A small booklet entitled "Civil Rights and Legal Wrongs" found its way to my desk this week, and I found some pretty interesting reading in it. It was published by the Virginia Commission on Constitutional Government and has to do with President Kennedy's proposed Civil Rights Bill (S. 1731.) One installment from the

pages of the book goes like

"The logic is said to go something like this: All decent Americans should support good things. All decent Americans should oppose bad things. Racial discrimination are good things. The President's pending Civil Rights
Bill is intended to prohibit racial discrimination. There-fore, his bill is a good thing, and all decent Americans should support it.

If this were all there were to it--if the problem were as simple as A plus B, and therefore C -- nothing could be gained by further discussion of the President's proposal. All decent Americans would be of one mind.

But the problems that have produced this bill are not easy problems, and the bill is not a simple bill. One of the great distinctions of the American system is that we try always to distinguish between the goal itself, and the way in which a goal is reached. Such careful distinctions need to be made in this case.

We believe this bill is a very bad bill. In our view, the means here proposed are the wrong means. The weapons the President would contrive against race prejudice are the wrong weapons. In the name of acheiving certain certain "rights" for one group of citizens, this bill would impose some fateful compulsions on another group of citizens. The bill may be wellintentioned -- we question no man's motivation in supporting it--but good intentions are not enough. In this area, we need



intent to defraud is much better under the law. If the writer of the check does not make it good within ten days after receiving notice, the worth-less check then becomes prima facie evidence that the person had intentions to defraud and also had knowledge of the fact of insufficient funds.

Yoakum County Attorney Vernon Townes has reminded that the address of the person writing the check must be on the check. This is to be used as the address to which the notification, either certified letter or telegram, must be sent, informing the writer his check did not clear the bank.

Beginning today J. P. Court will no longer handle any worthless check complaints, as now any check written for an amount less than \$50 will be handled in county court, and amounts over that figure will be a matter for district court.

First conviction for writing worthless check to defraud draws punishment of imprisionment in county jail for up to two years and a fine of up to \$1,000. The beginnings of it all were to have been today with the pre - registration of the first grade pupils.

A lot of groans can be heard from some of the pupils who have to start back to the old

grind now, but secretly most of them admit they are about ready to go back, And, of course, most adults are ready for it to start, so someone, anyone, else can mind the kids for awhile, and of course there is the prospect of a real exciting season of football in the offing.
The buses will begin run -

ning their regular routes on next Thursday, which is reg-

istration day.

On Friday, the regular schedule will be gone through on something of a practice

basis, and individual schedules will be adjusted. This, explained D. N. Taylor, high school principal, does away with a good part of the confusion usually experienced on the first regular day of school, which will be on Monday, the second day of September.

Mothers of first grade pupils are asked to accompany their children to school on next Thursday, and are re-minded that their children, under state law, are required to have their immunization shots.

Sewell stated that he has completely changed the offensive pattern for this year, in that he has gone to a multiple "T" formation. This type of pattern has an infinite number of variations and possibilities to it. Some of the uses it will be put to here this season, Sweell said, are such things as single wing power plays; slot and wing variations using either halfback, and a brand new, and so far very

impressive, wing "T" sweep

The plays are all new this year, and Sewell reports that he is very heartened with the speed that the Cowboys have picked them up so far. He says there are six series

of plays and as many as six or eight plays in each series. The Cowboys have covered the entire six series of plays in workout already this week, and are reported to have ad-

apted to them very well. On Wednesday work was begun on the team's defense, as well as a concentration on some of the basic fundamentals of the game, but Sewell explained he thought it was absolutely necessary for the team to have first become very well acquainted with the new offensive structure before

this could be started. As things look now, Sweell said, we will have a very well balanced team this year, with somewhat more depth in the backfield than last year.

The Cowboys' opening tilt this year will be a real test of determination. They travel to Crane, a class AA foe, with 14 returning lettermen.

CITE NEED FOR I. D. NO 'S

In Texas both husbands and wives will need a taxpayer identification number for future income tax filing, according to John J. Sloan, the Administrative Officer at the Lubbock office of Internal Revenue Service.

"The community property law creates many situations where both husband and wife have income that belongs to only one spouse in other states, " Mr. John J. Sloan explained. "Quite a few wives feel that they do not need a taxpayer identification, or social security, number, because they file a joint return with their hasband. There are times when it is to their advantage to file separate returns. Naturally, the wife can not report her share of dividends, interest and other income on a separate return withoug having a taxpayer identification number in filing a joint return because of the community property law In Texas.

Taxpayers who do not have identification number should secure a Form SS - 5 from their nearest Post Office, Internal Revenue Service date to confront his electorate designated candidate. office, or Social Security as intimately as does the local Office, complete the application and get a number assigned.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL
AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED
ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE
HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1963.
SENARTE JOINT RESOLUTION
NO. 1 proposing an amendment to
Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the
Constitution of the State of Texas
so as to repeal the provision making
payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for
the registration of all voters.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG. TEXAS:
Section 1. That Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read, respectively, as follows:
"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and who age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in try during this time. . . . 1. God deals with nations as

with individuals.

States and who shall have resided in this state one year next preceding an election and the last six months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces; and provided further, that before offering to vote at an election a voter shall have registered if required by law to do so. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. This Amendment shall take effect on December 1, 1963.

