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Fat Stock Show After 10 Years

The 10th Annual Junior Fat Stock Show is history. During the 10 years there have been 29 grand champions and 28 reserve champions. Only one lamb was exhibited in 1953 and none in 1954, other wise there would have been a total of 60 grand and reserve champions. These 57 grand and reserve champions have been fed and exhibited by 34 different individuals.

Oscar Henard is the first to make a complete sweep of the show. He has had grand and reserve champions in each of the three divisions of the show. Until this year he had not exhibited the grand champion calf nor the reserve champion barrow but he collected both of these rosettes at the 1962 show. Dallas Powell is probably the second most outstanding individual in stock show history.

During five years of showing beef calves he collected four grand champion rosettes, Jay Earl Bryson appears four times having twice won the grand champion barrow, once the reserve champion barrow and once the reserve champion calf. D'Lois McGinty is the only one to have three rosettes, one grand champion and two reserve champion calves. Oscar Henard's winnings include two grand champion lambs, one reserve champion lamb, three grand champion barrows, one reserve champion barrow, one grand champion calf and one reserve champion calf.

The beef calf gain contest sponsored by G. W. Cleveland has completed its seventh year. D'Lynn McGinty is the only one to win this contest more than one time. She collected the silver loving cup in 1957 and again in 1961.

Local Observance to be Highlighted Thursday Night

Texas Public Schools Week, which is being observed next week throughout the Lone Star State, will be highlighted locally with a welcome which has been extended by the local school officials to any and all local patrons who will, to come by the schools next week and see the programs, projects and activities of the school first hand.

All members and other veterans are urged to attend this meeting. G. D. Kennedy, Superintendent of Plains Schools, announced this week that the week will be climaxed on Thursday with a special speech program presented by several members of the student body, both elementary and advanced students. The program is set to begin at 7:30 p. m.

Following the program will be an open house and tour of the facilities of the schools.

Facilities for Instruction The ever increasing school population of Texas points to and emphasizes the growing need for public school instructional facilities as well as qualified

teachers. It also suggests that maximum utilization should be made of buildings and teachers already available. It is economically sound to utilize as fully as possible every available space and facility.

Teachers should be provided with up-to-date and appropriate instructional materials, equipment, and supplies to help them in their work. During the past few years, many electronic and visual teaching aids have been developed through research to provide new "instructional media" for classroom use. Some of these aids to teaching suggest new approaches that make better use of teacher's time and skills as well as pupils' capacity to learn.

The electronic method cannot and should not reduce the role of the teacher, but will free the teacher for creative work that no machine can ever perform.

Demonstrations of the electronic method in teaching laboratories by teams of classroom teachers have been made available to Texas schools through state and regional meetings. Many schools are now using the new devices with success, particularly the laboratories for teaching foreign languages. Schools are learning that such instructional media are not "gadgets," but can be used to assist in the teaching of individual pupils as well as to reach more pupils with fewer teachers.

To evaluate any one of the instructional aids accurately and intelligently, parents and school personnel must become familiar with what is being used and known how each is used in the classroom. Also, administrators, teachers, and citizens need to explore together new developments in teaching aids and consider improved approaches to the use of all teaching aids and facilities.

Questions For Consideration
1. Are television, radio, educational films, recordings being used? Could their use be expanded?
2. Does it seem that appropriate use is being made of maps, charts, models, tools, and other supplies needed for pupils to do effective work?
3. Have teachers, administrators, and other citizens had opportunity to see any of the demonstrations of teaching machines, language

laboratories, new techniques in programming, or other new instructional media?
4. What consideration has been given to the use of the newer electronic aids to teaching in your schools?
5. What evidence do you find to indicate that the best possible use is being made of laboratories? Libraries? Instructional Improvement and School Accreditation

The responsibility for determining what it takes to make a good instructional program is that of the local community. The State has the responsibility for establishing minimum standards only and to give leadership to local schools in improving the program.

