Ecitor's Note: The followng item is taker from The Rising Star, a column written by Vada Arnold and titled "It Has Been."

At the turn of the century when children were called "young'uns," and men referred to their wives as "the old lady, Madam, the Missus, and the women. Women recalled their husbands, Mr. Brown, Mr. Jones or Mr. Smith. Some used the given name such as Mr. Jim, Mr. Tobe or Mr. Jake. More endearing terms were used occasionally as "hubby, My beloved" etc.

Every housewife of that day searched general stores for the latest pattern in oil cloth for their "eating tables". Oil cloth was a combination of cotton material and some sort of a shiny glaze on the outside. It came in varied colors and patterns including red, yellow, white and sometimes light blue. There were the beautiful block designs, one block a solid color the next bore, pears, peaches, apples, grapes and other fruit, in living color. Then there were bird patterns that fascinated children. Many youngsters became acquainted with living birds through the study of the oilcloth tablecloth, as they ate. Table cloths of this type were the envy of the neighborhood. Bach women vying with her neighbor on the selection, trying to "outdo" other women in her communinty by having the most unusual and attractive oilcloth. These cloths were easily kept by wringing the dishrag from the dishpan and simply wiping the glowing cloth and then with a soft clean rag polishing the surface until it gleamed. The lovely cloths were used for months on end, so long as no hot coffee pots, hot dishes of food and hot drinks were set directly on the cloth. If this was done unthoughtedly of by accident, as soon as the vessel was lifted, up came the glaze off the precious cloth sticking

ty judge, county superintenof schools, district clerk, county clerk, county treasurer, the county commissioners of Precincts 2 (Gorman) and 4 (Cisco); justices of the peace at Rising Star, and the constable's office at Eastland.

Officers whose terms have still two years to go are district judge, county sheriff, county tax assessor-collector, county and district attorney

and three constables. Steel Hill, constable at Eastland is serving as an appointee following the death of Porter Woods last April, and he faces election for the remainder of the term at the polls next year.

Although none of the incumbents of offices to be filled in the 1970 voting has made a formal announcement there is some forthright statements and clear indications in others that all of them would offer for re-election.

County Judge Scott Bailey said privately that he would be a candidate for a third term although he would make no formal announcement until later. There have been no reports of any rivial candidate

County Clerk Johnson Smith would make no statement of his plans, although his friends were confident that he will be a candidate for .re-election. No other candidacies for the office have been reported and there was no known speculation concerning any opposition announcement.

Roy L. Lane. who is in his 25th year as 91st District Clerk, has announced that he will resign office to become effective around March 1. Mr. Lane has been a faithful officer and will be greatly missed in the court house

Mrs. Ellen Justice said frankly that she would be a candidate for re-elecion as county treasurer

County Supt. O. L. Stamey, whose office has been the target of some petitions seeking an election to abolish it, said that he was giving serious

consideration to seeking reelection. His friends were confident, however, that Stamey, a veteran educator and former president of Cisco junior college, would again offer for the office which administers large amounts of state and federal aid to the county schools.

Two Cisco offices will be filled in the 1970 voting and in both of them there were clear prospects of primary contests.

They are the of ice of county commissioner of Precinct 4. now occupied by Clarence (Runt) Dill.

Mr. Dill was regarded as certain to be a candidate for re-election, although he would not commit himself in an interview Friday. He pointed that it was somewhat early to make any announcement that he would prefer to wait until the first of the year before making a definite statement of his plans.

A possible contest for the office loomed in reports that W. W. Sawyers would offer for the post. Sawyers admitted that he had been approached by some of his friends seeking an announcement for the office but that he has not yet made up his mind.

A similar situation exists in regard to the office of the office of justice of the peace in Cisco, now held by W. L. Lewis. Mr. Lewis indicated that he would have an announcement to make about the first of the year. It was regarded as highly probable that he would be a candidate for re-election. He told this newspaper that he was giving serious consideration to such a decision.

The clear possibility of a contest for this office was presented by reports that Carl Lamb a former townty commissioner would offer for the office. Mr. Lamb said he was considering it but had not fully made up his mind.

All candidates are in the democratic column and their nomination in the primary election next May is tantamount to election in the general voting next November. The republican party is very much in the minority in the county and rarely has offered candidates for county office.

## Eastland Bank Gains In Deposits

Eastland can color 1959 a year of prosperity as the new decade begins. Excellent crop conditions, expanded industralization and steady growth of business all point toward uphill grown as the year be-

Best reflection of these indexes are in the year-end report by officials of Eastland National Bank, who report a whopping \$10 million in resources for the first time in the bank's history.

Women went to the woods with their husbands on a flat wagon bed, drawn by a team of mules or horses to cut wood for the home use and often to bile a high load of wood onto the wagon to be taken to the nearest town and sold for \$1 per load. Once in a while a prosperous merchant would pay \$1.50. Many times the wife and children sat on top of the wood and enjoyed the ride and the wonders of the general store in town.

What of cotton picking times, when from daylight until dark, people wore knee pads and crawled on their knees, dragging heavy cotton sacks hung over their shoulder and picked the fleecy white staple from the sticky burrs on the stalk. Today the very thought of a cotton sack brings back memories of aching backs and sore muscles. But a trip to the gin, and a night when papa came home with a nickles worth of stick candy for the "young'uns, all complaints of cotton picking was forever erased. Until next cotton season.
