An unexpected but welcome visitor to this office Tuesday was David L. (Pappy) Watson, the former Denver City publisher who now hangs his hat in Deming, N. M. He was a little older, a little grayer and a little slower than when I last saw him several years ago, but he was the same ol' Pappy.

This point was driven home more than ever when he left me a copy of his newspaper. A heading, "Deming Publisher Made Party to Suit", assured me that he had not changed.

Newcomers may not know Watson, but anyone who has lived in West Texas any length of time knows him well. At various times, he has owned newspapers at Denver City, Seminole, Seagraves, Lovington, Eunice, Crane and many other places.

In 53 years in the newspaper business, he has owned 34 newspapers in 12 states. And it's a good bet that he's remembered just as well everywhere as he is in Denver City and Seminole. He probably wouldn't win any popularity contests, but he was popular in an unusual sort of way and was held in deep admiration by the younger fellows of the profession he did so much to build.

With movies having dipped to such moral depths that obscenity is virtually a prerequisite for Academy Award consideration, it is even more difficult to lose a character like Gary Cooper.

Cooper was one of those who always played a rugged part in the kind of film anyone would be willing to take his family to see. Moreover, he was one of those rare Hollywood stars who proved that success and national spotlight need not detract from one's moral character. His name never made the scandal pages, his family was very close to him and he was deeply religious.

I saw most of Cooper's movies after I got big enough to enjoy them. I recall best the first Cooper movie I ever saw, "Pride of the Yankees." He'll be remembered best for other roles, but to me I'll always think of him first in his portrayal of Lou Gehrig. There was a great resemblance, much more than just physical, between these two heroes of mine.

Dog owners are reminded that they can have their dogs vaccinated Saturday morning between 8 a. m. and noon.

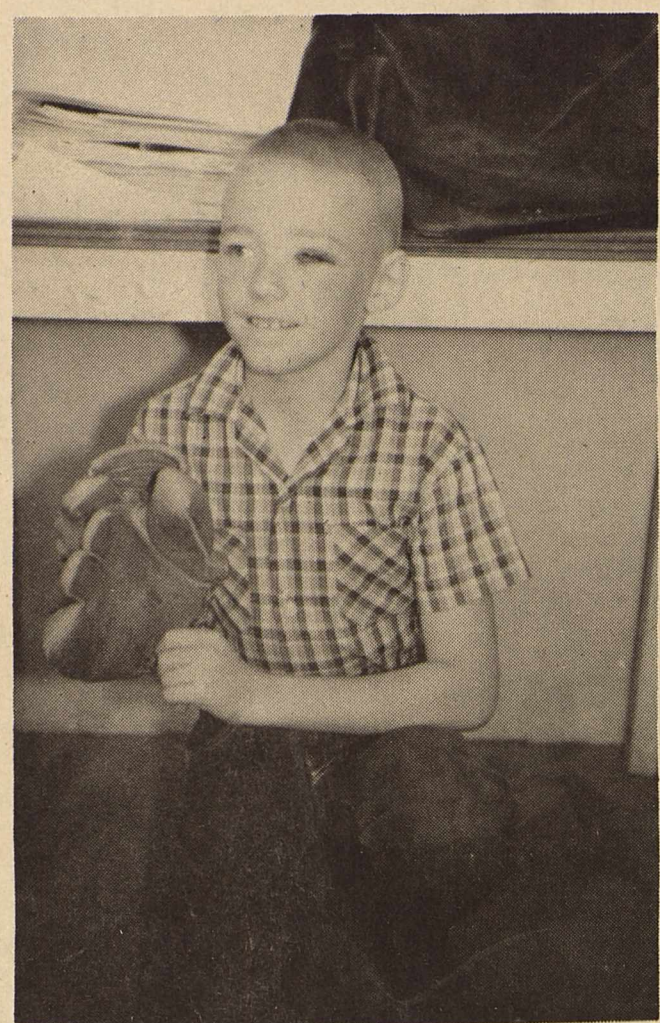
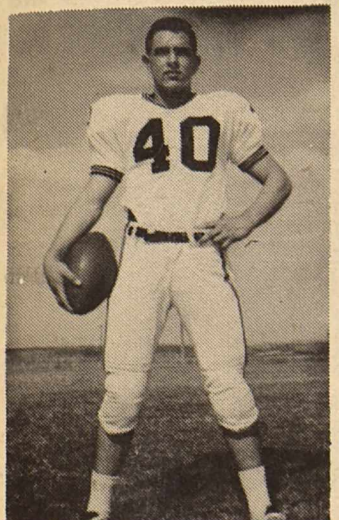
Dr. A. J. Mabry, Seminole veterinarian, will be at the City Hall during those hours to perform vaccinations.