In carrying out its legal responsibility, the State Board of Education in 1961 approved revisions in the principles and standards for accrediting elementary and secondary schools. These changes resulted from a two-year curriculum improvement study conducted by a statewide committee and by local schools.

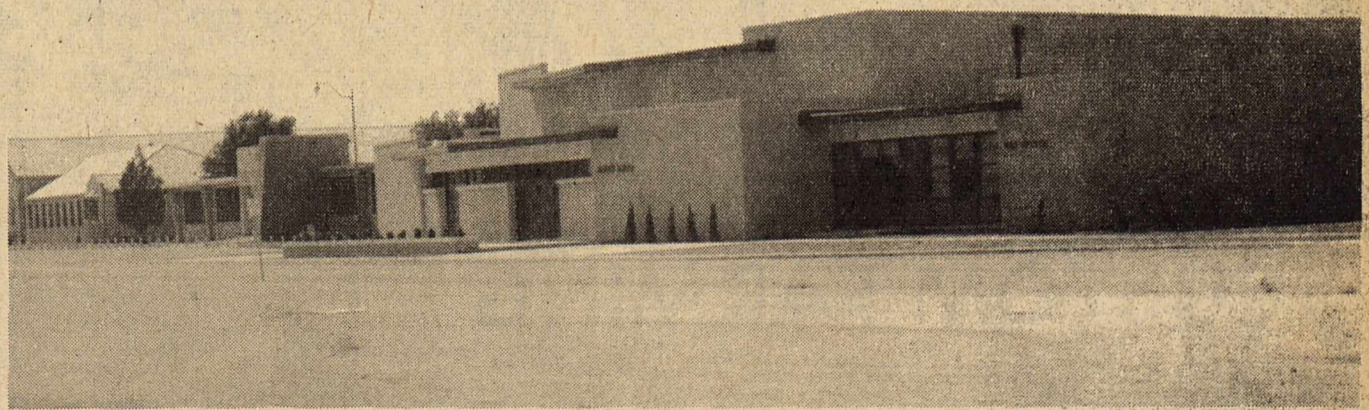
The revised principles and standards will replace present standards in September, 1962. Local schools are now making plans to implement the standards which were made available to schools by the Texas Education Agency in November, 1961.

The Principles and Standards for Accrediting Elementary and Secondary Schools provide the basis for local schools to evaluate programs of instruction, to determine the extent to which standards are being met, and to locate areas for improvement. Course descriptions, grades 7-12, were included to assist local schools in developing courses of study.

In visiting and observing schools during Texas Public Schools Week, parents and other citizens may be interested in discussing with school personnel the effect of the revised standards on:

1. School Board Policies
2. School Objectives
3. Course Offerings
4. 7th and 8th Grade Requirements
5. Graduation Requirements
6. Preparation of Staff
7. Teaching Methods (local guides and courses of study, teacher plans, and the like)
8. Guidance Services

