Excess Wheat Acreage Not To Carry Penalties In 1964

Emmett E. Powell, secretary of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office in Eastland County, has announced that there will be no marketing quota penalties for planting wheat in excess of acreage allotments for 1964. However, producers who overplant their 1964 allotments will receive history credit only in the amount of their allotments, so overplanting wheat allotments in 1964 may affect future years allotment, it was pointed out.

Overplanting cuts off soil bank payments, and the 1964 conservation reserve payments for the farm is dependent on keeping within the 1964 wheat acreage allotment or 15 acres, whichever is larger, Mr. Powell said.

Provisions have been made to continue in effect the opportunity for those producers who overplant their 1964 allotment to dispose of such ex-

cess wheat acreage 30 days before harvest, thus making them eligible for price support, he added.

A producer complying with the wheat allotment on one farm will not have to be in compliance with the wheat allotments on other farms in which he has an interest in order to be eligible for price support on the farm that is within its allotment, Mr. Powell said.

In addition to the above provisions, price support averaging 50 percent of parity nationally will be available only to producers who stay within the farm wheat acreage allotments established for the 1964 wheat crop. (The parity price for July, 1963, was \$2.51 per bushel.)

Mr. Powell added that anyone with questions about how these provisions will affect his operations may come to his office for consultation.

LAW ENFORCEMENT ASS'N IS FORMED AT MONTHLY MEET

The Eastland County Law Enforcement Association will be formally organized when members meet Monday, October 14, at the Victor Hotel in Cisco, a spokesman said here this week.

Twenty-four officers met last Monday in The County Commissioners Courtroom in Eastland for their first get-together. The following towns in the county were represented by law enforcement officers: Cisco, Ranger, Eastland,

Gorman and Rising Star.

The group decided to meet on the second Monday of each month, rotating the site for each meeting.

Officers will be elected, Department of Public Safety Sgt. Roger Sosebee said, and a discussion held on recent laws enacted. Primary purpose of the organization, he said, was for the improvement of communications between the various enforcement agencies in the county.

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Bid Opening Set For Oct. 4 Meet

Plans and specifications for a new high school building for the Cisco Independent School District were given final approval by the board of trustees at the regular semi-monthly meeting Monday night at the Chamber of Commerce offices.

The board authorized its architects, Boone and Pope of Abilene, to call for bids on a contract to erect the building. The bids will be opened at 4 p. m. Friday, Oct. 4, at a meeting at the Victor Hotel, according to Supt. T. M. Roach.

The building, which will be erected on a 20-acre site in the new Royal Oaks Addition in southwest Cisco, will have 21 class rooms, a 500-seat auditorium, a 500-seat gymnasium, a cafeteria, library, agriculture shop, science laboratories, offices and other quarters.

Cost of the building is expected to run in the neighborhood of \$600,000.00, Mr. Roach said.

The school district voted \$700,000 in bonds last year for the purpose of building a high school building for grades 7 through 12 and to repair the present East Ward and Junior High buildings for use of the elementary grades.

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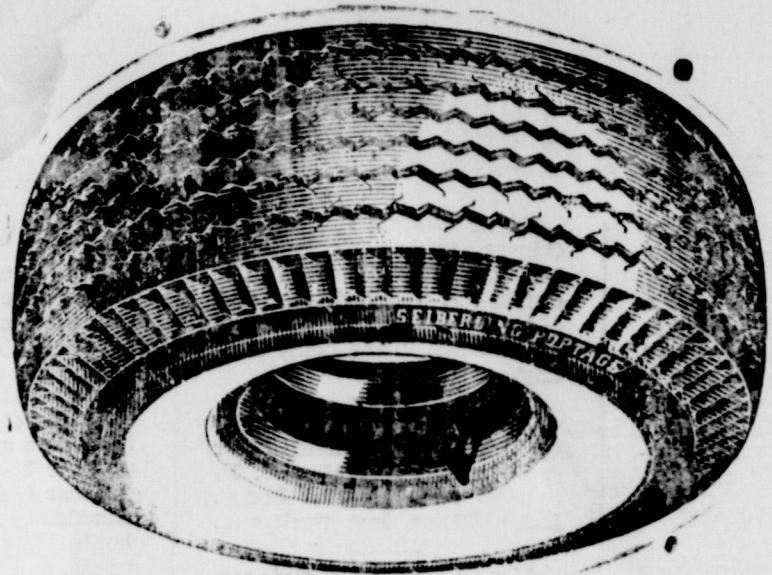

'1,500 DOE' 800 Permits Going Slowly At This Time

Issuance of doe tags has been going slowly — but is expected to pick up in Eastland County as hunting season approaches.

Only 23 of the 800 tags sent to the county clerk's office

had been issued at mid-week, but judging from last year's demand, the county may have to ask for more.

Game Warden Maurice Dry estimates that there are only about 1,500 doe in the county, compared to approximately 400 bucks.

Last year, 500 permits were issued by the clerk's office and there were a great number of calls after those were gone. The office had been sent 300 at the beginning of September last year. These were distributed and more or-

dered. Under the present arrangement, the county can apparently have as many as are requested.

Many of the doe in the county this year are small, Dry reports, and shouldn't be killed.

The permits may be bought for 50 cents each by anyone owning a current hunting license. The permits are free for persons under 17 years old, and land-owners who choose to use it on their own land only.

HOW TO MAKE LIGHT WORK IN THE KITCHEN

Properly planned lighting in the kitchen makes meal preparation easier, more pleasant and more efficient. It helps eliminate little annoyances like misread recipes . . . dishes (or vegetables) that have to be washed twice. For a well-lighted kitchen you need two kinds of lighting:

GENERAL LIGHTING

. . . to provide a pleasant level of over-all room illumination without glare or shadowy areas. As a suggestion for the average rectangular kitchen, a 12-inch enclosed ceiling fixture with a 150-watt bulb, or a shielded fluorescent fixture with two 40-watt tubes usually will provide adequate light.



LOCAL LIGHTING

. . . to eliminate working in your own shadow at the sink, range or work counters. Use over the sink either incandescent or fluorescent lamps, shielded behind a facing board or recessed into ceiling. A shielded fluorescent wall bracket is recommended over the range. Shielded fluorescent tubes under cabinets will provide ample light on counter tops
