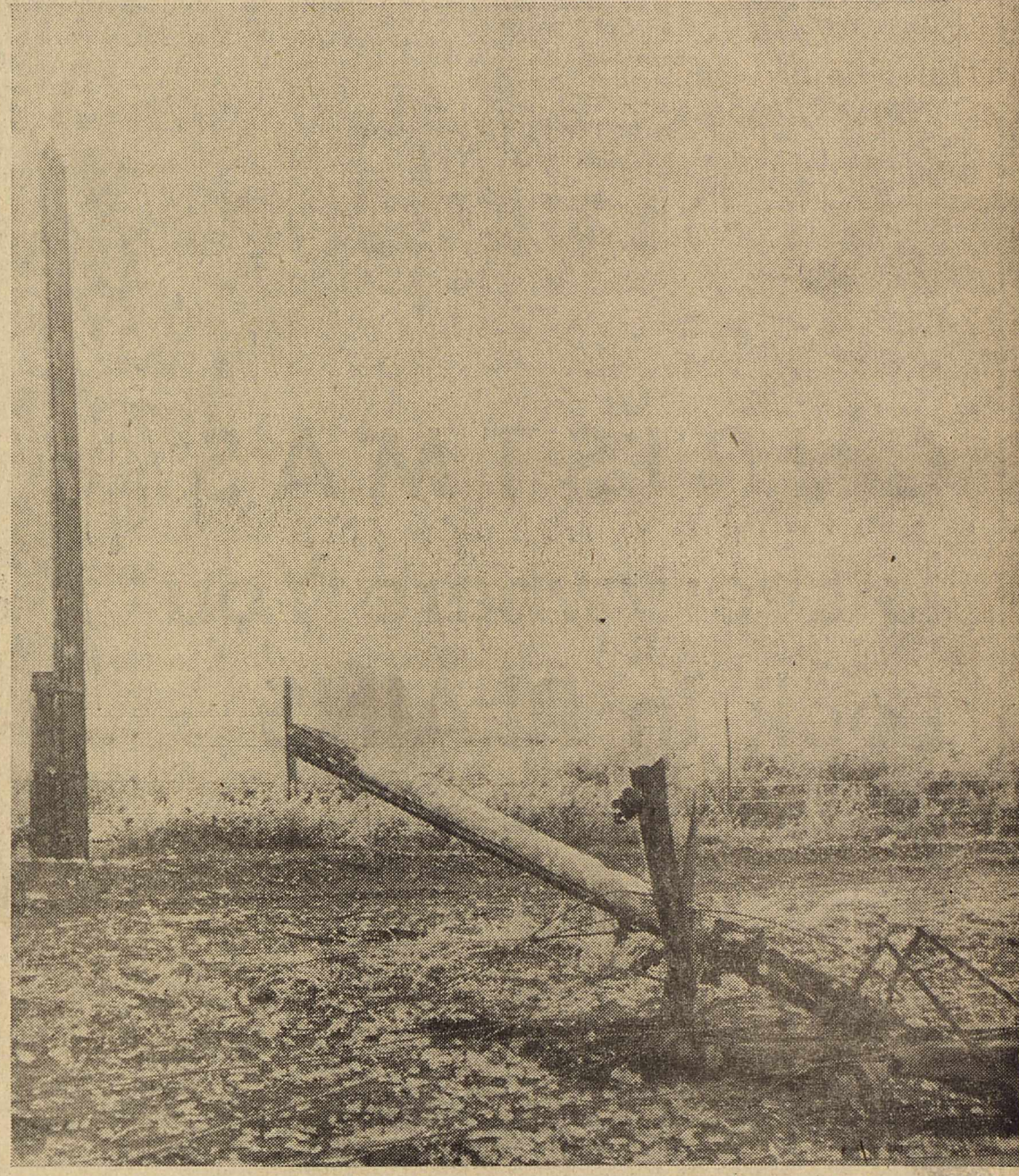

Humble re-enters producer

Humble Oil & Refining company has re-entered No. 54 H. O. Wooten A/C-5, already dually completed as a producer in the Wasson 66 and Wasson 72 pools of Yoakum County, and triply completed it as the fourth well in Wasson (Glorieta) pool.

