

1963 Feed Grain Sign-up

According to the Yoakum County ASCS office manager farmers have through March 22, to sign up under the 1963 feed grain program.

W. M. Overton explained that under the 1963 program the total payments are larger and that the loan support price is smaller. To compare the two years the following based. on a 300 acre base and 100 index farm:

The election is set for the 2nd of April, at which time there will be elected three councilmen and the City Judge.






