I was talking the other day with a young fellow in Hereford who said he had hitch hiked from Anchorage, Alaska, to Hereford in seven days.

"It's easy," said the boy. "Not many cars will pass you until you reach Wyoming." Whether or not the boy's story was true I don't know. Several conflicting statements made me suspicious. But the conversation did re-create within me a loneliness for hitch hiking, an art I once found fascinating, interesting and educational.

I never took off on any cross-country jaunt, but I have made many of the main roads of Texas and Oklahoma.

If a hitch hiker has luck, he feels he has accomplished something. "Luck" usually is anything which allows him to make better time than the bus or train. But if the luck isn't there, the chore can become pretty discouraging.

Perhaps the easiest place to hitchhike that I ever tried was in central Texas. The thumb method always seemed to beat public transportation. Worst of all areas was in the El Paso territory.

An experience of 1945 still stands out as the most memorable of all my experiences. A high school student then, a buddy and I had been to a football game in Norman, Okla., on the Saturday following Thanksgiving. We stayed overnight in Norman and easily exhausted our resources.

Next morning we hit the road. Immediately, we hitched a ride to Chickasha, but there our luck played out. Impatient we walked leisurely down the road, chucking rocks at telephone polls to pass the time. No car would stop. By late afternoon, we found that we had walked halfway to Cement, a town 20 miles from Chickasha. It was getting cold and finally started snowing.

A strategy conference resulted in the plan to split up and head in opposite directions. He took the other side of the road and began thumbing cars going back toward Chickasha and I stayed where I was and kept up my attempt to catch a ride the other way.

Fate finally smiled at us. A dump truck going in the direction of Chickasha breezed by my buddy with no intention of stopping. But just as it got about even with him, the lights went out and the driver was forced to stop about a quarter of a mile down the road.

We ran as fast as we could toward the truck. It took the driver just a few minutes to fix his lights. We asked him for a ride. Since his wife, a real large woman, was riding with him, he said we were welcome to ride in the back. We promptly accepted his offer and began the cold ride to Chickasha.

After getting to town, we contacted my sister, who was a student at Oklahoma College for Women in Chickasha. She advanced us funds to catch the next bus toward home.

I learned a valuable lesson that day, a lesson which probably has saved me from getting into the same predicament again. Never again did I ever walk past the edge of any town. Motorists are much more likely to stop and pick you up there than they are on the open highway.

There's one other good idea which might be passed along for the benefit of anyone who has never practiced the art of hitch hiking. Always carry enough money to buy a bus ticket home---or at least to the home of some relative or good friend.

Girls State Delegate Is Named Judge

Roberta Snodgrass, a citizen of the American Legion Auxiliary Bluebonnet Girls State in Austin, at the Texas School for the Blind, was elected county judge of County "I" in elections held last week.

Miss Snodgrass is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jess H. Snodgrass of Tokio and was sponsored by the local American Legion Auxiliary and the Tsa Mo Ga Club.

Girls State was organized as a national Americanism activity in 1937 by the American Legion Auxiliary. Non-partisan and non-political, the purpose of the Girls State program is to provide citizenship training for girls of high school age, to afford them an opportunity to live together as a self-governing group and to inform them of the duties, privileges, rights and responsibilities which they will assume when they become adults. They learn the problems of government by performing the same duties as real office holders in the everyday world.

The 1961 session of the American Legion Auxiliary Bluebonnet Girls State has grown from an experimental conference of 94 girls, held at Baylor University in 1941, to become the largest single extracurricular educational program for high school girls in Texas.

This year, 399 girls are in attendance, making a total of more than 5,400 girls in Texas who have participated in this top-level citizenship program. Citizens are selected at local levels principally on a basis of character and leadership from students who have just completed their junior year in high school each year.

Associate Justice Meade Griffin of the Texas Supreme Court administered the oaths of office to the various elected state officials Monday in the Rotunda of the State Capitol.

Climaxing the session was the selection of two outstanding citizens of 1961 to be sent to Girls Nation in Washington.

ARE YOU GUILTY?

Baseball, being the great American past time, is not without its traditions. A fan of professional baseball feels that his ticket entitles him to a few extra privileges, such as the right to boo umpires, coaches and players.

This may be all right in the big leagues where baseball is an occupation and each person connected with the game realizes that the fan pays his salary and is entitled to offer opinions.

But there is no place at all for such things in a Little League baseball program. Coaches, umpires and other officials are volunteer workers, devoting time and often money to the healthful activity. Players are not super stars, merely youngsters attempting to learn the arts of hitting, fielding, throwing---and competing against each other.

Such was the reasoning behind the establishment of the vast Little League program which now spreads across the United States and into several foreign countries. In other words, Little League is for the boys. Adults simply are advisers.

But all too often, parents and other fans get the idea that the game is for their own entertainment. They become more wrapped up in it than the boys themselves. Their conduct at ball games goes a long way toward destroying the good the program is supposed to establish.

Public criticism of Little League officials

and players has threatened the very life of the program. At least two major magazines have recently quoted medical experts as saying that Little League baseball may be creating a worse problem than the one it is attempting to solve. And the sad part of it is that the problem is not coming from the boys themselves.

This situation makes it doubly tough on adult volunteers. Their thankless job becomes one of great burden. Many who are sincerely interested in doing what they can for the youth of the community hesitate to do so, realizing that their efforts may make them unpopular and even cost them business. As a result, the boys loses again---by playing in a league which is greatly understaffed.

This problem is not just a local one. It exists throughout the country. But it must be corrected on the local level.