It is rated for a daily potential of 33.59 barrels of 28.7-5.676 feet, which had been treated with 3,000 gallons of acid. Gas-oil ratio was 158-1.

Total depth is 7,550 feet, with 5 1/2-inch casing set at that point. It is 1,600 feet northeast of

the Glorieta discovery, 1/2-mile west of Denver City and 660 feet from south and 1,980 feet from east lines of section 893, block D, J. H. Gibson survey.

Pan American Petroleum Company of Midland filed application to drill No. 1-B Mollie S. Courtney, 10 miles east of Plains in the Ownby (Upper Clear Fork) pool of Yoakum County.

The project is 660 feet from south and west lines of section 4, block D, J. H. Gibson survey. Headwaters Oil Company of Dallas will drill two 5,500-foot

projects in the Brahaney (San Andres) field, seven miles southwest of Plains.

No. 3 Davidson Unit is 2,310 feet from south and 330 feet from west lines of section 515, block D, J. H. Gibson survey.

No. 4 Davidson Unit is 990 feet from south and 330 feet from west lines of section 515, block D, J. H. Gibson survey.

Lario Oil & Gas Company of Midland scheduled operations on two 5,300-foot ventures in the Wasson (San Andres) field, seven miles north of Denver City.

No. 3 Tudor is 660 feet from south and 1,460 feet from west lines of section block D, J. H. Gibson survey.

No. 4 Tudor is 1,650 feet from south and 990 feet from west lines of section block D, J. H. Gibson survey.

Paul Musselwhite of Snyder staked No. 3 Lackey, a project in the West Ownby (San Andres) field of Yoakum County.

It spots six miles east of Plains and 1,980 feet from south and 660 feet from east lines of section 435, block D, J. H. Gibson survey.

Skely Oil Company completed No. 6 W. W. Hancock as a

Final census says Plains has 1,195

The advance report on the final population counts was released this week by the Bureau of Census. The count shows Plains with a population figure of 1,195 with the Plains division having a total count of 2,558. The total county population is 8,032 according to the report.

The township of Denver City had a total population of 4,302 with the Denver City division having 5,494.

The official population count of the state as of April 1, 1960 was 9,579,677 which shows an increase of 1,868,483 or 24.2 percent increase.

In neighboring towns, Brownfield shows a population of 10,286; Morton had 2,731; Seagraves had 2,307; Tahoka had 3,012; and Sundown had 1,186.

