

Yoakum County farmers, who produced an all-time record cotton crop last year, were asking themselves this past week whether the resounding defeat of the wheat program might mean eventual elimination of cotton and o-

ther controls. One farmer put it this way: "Support prices for cotton have hiked the price so high for the consumers that synthetics are becoming an alarming competitor for the cotton price. Maybe what we need is fewer controls, even if it means a lowering of cotton prices. "

He pointed out that better farming methods make it possible to produce as much or more cotton on fewer acres, and that if restrictions were a "natural" decline in acreage would help maintain the price

of cotton somewhere in the 20-25 cent range.

Wheat Referendum

Farmers in another, Lamb, county also saw the possibility of elimination of cotton controls next year. That county which produced a record 226, 000 bales in 1962, is feeling the pinch of a 10,000-acre reduction in its cotton acreage this year. But in exchange for the lowered acreage, cotton prices have been pegged at around 32.5 cents per 1b. an increase of about three cents in the past three years.




Russians.


they're headed? These Com-







#### It Is Well To Know What Is Planned **Because Too Often Plan Is Followed**

Here is the way one group of world planners would divide the world and assign an international "peace force" to police the various regions. (See map

This map, adopted in London in 1952 by the World Association of Parliamentarians for World Government, one of many world planning groups that have been active for the last quarter-century, was researched and distributed by the National Economic Council of New York City.

The particular copy from which the engraving was made was distributed by the Christian National-ist Crusade of Los Angeles.

There is nothing official about this plan, but it is an indication of the sort of thing we would be in for should the U. S. program for disarmament and the creation of a UN Peace Force to police the world be carried out.

Despite what the architects of the U. S. disarmament program say, there is no way for a nation to re-tain its sovereignty and independence under the coercion of an international military force.

Under this World Parliament plan, U. S. troops would be stationed in:

REGION 12 — Australia. REGION 32 — Uruguay and Argentina.

Region 55 - Yugoslavia, Greece, Albania, Roumania, Bulgaria. REGION 58 — Austria, Hungary, Czechoslovakia.

REGION 75 - India, Nepal, Blutan, Tibet, East Pakistan. REGION 85 — Kazak SSR, Turk-men, Uzbeg, Tadzhik, Kirghiz SSR.

As you note from the map, Texas would fall under the Russian and Mongolian troops, the remainder of the United States under Columbian, Venezuelan, Belgian and Irish.

The planners who worked out the scheme charted on this map would set up a World Parliament made up only of appointed members. The representation of various world strengths. Thus Asia would dominate it.

There would be a World Director, eight zone directors, and 51 regional directors. None of the zone or regional directors would ever serve their own countries.

Thus an alien would command

troops stationed in what was once the United States of America, and through them enforce World Government law. National allegiance would be outlawed.

This map may not represent the precise plans of the architects who drew up the U. S. program for disarmament; but with all military and police functions concentrated in an international, or UN peace force, some sort of zoning arrangement providing for assignment of military centers and garrisons would be necessary.

This sort of planning has been going on a mong internationallyminded groups of intellectuals for a long time; but not until Septem-ber, 1961, did a major nation offer a detailed plan for negotiation, providing for an international military force to replace national defense establishments. Not only did the U.S. offer such a plan, but its Congress passed a law setting up a national agency to keep the pressure on for aggressive negotiations in this direction.



Automotive engineers say automobile engines become over-heated, not only with d-go driving but also with the speed driving of vaca-tiones. Engines are designed to be cooled by plain water. Anti-freeze, installed to keep water from freezing during winter months, transfers heat efficiently during this period, but is no longer so effective when warmer weather arrives. Ethylene glycol, base of all-winter anti-freezes, forces metal temperatures higher than normal.

ITEM: If you live in an area where the water is hard, you can have cleaner clothes, dishes—and children-by having a water softener installed. The softener will also eliminate "rings" in the bathtub and lavatory.



From Buelah Flood, Ponce de eon, Missouri: "From experince, I believe I can qualify as an oldtimer. When I was a little girl walked about four miles to school, 9 months of the year, car rying dinner in a gallon syrup bucket. We usually had corn bread, butter and molasses, shared y three sisters and myself.

Mother made us wear long un derwear until the first day of May We took our shoes off then, and went barefoot until fall.

I remember as a young lady wore high button shoes. It never failed-when I was in a hurry to go some place, we couldn't find the button hook. After getting a shoe about half buttoned up with a wire hair pin, a button would pop off.

We never saw a mattress, but slept instead on straw beds. I have pounded sand rocks into sand and scrubbed floors many time-and drank water from an old gourd dipper."

From Eloise Doil, Nebo, Illinois: I remember when everyone worked hard and school children needed no 'centers' for recreation. They had plenty to do, helping with chores such as carrying in wood and carrying out ashes, feeding hogs and chickens, gathering eggs and milking cows.

Boys went to school only during winter as in the spring and fall they were needed to help with the farm work. Some still say those were the 'good old days.' One of today's worries was absent as no one ever tried to 'keep up with the Jones.' "

### **Small Farmers Played Big Role In Wheat Referendum**

(By Congressional Quarterly) WASHINGTON — Administra-tion farm planners are now willing to agree with the American Farm Bureau Federation that many wheat farmers are tired of federal controls to stem wheat overproduction and want to try some sort of non-compulsory program.

But they feel that the repudia-tion of controls in the May 21 wheat referendum was not as sweeping as it appears. Although it is difficult to isolate

all of the factors involved in the vote, the following patterns emerge: Small Wheat Farmers

The votes of farmers with 15 acres or less are thought to have been cast overwhelmingly against controls, except in the South.

Some observers have calculated that if the "small" farm votes were excluded from the results of the referendum, there would have been a majority-if not two-thirds -in favor of controls among the remaining voters, who were those with regular farm allotments for

ificate controls. The Farm Bureau conducted a campaign to persuade these small farmers to sign up and them vote "no" in order to maintain their freedom. Figures released May 19 by the Agriculture Department showed that 733,800 15-acre wheat farms

had signed up to participate, as compared to 558,700 eligible farms with regular allotments. Many of the "small" wheat farmers were livestock, dairy or feedgrains farmers who planted a small amount of wheat as a side-