Survey Cards Being Mailed To Farmers

Postmaster Jack Hayes reminds rural patrons of the Plains post office to be on the lookout for June Livestock Survey cards. Next week survey cards will be placed in a sample of boxes belonging to farmers and ranchmen.

"USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to this survey," Hayes explains. "It's important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the letter-drop. This way, USDA gets a true sample of the area's livestock and poultry holdings."

Survey cards will be forwarded to Cary D. Palmer, state agricultural statistician in Austin. After adding and analyzing these cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the state's milk production, calf and pig crops and the number of hens and pullets.

"Information from this survey will guide livestock and poultry producers in making important business decisions," Hayes said.

Sarah K. Field, Sylvia McGinty Are Top Students

Honor students of this year's junior high school graduating class are Sarah K. Field and Sylvia Louise McGinty.

Miss Field's 95.6 grade average earned her valedictorian honors while Miss McGinty rated salutatorian honors on the strength of her 93.7 average.

Graduation exercises will be held at 8 p. m. Tuesday in the high school auditorium. Principal Roy Stockstill said that approximately 35 eighth-graders would graduate, but the exact number was not known Tuesday of this week.

Robert K. Field will be guest speaker at the graduation program. The valedictorian and salutatorian also will speak.

Superintendent G. D. Kennedy will pass out special awards. Awards will be presented for perfect attendance and outstanding band accomplishments as well as for scholastic honors.

Miss Field is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert K. Field of Bronco. The 14-year-old student has attended the Plains schools since she enrolled in the first grade.

Miss McGinty is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. E. (Dick) McGinty. She too has attended no other school except Plains.

She represented the county in the National Spelling Bee this past year, was a University Interscholastic League winner in spelling and has been highly active in 4-H Club work.

Sandy Randall ranks third among this year's junior high graduates and Gayla Kerrick is fourth.

Rural Accidents Investigated By Patrolmen

The Highway Patrol investigated two rural accidents in Yoakum County during the month of April, according to Sgt. D. S. Lawson, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for one person killed, one person injured and property damage of \$2,375.

This brings the total for 1961 in this county to five killed, three injured, and a property damage of \$13,800.

"A driver who learns and complies with traffic laws can never prevent as many accidents as a driver who learns and complies with both traffic laws and defensive driving procedures," the sergeant stated.

A traffic law describes what a driver must do or not do. Procedure describes ways in which a driver can comply with the law or do something extra that will increase his safety and prevent congestion.

"For example, the law says that no person shall park a vehicle upon the paved or main-traveled part of the highway. A driver complies with this law on a rural highway when his car barely clears the pavement. Procedure, in this instance, when possible or reasonable would require the driver to park a greater distance from the pavement," the Sgt. explained.

The local unit of the Salvation Army provides the following emergency and supplementary welfare services on a local level:

Emergency relief for disaster victims, clothing, food, fuel meals, lodgings for transients, medical, dental, ear and eye aids, hospital care for unwed mothers, help for blind and

deaf, nutritional aid for school children, temporary assistance to families and several other humanitarian services.

Local funds are administered through a local board. A bank account is maintained here.

On the state level, the Salvation Army operates a boys' camp which two Plains youths will attend this summer. It also maintains a hospital for unwed mothers.

Six Miles Northeast

Another Wildcat Slated

In northeast Yoakum County, Clark and Cowden Exploration Co., Dallas, No. 1 P. Z. Conrad will be dug as 5,400-foot San Andres wildcat test six miles northeast of Plains and three and one-half miles northeast of the Spivey (San Andres) field.

The exploration is also one mile south of a 5,342-foot duster and two and one-fourth miles north-northwest of a 7,600-foot failure.

Rotary tools will be rigged up at 660 feet from north and east lines of Section 254, Block D, John H. Gibson survey.

Pan American Petroleum's south Yoakum County wildcat, No. 1-L J. L. Gammon, six miles northeast of Denver City, developed a small amount of free oil on a lower Pennsylvanian drillstem test.