Dyer speaks at Ladies' Night Banquet

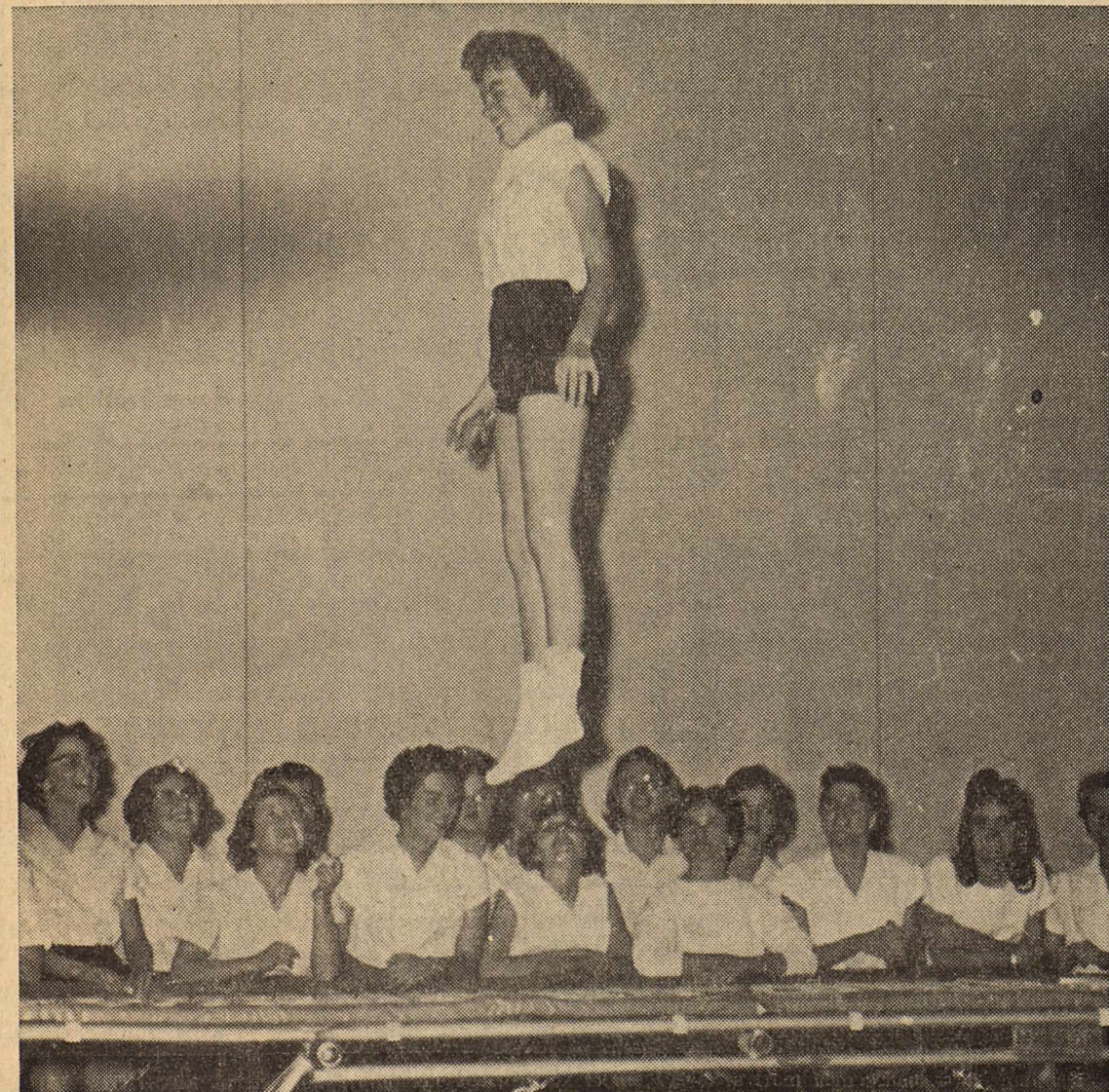
Plains Lions Club held their annual Ladies' Night Banquet Thursday evening, December 1, in the school cafeteria, with more than eighty-five in attendance.

AUSTIN, Tex.—By the time Austin sweeps up the last of the holiday tinsel, it will be time to prepare for another round of festivities.

Committees already are meeting to plan details of the inaugural events that will attract thousands of visitors to the Texas capital, come January 17.

Gov. Price Daniel will take the oath of office for his third term; Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey, for his sixth term. If weather permits an inaugural parade these two officials will ride at the head of it up to Congress Avenue, to the Capitol grounds where the swearing-in ceremony will be held.

A reception and a half-dozen balls will fill out the day. For his past two inaugurations, Governor Daniel has held a prayer breakfast beforehand for state officials.

NO SPECIAL SESSION — Haggling and suspense over who will be Speaker of the House for the 57th Legislature will continue until January 10.

That is the first day of the regular session when House members, by secret ballot, will elect the speaker from their membership.

Rep. James Cotten of Weatherford asked Governor Daniel to call lawmakers together this month. New members could be sworn in and a speaker elected in a one-day session, he said.

But Governor Daniel said that any legislature meeting this year would be the 56th Legislature, which could not elect a speaker for the 57th Legislature.

