Advertising can and should serve two major purposes. The most obvious is to sell a concern's goods or services,

whatever they may be. This is essential and traditional. But there can be more, very much more -- and that is advertising designed to instill faith in the system which makes it possible to produce, advertise and sell goods and services, in a climate of free-dom. The "climate" is the foundation for successful production and sales.

The Freedoms Foundation each year awards its George Washington Honor Medal-its top award--to an enterprise conducting a local advettising campaign furthering the cause of freedom.

The 1962 Medal went to the Florida Power & Light Company, which also won it in 1955. That made this ut-ility the first two-time winner of the award.

The 1962 advertising that won the honor pointed out the importance of maintaining the basic rights and privileges

of our citizens. An officer of the company has said: "We have tried, through advertising, to awaken citizens to the value of our rights and freedoms.... " Can advertsiing serve a finer purpose?







Transport Gap Needs Closing

There's a gap in the transportation tion system in Texas that badly needs closing, and there are bills now in the Legislature which would do it. They would authorize a type of small shipment transportation service not now available which would be of principal benefit to small towns and rural areas but which would benefit the large-city distribution centers as well.

Suppose you are a farmer in a race with the weather to get a crop harvested, but with machinery and crews idled for lack of a necessary small part to a piece of equipment. Or suppose you are an oil field driller or a building contractor with expensive "down time" on your hands because a vital repair rart is needed from a somewhat distant city. 



Income Tax Information

Ellis Campbell, Jr. of Internal Revenue, has warned that taxpayers who need professional help in filing Federal tax returns should select only qualified, reputable advisors. The overwhelming majority of tax advisors are competent and honest he said, but the Service does occasionally find shady characters in the guise of tax advisors. Unfortunately when they are found, the damage to the taxpayer has already been done.

Ellis Campbell, Jr. pointed out these specific danger signals. Beware of the "expert" who will not be around to answer questions after the return has been filed. Never sign a blank tax form and leave it with a stranger; this is almost like singing a blank check. Do not sign a return prepared in pencil, it can easily be changed later. Ask your advisor to sign the return

he has prepared. Reputable advisors will do so automatically. The fly-by-night expert usually will not. A void the advisor who "guarantees" refunds, wants a

percentage of any refund, or who supposedly "knows all the angles, " Be on guard if he suggests that your refund check be sent to his address.

The taxpayer is fully responsible for the contents of his return, regardless of who prepares it. The taxpayer may delegate the work of preparing a return, but he cannot dele-gate his tax liabilities or legal responsibilities.