Officials of the Plains Little League have taken a big step in that direction. At a meeting Monday night, they called upon themselves to see that the program is conducted in a more respectable manner. Coaches were told to conduct themselves with utmost dignity. Disputes, henceforth, must be settled without the vaudeville atmosphere. Those are orders from Little League officials.

The rest of the solution lies with the fans. League officials called upon fans to do their part in seeing that the baseball program can be conducted in the best interests of the boys.

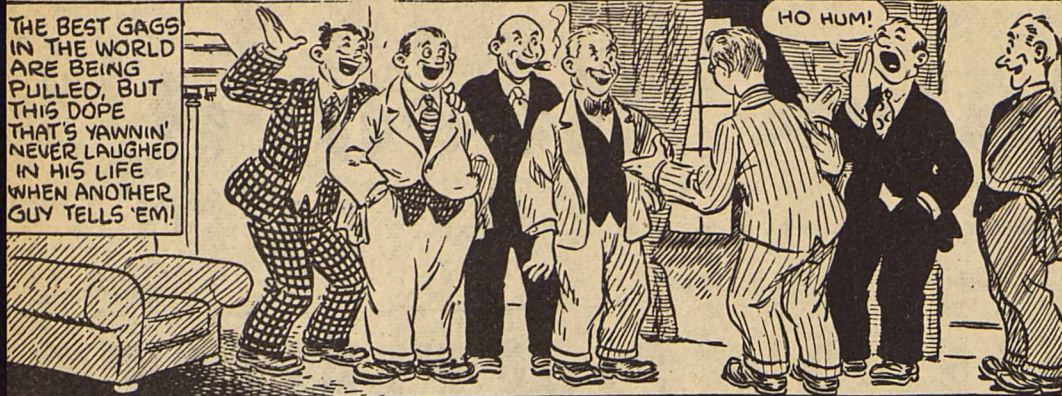
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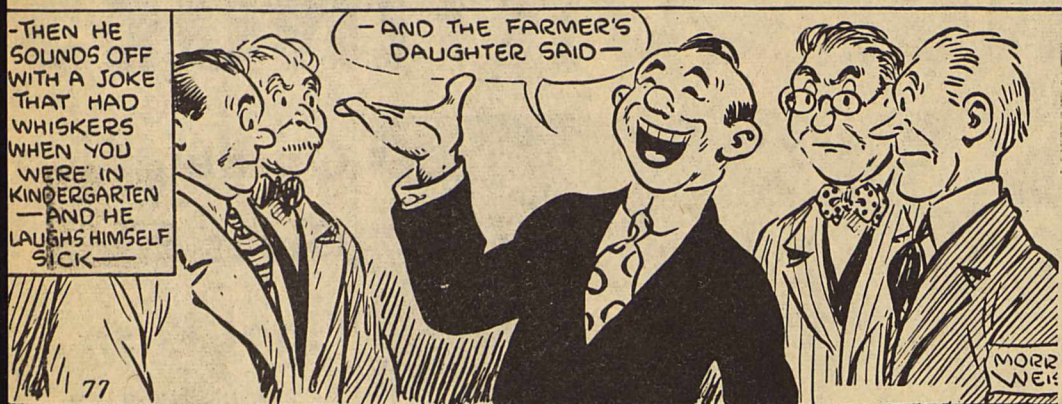

SOIL Conservation NEWS

Brush control in the form of aerial spraying has been completed. Johnnie Fitzgerald completed the spraying of a section of range land Saturday. It is unbelievable the amount of grass he has grown, the brush and weed control he has accomplished with one aerial spraying. Johnnie's range land is located on the east side of FM road about seven miles north of Tokio.

Ty Field, Chesley Bedford, Rusty McGinty and Charles Williams have all sprayed brush under the Great Plains program. Dick McGinty sprayed some mesquite this week, paying all the cost himself.

A conservation plan to put about 50 acres to grass and install an underground pipe line for irrigation along with a lot of crop residue management was mailed to the area office for typing this past week on the James Wasson place.

Mrs. Paul Loe has received assistance on her place just north of Plains where she plans to take out of crop land about 56 acres. This is a hill known by soils scientists as Drake dune. It not only produces very little but is a menace to other land. Both Mrs. Loe and James Wasson will receive assistance under the Great Plains Program. Leroy Henson who has a place on the Wellman road plans to plant some native grass on range land and sod some Bermuda on crop land as a part of his conservation program.

Approved conservation programs for the J. C. Stegall and A. O. Williams places were received this week. Both Williams and Stegall are Soil Conservation District cooperators as well as participants in the Great Plains Program.

The district, along with the Gaines district at Seminole, is leading a large area in the member of Great Plains Program being written since the first of the year.

Baptist Women Conduct Bible School at Negro Church Here

Second, their project was to train workers so that the St. Paul's Baptist Church could conduct a Bible School in its church concurrently with the Plains Baptist Church.

Thirty-nine members were enrolled in this school with an average attendance of 37 for a period of five days.

Mrs. G. R. Todd was superintendent of the school. Mrs. Jack Pierce directed the music. President of the WMU is Mrs. W. P. Turner.

Denver City and Plains drivers dominated the competition at the races held here the previous Saturday, June 10.

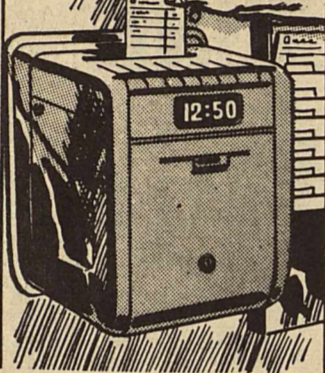
Denver Dearing won the Industrial Men, Joe Terry took the women's division and Chas. Terry won first in the junior class. All three are from Denver City.