Reps. Wade Spilman of McAllen and James Turman of Goben are candidates for speaker. Both, reportedly, are "ahead."

Spilman, in a recent letter to House members, announced addition of two more pledges to him. He said, "A majority of the members have committed their vote to me for speaker." Jim Turman says the same thing. So, the big question still is: How will the members vote?

SAFETY DRIVE LAUNCHED—This year's campaign for careful driving during the holidays will be launched on "Safety Sunday," December 11.

Many organizations, including the Texas Press Association, will help in the annual drive to cut the Christmas-through-New Year's accident toll.

"Safety Sunday," said the governor in his proclamation of the special day, is "to awaken the conscience of every driver to the understanding that negligence at the wheel is a transgression of God's own command, 'Thou shalt not kill.'"

In past years, the governor noted, the all-out campaigns have resulted in the death toll's falling below Department of Public Safety predictions.

Last year the DPS predicted 111 deaths. When the holiday season ended only 91 had died, for a total of 20 lives saved.

PROGRAM FOR AGED—Enactment of medical care for the aged and an increase in state pensions are among recommendations of a joint legislative committee to study problems of the aging.

Committee announced it would work for a constitutional amendment to raise by \$10,000,000 a year the ceiling on old age assistance. It also urged that the next Legislature pass laws to put into effect a program to provide state help for the medical expenses of needy oldsters.

Transfer of senile, but not mentally ill, patients from the mental hospitals to nursing home care was recommended.

Sen. Crawford Martin of Hillsboro, is chairman of the committee, and Rep. Howard Green of Fort Worth, is vice-chairman.

VET BOND SALE CANCELLED—Veterans Land Board has set aside plans to hold a bond sale this month because of criticism from Land Commissioner-Elect Jerry Sadler.

Board announced its decision "with regret," declaring that the veterans waiting to buy land would be the losers.

No bonds have been sold since June, 1958, because the state ceiling on interest was too low to attract buyers. Board said it

felt the people were expressing their desire to get the program in full operation again when they approved a constitutional amendment in November to raise the interest ceiling.

Sadler had protested the sale. He said he felt the bonds could be sold at a more favorable rate next year after a change in the national administration.

DAM SITE RECOMMENDED—Millicap, in Brazos County, has been recommended to the State Board of Water Engineers as the site for a proposed reservoir on the Lower Navasota River.

An engineering firm made the recommendation after a study contracted by the Brazos River Authority, the towns of Bryan, College Station and Navasota and several industrial firms.

Statistics for the proposed water project are staggering. It would yield in the neighborhood of 200,000,000 gallons of water a day, cost an estimated \$44,000,000. It would not be completed until about 1970 and paid for in 2020.