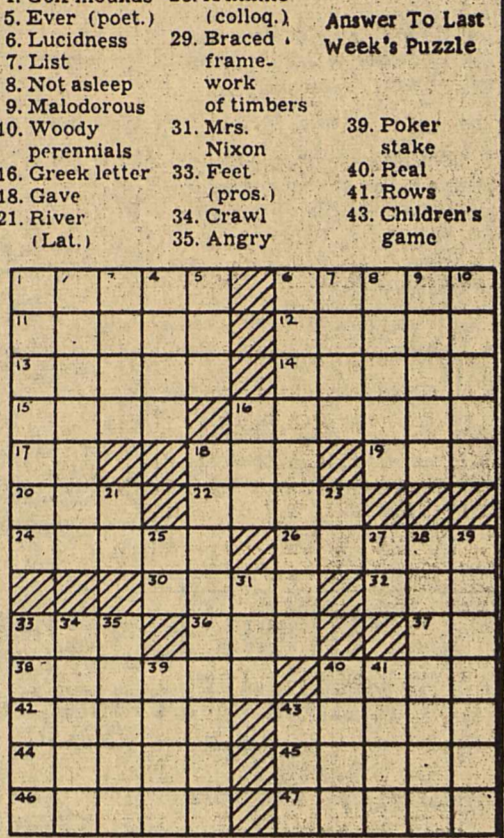

Mrs. Jones related the adventurous and glamorous personalities who molded the character of a maverick state: magnificent Sam Houston and his word-slinging, gunslinging son Temple, who once defeated Billy-the-Kid in a shooting contest; industrious, visionary Stephen Austin, Louis Juchereau de Saint-Denis, the Frenchman who stirred the Spanish into making permanent settlements in Texas, Jim Bowie, Davy Crockett, William Travis, Quanah Parker, the last of the Comanche war chiefs and many others in the stirring events of Texas history.

Group singing of Texas songs were led by Mrs. Dorman Scott with Mrs. Gene Payne accompanying at the piano.

SOIL Conservation NEWS

New and revised Conservation plans with land owners and operators are the order of business at present. This past week plans were worked out on the A.K. Gillian, E. D. Apperson, D. V. Fench, E. E. Hartley and O. L. Rettman farms along with revision of old plans on the Carl Lowery and H. O. Muston farms.

New Conservation plan maps and Conservation survey maps on which to work out new plans were ordered on the Joe Webb, D. C. Allen, John B. King and R. M. McSwain farms. Applications for assistance under the Great Plains Program were received from D. C. Allen, Joe Webb and John B. King.

This past weekend really showed the value of cover crops, crop residue use and supplemental tillage. Several land owners have reported very little soil movement where narrow row stubble has been left on the land.

Now is the time to begin land preparation for planting a crop to grow a stubble that will control erosion in Feb. & March in 1963. Plan now to put that more likely to erode land in some kind of crop that will provide extra cover when needed.

School boards, superintendents, and the general public in Texas have expressed concern that all teachers in our public schools be thoroughly prepared and that our classrooms be staffed with qualified people.

Standards for teacher education which were established pursuant to the Certification Law of 1955 required Texas colleges and universities to offer a well-balanced program of preparation. Approximately 40 per cent of the program is devoted to basic education (arts and sciences), 40 per cent to the subject to be taught, and 20 per cent to the professional preparation (teacher education).

In 1959, certain revisions in certification requirements were made to relieve some of the difficulties regarding the employment of persons with college degrees who do not qualify for one of the regular certificates. One of the major purposes of these changes was to increase the supply of teachers for Texas schools.

In 1961, the State Board of Education adopted revised standards for teacher certification to strengthen further the subject matter preparation of teachers for the subjects which they are to teach. The revised standards, which become effective September, 1962, will increase the requirements for academic specialization and the foundations in arts and sciences.

State accreditation standards are also being directed toward improving the quality of instruction by requiring that superintendent and principals assign teachers in an area or subject for which they are prepared.

The adoption of higher standards for classroom instruction in public schools will require each teacher to keep informed in regard to current developments in both content and methods of teaching. Most schools conduct in-service programs to help teachers improve their proficiency and keep up with new developments.

Curriculum improvement and change may lead to different practices in scheduling and in the use of time by both teachers and pupils. It will be necessary then to consider ways to make more effective use of the school day and of the teacher's and pupils' time.

- Questions For Consideration
1. If more written work is required of pupils, what can be done to assist teachers in grading papers, reports, and the like?
 2. Are teachers devoting the major portion of their time to instruction?
 3. Are there new ideas or developments which can be applied to assist teachers in preparation for their classes and to assist them in classroom instruction?
 4. What new developments are available which would increase the proficiency of teachers (i.e., laboratories for foreign languages and other new instructional aids)?
 5. Are there opportunities for teachers in your school to participate in in-service programs, regional workshops, and other activities to improve their teaching?
 6. Are teachers assigned to teach in the field for which they were prepared?