"Section 4. In all elections by the people the vote shall be by secret hallot. The Legislature shall provide for the numbering of ballots and make such other regulations as may be necessary to detect and punish fraud and preserve the purity of elections, and may provide by law for the registration of all voters. Should the Legislature enact a registration law in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such law shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election be held on the first Saturday at the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"Monarch" Composition CHICAGO - An electronic computer and the Relay communications satellite were employed together on Monday, June 10 in an historic demonstration of high-speed transoceanic automatic typesetting of computer-processed newspaper copy.


The two-way demonstration was conducted by the Radio Corporation of America and the Harris-Intertype Corporation at the ANPA Production Management Conference at the Palmer House here. It was presented in cooperation with the National Aeronautics and Space Administration and with newspapers in England and Scotland and press wire services on both sides of the Atlantic Ocean and in Brazil.


Camden, the copy was line-justified and hyphenated by an RCA 301 computer and then flashed through NASA's Relay communications satellite for automatic typesetting minutes later on Intertype Monarchs at the Manchester Guardian, the Glasgow Herald, and the Edinburg Scotsman in Great Britain.

> In the second part of the demonstration, news stories were filed for transmission back through the Relay satellite to the RCA 301 at Camden by correspondents of the Associated Press in London and the United Press International at Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. At Camden, the computer again translated the copy into taped instructions and transmitted them over the new RCA TIES facility to Chicago for typesetting on the Monarch in operation at Harris-Intertype's exhibit.

The copy which originated at the ANPA Conference in Chicago in the form of teleprinter signals was received in Camden, where the RCA 301 evaluated each line, word-spaced and hyphenated where necessary to fit the column-width of each newspaper involved. Within seconds, the copy was sent onward to the NASA ground station at Nutley, N.J., and transmitted via RELAY I to the British ground station at Goonhilly Downs in Cornwall. Post Office landlines carried the signals to London, and leased circuits carried them onward to Manchester, Glasgow, and Edinburgh where they were transformed immediately into newspaper type by their high-speed keyboardless Intertype linecasting machines which are in daily operation.



PRINTING HISTORY was made at the 1963 ANPA Conference with an RCA 301 computer, NASA's RELAY I communications satellite, and the high-speed Intertype "Monarch" linecasting machine. News copy originating in Chicago was set in type automatically and almost instantaneously by newspapers in Britain using Monarchs, after being processed by the computer for column-width and hyphenation, and then sent across the Atlantic Ocean by the RCA-



Reversing the circuit described above, copy from AP in London and UPI in Rio de Janeiro was transmitted via Relay I to the RCA 301 in New Jersey, then fed to this Intertype Monarch at the Harris-Intertype exhibit in the Palmer House. Visiting newsmen witnessed the historic demonstration.

Did you know that in the Plains region of Texas about a similar problem that another irrigator has been con-High Plains region of Texas under ground water is a depletable resource?

For most of you who read this article, this is an elery question. Nearly adult who is capable of ng and who has lived in this area for any appreciable length of time knows that, for practical purposes, when the same manner as coal, gold, or oil is mined from its subterranean hiding place. Nature does not replace the water nearly so rapidly as it is pumped.

Knowing full well that these are the facts concerning the underground water supply with which we've been encowed, some irrigators still do not recognize a need for personal responsibility in the field of

water conservation.

An official with the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District has been contacted and asked about the end results that wasteful pra-

ctices will bring about.
Tom McFarland, Manager of the Water District, was asked, "Why do some irrigators allow water to run off their cropland into the road bar - ditches and dry lake

His answer was enlightening. "In working with problems of waste, we're attempting to change a habit - we think a very bad habit - that has been formed during years of irrigating and allowing water to escape the land. In many cases the fellow has been doing it that way so long that it's become second-nature to him. He may not even realize that he is actually wasting water. He may feel that losing water is just part of irrigating.

"Of course, this is where our job enters the picture in convincing him that the water he wastes is water that brings absolutely no benefits to anyone and acutally costs him money to pump. "
We then asked McFarland

about the power that the Water District has to enforce their rules against waste.

He said, "under the provisions of the law, we have the right to initiate legal proceedings against those who waste water. If we can prove to the court that waste is occurring, then an order will be issued by the court ordering that it be stopped.

"Of course, this process is not only expensive but it is also unpleasant. As a result, before we resort to legal action we attempt to convince the irrigator that too much is at stake for him to continue the

practice of wasting water. "We talk to him about declining water levels, about the economics involved in continued waste, and about the moral and political aspects concerned.

"Most people don't want to waste water for the pure pleasure of wasting it. They simply are taking the path of least resistance.

McFarland was then asked about progress that the Water District is making in alleviating waste.

"Definite progress is being made, "he said, "at least a third of our staff is devoting practically full time to waste problems. When a waste situation is called to our attention, we visit the locale and to the one who has the problem.

Solution To Farm Surplus Chemurgenetics is a new

word for a relatively new field. Simply put, it describes the process of breeding plants for specific industrial uses -- a sort off "you name it, we'll grow it" process.

In chemurgenetics an indusry determines the properties it wants in an agricultural raw material; then the geneticist, working with the chemist, attempts to breed those properties in an agricultural crop. Chenurgenetics is research aimed in a positive direction toward crops that will have an immediate demand.

Recently the USDA and corn refining companies participated in a chemurgenetic effort to increase the amulose content of corn. Pure amylopectstarch has important applications as a thickening

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT