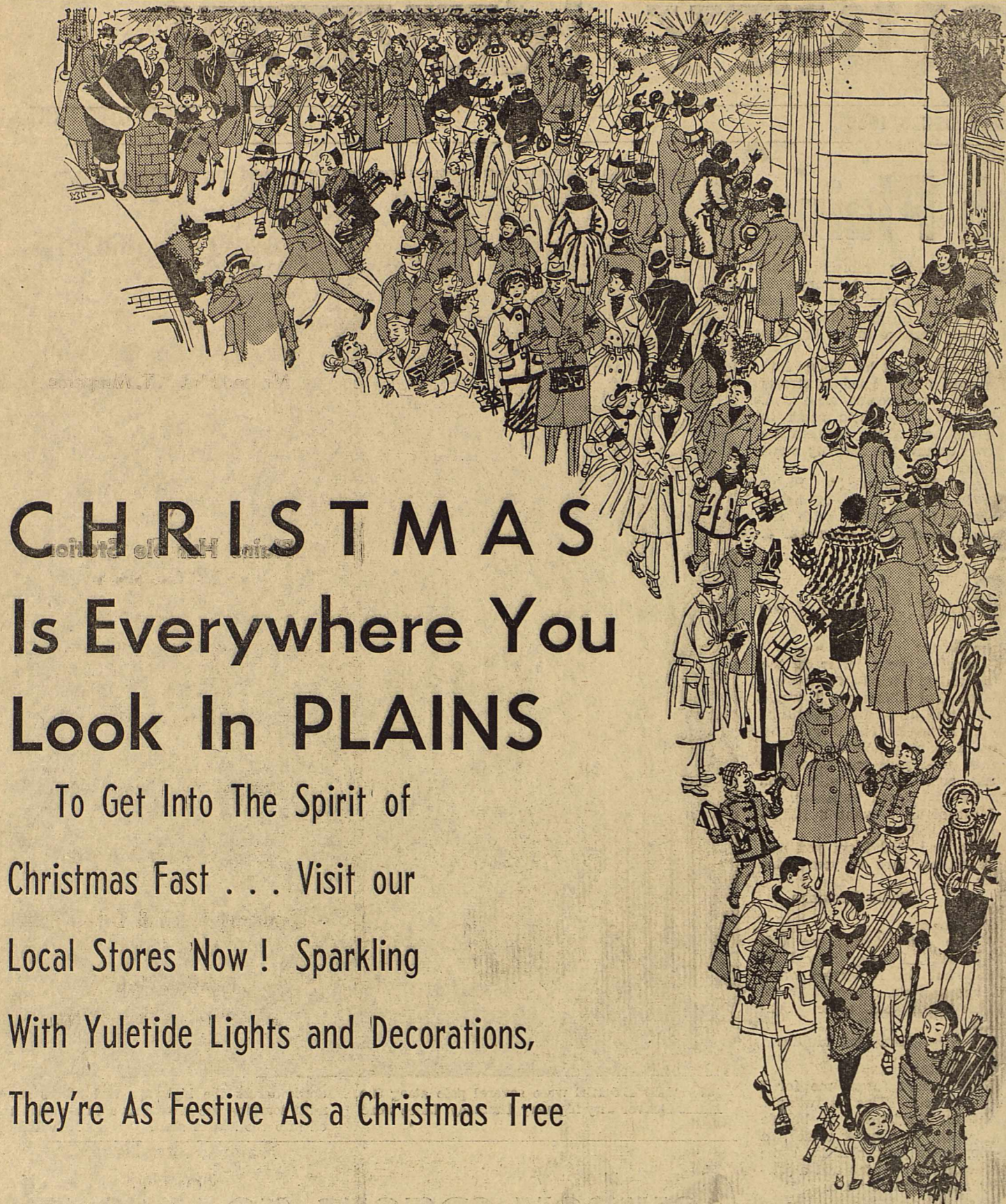

The next meeting has been scheduled for January 9 in Denver City.

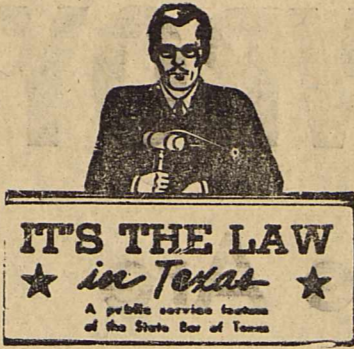
Locals win at D. C. kart races

WRITTEN FARM LEASE ADVISABLE

At this time of year, many landlords and tenants are thinking about farm rental arrangements for 1960. While some operate from year to year on the basis of verbal agreements regulated largely by local custom, written leases are better and may save disagreement and hard feelings between the parties.

Farming is a business and should be conducted in a business like manner for best success. Rental contracts involve a full year's work by the tenant and possibly thousands of dollars for both parties. A few dollars spent on a properly drawn lease is good business economy.

A farm lease is not a simple paper. Printed lease forms often turn out to be traps if not understood, or if not properly executed. A farmer-tenant contract is intricate and of such importance to both parties concerned that amateur draftsmanship is risky.

