Reed, in introducing his report, stated that there has been an attempt on the part of the newly formed board, during the past six-months period, to simplify the procedures involved in bringing a matter of this nature to the attention of the proper authorities, in the case the Texas Railroad Commission, who have the needed authority to make rulings that would ap-

Reed was, at the time of the Plains Gin meeting, in possession of a certain letter from Mr. Joe Carter, who is chairman of the Texas Water Commission and also a member of the Pollution Control Board. The letter was quite informative and stated that both the groups with vitally interested and much concerned about the problem existing in Yoakum County.

Carter went on to say that their suggestion to the interested parties in this county would be to first consider the possibility of taking what he called a "skeleton survey," in an attempt to dissolve the problem as quickly and as economically as possible.

ranged from \$2,000 to \$2,500 for his services with an additional \$1,000 or thereabouts for securing the services of an attorney to actually present the facts to the Railroad Commis-

The Midland hydroligist made it clear that this skeleton survey, in the event further facts and evidence were later called for by the RRC, would not have contributed any lost motion or wasted money, as any information gained in this survey, according to Reed, would be needed in a more detailed study should the commission call for

He also made it quite clear that the figure of \$2,000 to \$2,500 would include all of Yoakum County and not just a few isolated areas in the coun-

Reed suggested that the interested land-owners and other interested parties in the county, band themselves into an association to further the project. He also pointed out that it would be fine and good if it were possible to obtain permission from the Commissioner's Court to present the case to the RRC in the name of "Yoakum County Commissioner's Court." He stated further that several instances exist in which counties, under the auspicies of the commissioner's court have even aided in such undertakings by underwriting all or part of the expenses involved.

Plans were formulated at the Monday evening meeting to meet with the Commissioners this coming Monday afternoon, Reed will also be in attendance at that meeting and will present the case as he sees it at present to that group.