On a three and one-half hour test from 11,807-843 feet, recovery was the 2,000-foot nitrogen blanket, 30 feet of oil cut mud and six inches of 42.2 gravity oil.

Flow pressures ranged from 95 to 340 pounds and 30 minute shut-in pressure was 910 pounds.

An earlier four-hour drillstem test in the Wolfcamp recovered 1,209 feet of mud and 3,300 feet of free oil and 3,300 feet of brackish water.

At last report the wildcat was below 11,970 feet in lime.

It is located 660 feet south and 1,980 feet from west lines of Section 675, Block D, John H. Gibson survey, one mile

northeast of Wasson San Andres field and five miles southeast of the Wells (Devonian) pool.

Texaco Inc. will drill a northwest offset to the East Wasson Wolfcamp and Wasson Wichita Albany pools as No. 19-B Mrs. Annie Miller, 1,980 feet from south and 660 feet

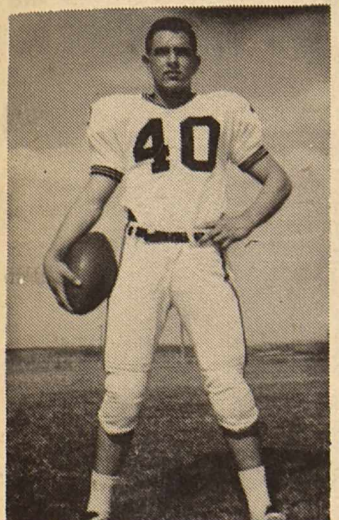
from west lines of section 862, Block D, John H. Gibson survey, a 9,100-foot operation.

Texaco Seaboard Inc. will drill No. 11 O. M. Nelson et al 996 feet from south line and 1,980 feet from east line of section 474, Gibson survey, five miles southeast of Plains.

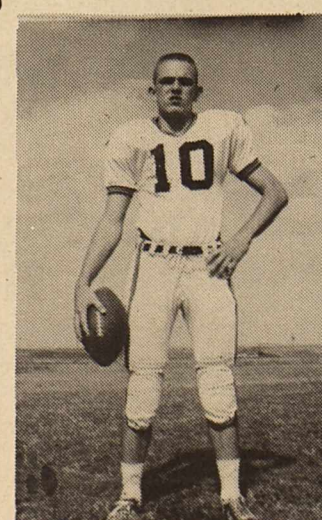
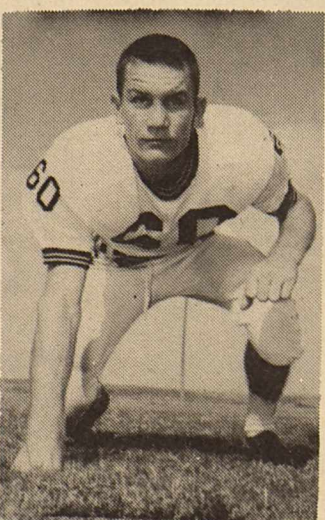
Dallas Powell Is Initiated

LEGAL NOTICE
REGULATING THE KEEPING OF DOGS IN THE CITY OF PLAINS; PROVIDING FOR A LICENSE AND TAX; PROVIDING FOR THE VACCINATION OF DOGS; PROVIDING FOR A DOG POUND; PROVIDING FOR THE REDEMPTION OF DOGS.

AND THE DISPOSAL THEREOF IF NOT REDEEMED; AND PROVIDING FOR THE VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PLAINS, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. Providing for Dog Tax and Vaccination: That there is hereby levied and assessed upon each dog, male or female, kept or owned within the City of Plains, Texas, an annual tax of \$2.50 on each male dog and \$2.50 on each female dog, which tax is due and payable on the first of January of each year and it is hereby made the duty of the owner or keeper of any dog male or female to pay over to the Chief of Police or his duly authorized agent the said tax on or before the first day of January of each year.

SECTION 2. The Mayor shall collect or have collected under his supervision all dog taxes, and he may employ a special officer to be known and designated as the Dog Catcher, whose duty it shall be to carry out the terms and provisions of this Ordinance and the Mayor shall be authorized to pay unto the Dog Catcher a commission on all dogs impounded the amount of \$3.00 per head. The City Clerk shall be responsible to the City of Plains for all money collected under this ordinance and shall make monthly reports in writing of all money collected under this Ordinance to the Mayor and shall pay over to the City Clerk for deposit with the city treasurer all money so collected at least once a month.