Fixing of cash rent or designating the length of term are relatively simple. Yet, even in these matters, ambiguity or incompleteness can cause bitter disputes and expensive lawsuits.

A loosely drawn property description may have consequences entirely unintended by either landlord or tenant. Where rent is to be based on acreage, an accurate description is doubly important.

In addition, there are legal rules to substitute for some omissions in written leases. For example, a holdover by the tenant may automatically renew the contract if the lease is silent on the subject. It is as important to know the results of omissions as to know the courts' interpretation of the language used.

There are many matters which should be covered by a properly drawn lease. For instance, if a tenant is to farm on a share basis, care should be taken to define what expenses are to be paid by the parties as well as what shares are to be taken out. A lease should cover such things as who is to make repairs, what land is to be cropped, whether the tenant can cut timber, whether loss of a building by fire or other cause frees the tenant, or whether the landlord must accept a sub-tenant.

One great cause of difficulty with leases is blind faith on the part of the persons involved that all differences of opinion can be worked out. Poor memories as to verbal agreements can cause disputes between persons even though they are both honest and generous.

Many of the possibilities that should be covered by a properly drawn lease will not occur to inexperienced persons. The renting of land deserves a written contract, and it is a contract too important to be entrusted to anyone other than an expert.

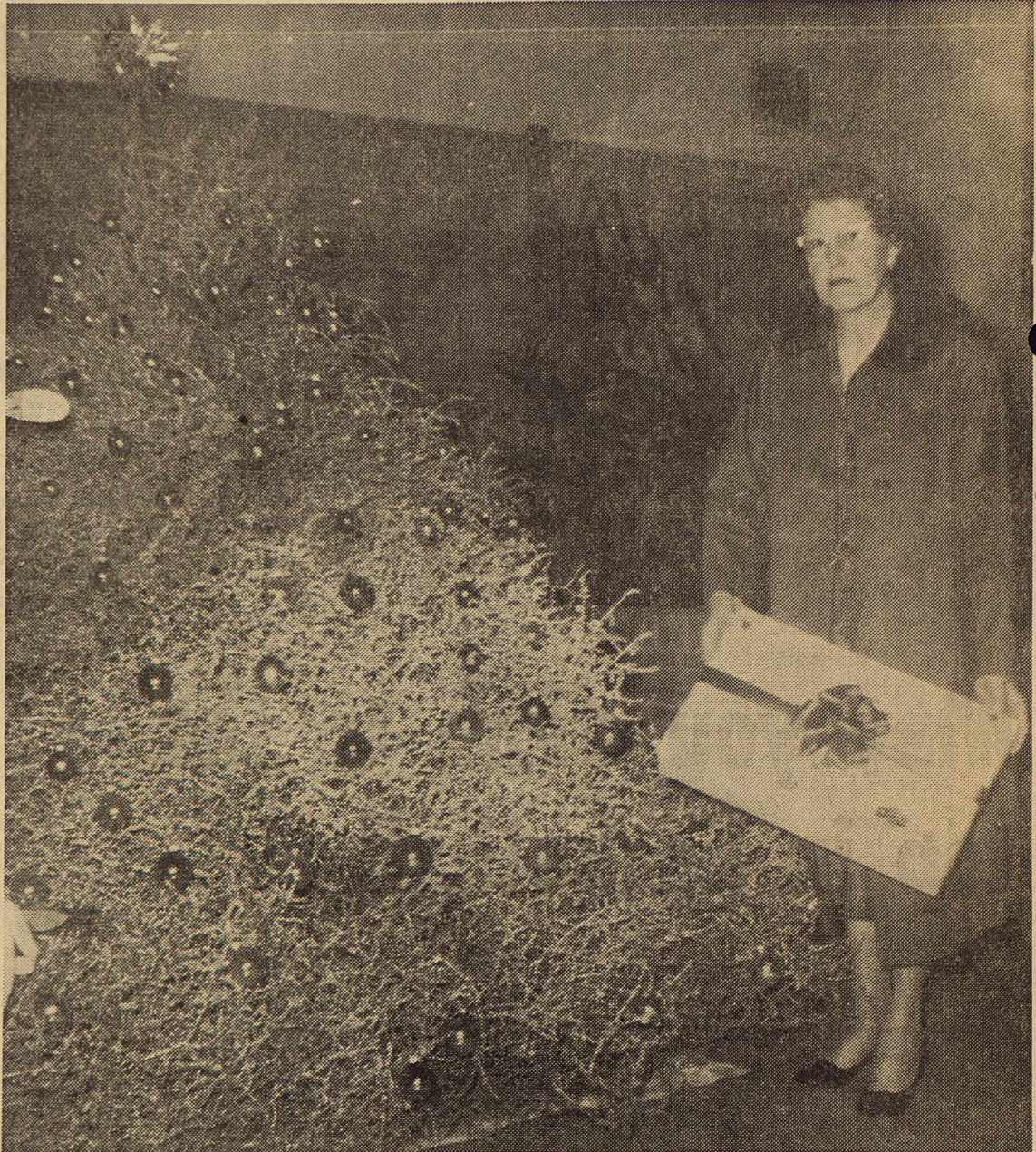

new pumper in the Wasson (6,600-foot Clear Fork) field of Yoakum County.

It finished for a daily potential of 112 barrels of 33-gravity oil, plus 17 per cent water, pumped from perforations at 6,437-6,643 feet, which had been fractured with 30,000 gallons. Gas-oil ratio was 335-1.

It was drilled to 7,470 feet and 5½-inch casing cemented one footoff bottom.

The new well is 475 feet from south and 575 feet from east lines of section 802, block D, J. H. Gibson survey.

Shell Oil Company of Midland has completed No. 22-A George Baumgart as an extension of production in the Wasson (6,600-foot Clear Fork) field of Yoakum County.

In 24 hours it pumped 140 barrels of 33-gravity oil, no water, from perforations between 6,393 and 6,799 feet, which had been fractured with 30,000 gallons. Gas-oil ratio was 287-1.

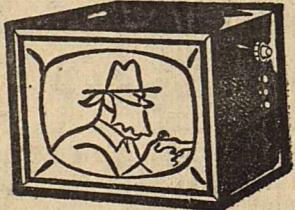

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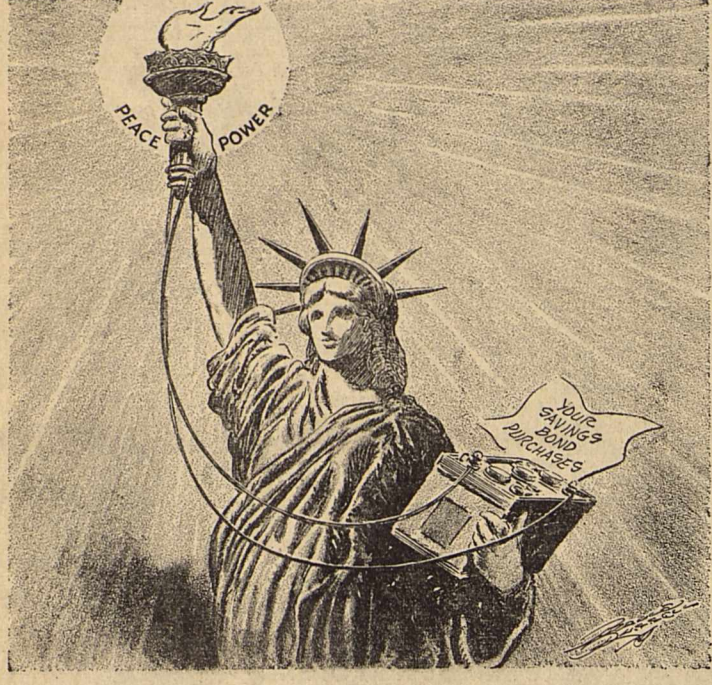


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Ex-Drunkard Says Alcoholism Is "A Sickness"

A Muleshoe, Texas ex-drunkard who still says he is an alcoholic, recently talked to the Alcoholics Anonymous meeting in Albuquerque and said:

"The most important thing we can give anyone with a deep-seated trouble is a little of our time."

