Plains Records Amazing Growth Mark in 1950s

Plains was the 37th fastest growing city in Texas during the decade between 1950 and 1960, according to information released this week by the Texas Municipal League.

The county seat city of Yoakum County increased its population from 480 in 1950 to 1,195 in 1960, a whopping 117 per cent increase.

Forty-seven Texas cities more than doubled their population during the 10-year period, but only nine had a 1950 census figure lower than Plains. This spectacular rise in popu-

lation for Plains moved the were Abilene, El Plso, Tyler City into 473rd place in the state. In 1950, Plains was not listed in the top 1,000.

The Municipal League report stated that virtually all growth in population during the 1950's took place in five geographical areas. These areas included the Dallas-Fort Worth metropolitan area, the Guld Coast

area, the area following the Balcones fault Line, the West Texas Permian Basin and the Western half of the Panhandle which experienced big growth | ing.

and Wichita Falls.

Fastest growing city in the state was Irving, a Dallas suburb, which increased from 2,621 in 1950 to 45,985 in 1960. In fact, the top 10 were all in the Dallas-Fort Worth metropolitan area.

Fastest growing city in West Texas was Andrews, which jumped from 202nd to 91st in the state standing on the strength of a population increase from 3, 294 to 11, 135. Andof the state. Isolated areas rews was the 16th fastest grow-