SECTION 3. Upon payment of said tax, the Mayor or his duly authorized agent shall furnish the owner or keeper of said dog or dogs with a tag on which is stamped the number of registration with the year for which tax is paid, which tag the owner or keeper shall attach to a collar securely fastened around the neck of such dog,

male or female, and no dog shall be allowed to run at large without the proper tag attached to the collar around the neck of said dog. In no event shall the Mayor or his duly authorized agent issue a license tag to any owner or keeper of a dog, male or female, unless and until such owner or keeper shall furnish a vaccination certificate issued by a licensed Veterinarian stating that such dog or dogs have been vaccinated against rabies by him.

SECTION 4. All dogs within the City of Plains, Texas are hereby required to be vaccinated against rabies by all licensed veterinarians on or before May 20 and each year thereafter and it is further provided herein that every Veterinarian who vaccinates any such dog, either male or female, within the City of Plains, Texas, shall collect his fee for same from the owner of the dog and shall issue a certificate of vaccination to such owner, stating the name of the owner, a brief description of the dog, the date of vaccination and the fee collected by him for same; provided however, that the fee charged by such Veterinarian for such vaccination certificate shall not in any case exceed the sum of \$2.50.

Whenever any person has complied with the provisions of the preceding sections and the said dog tax is lost or otherwise destroyed, it shall be the duty of said owner or keeper of said dog to procure another tag from the City Clerk by paying the value of said tag and all costs that may have accrued as hereinafter provided.

SECTION 5. It shall be the duty of the Dog Catcher or his authorized agent to capture and impound in a pen to be provided by the Council of said city for that purpose and called the "Dog Pound" and any dog, male or female, found running at large within the City of Plains, Texas, without a tag, as provided for under the terms of this ordinance and if such dog, male or female, is not redeemed and reclaimed and taken from said pound within the time required under the provisions of this ordinance then the Mayor shall advertise said dog for sale twenty four

hours by posting one notice of said sale at the door of the city hall, which notice shall give the time and place of sale and shall, if not redeemed, sell said dog, male or female at public auction and if no one shall bid upon the same, the amount of charges due on said dog, the said dog shall be bought by the city at once and killed by the Dog Catcher or his duly authorized agent.

SECTION 6. (a) The Owner and keeper of any dog or dogs captured or impounded under the provisions of this ordinance shall be permitted and allowed at any time within seventy-two hours after such dog or dogs shall have been impounded, to redeem, reclaim and again receive possession of said dog or dogs, upon payment to the Dog Catcher or his duly authorized agent, the sum of \$3.00 plus \$1.00 per day or fractional part thereof during which time said dog or dogs may have been impounded for every such dog so impounded which sum so paid to him shall by the Dog Catcher be paid over to the City Clerk for deposit with the Treasurer for the use and benefit of the City as well as all other money received by him under the terms of this ordinance.

(b) Should the owner or keeper of said dog or dogs, male or female, fail to redeem the same as provided for in paragraph (a) of this section within the seventy-two hours then said dog or dogs shall be advertised and sold or killed in the manner provided for in this ordinance. It shall be the duty of

the Mayor and duly authorized Dog Catcher to see that the terms of this ordinance are strictly enforced.

SECTION 7. The Dog Catcher and any policeman of this city shall have the right to shoot or kill any rabid dog or any dog in the streets which shall manifest a disposition to bite.

SECTION 8. Any dog which is tagged and shall become a nuisance or menace to the neighborhood shall be required to be chained or penned upon the filing of a complaint with the City Clerk by anyone so annoyed. Owner of said dog, if refusing to comply with order to confine dog, shall be liable to a fine not to exceed \$50.00.

SECTION 9. That any person who shall wilfully take from any dog a collar or tag shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not to exceed \$100.00.

SECTION 10. Any person violating any provision of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not exceeding \$100.

SECTION 11. All ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed and the City Secretary is authorized to so note in the margins of the ordinance books that said ordinance or ordinances have been repealed.