"Alcoholism is a sickness — a disease of the mind, body and soul," he concluded.

The Muleshoe man has been recently awarded the outstanding citizen award in his community for the work he has done in behalf of alcoholics.

He said the award as an outstanding citizen was a victory for his friends in AA but it could not have happened except for the grace of God," he said.

"If we wish to remain free of alcoholism, we must get rid of anger fear and resentment," he continued.

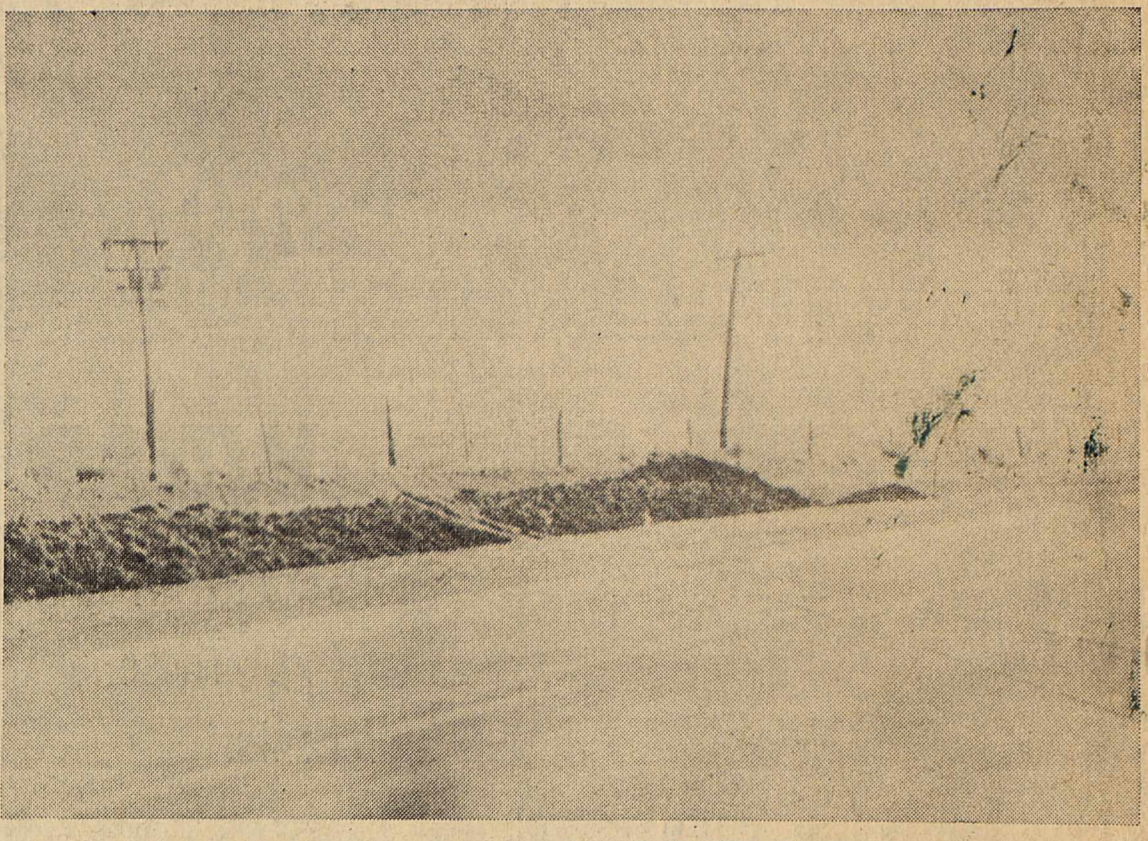