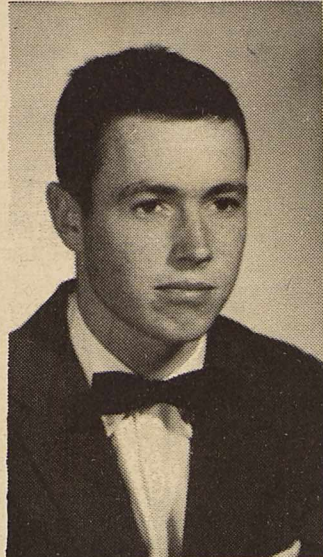
Largest Graduating Class In History of Local School

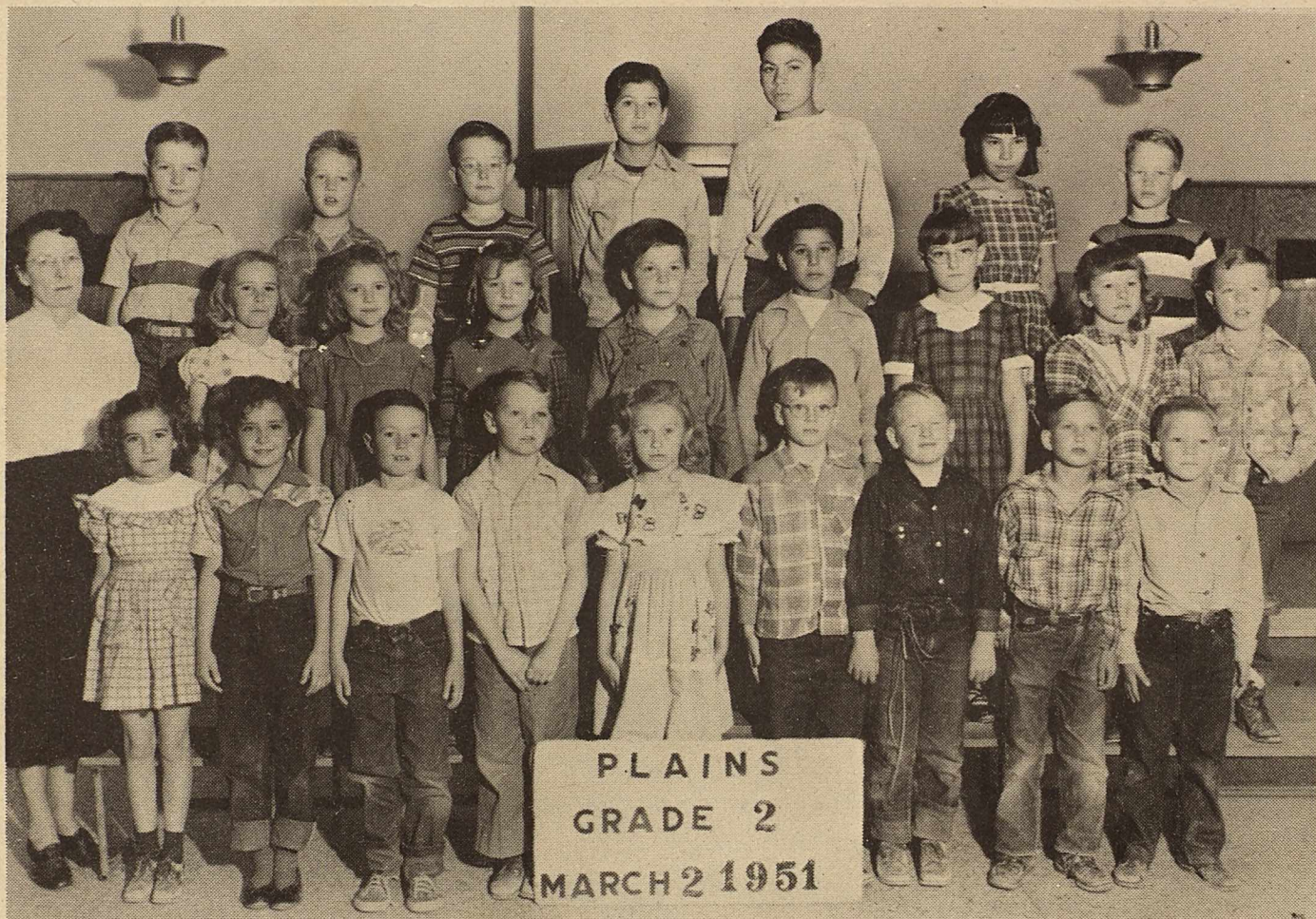
