PASS ORDINANCE

The Plains City Dads, in a special meeting this week, passed a couple of new ordinances, one of which I think can be of tremendous value to Plains and to the over-all business economy of Plains. It is the Peddler's Ordin-

ance, a full rendition of which is carried elsewhere in this edition of the Record.

In its essence, the Ordinance will have the effect of putting resident, home-town businesses here on an equal footing with sales vans and itenerate peddlers which at present are coming into Plains in profusion.

As was pointed out some time ago, the situation here without such an ordinance is that the local businessman is expected to pay taxes, support every local project of a civic nature, and still be able to compete with these out-oftown retail vendors on an equal basis, when all the vendor has as far as local investment is concerned is a van or some kind of delivery wagon, that he uses in several other towns

Under the new ordinance which becomes effective in three weeks, the out-of-town retail vendor, if he wishes to continue to do business in the City of Plains, will have to become licenses to do so, and that license will cost on the basis of \$25 per month for the business and \$2 per agent. This covers all retail vendors. and those wholesale vendor who make a practice of selling retail on the side.

A strictly wholesale vendor

ded in this vein. A wholesa-ler is one who sells a local business goods that will be resold locally by the local business. A retail vendor is that seller who sells merchandise to a local business or individual to be used by that business or individual.

This applies to service type businesses as well as to goods dispensers.



Petition Being Circulated

A petition, which is being circulated in Yoakum County currently, reads as follows:

"The undersigned, being free holders of that subdivision of Yoakum County, Texas, hereinafter described, in accordance with article 6930 and 6954 of the Revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas, to order an election to be held in the subdivision hereinafter described, such election to be held on the fifth day of November, 1963, for the purpose of enabling the free holders of the hereinafter described subdivision of Yoakum County, to determine whether cattle, horses, mules, jacks, jennets, donkeys, hogs, sheep and goats shall be permitted to run at large in the following described subdivision of Yoakum County, Texas, such sub-division being as follows:

That part of Yoakum County, Texas, lying south of the north block line of blocks, D. John H. Gibson survey, and block K, public school land survey, Yoakum County, Fexas.:" signers are needed to enable the petition to be presented to Commissioners Court, and expectation is that the Court will call the election as as so coincide with the general election on November 5.

It was brought to light that it was made a requirement of farmers and ranchers using land in Yoakum County to erect fences for the confining of domestic farm animals, in an election held in 1946.

There was recently revealed however, that although the present law covers about every kind of animal imaginable that oversight had been made in that cattle were omitted.

The area described in the

petition includes about all of Yoakum County, but due to existing state law an entire county cannot be so regulated, but any portion of a county can. The area in the petition omitts only a very small strip on the norther side of Yoakum County.

Move Made To Water District

In an article run in this week's edition of the Seminole Sentinel a story concerning the possible formation of a new water district which. all probability, would take in all of Gaines and Yoakum Counties, as well as all or parts of other adjoining counties. Each of the cars involved had four children as passengers none of which were seriously injured.


Mrs. Sewell and the children were taken back to Brownfield where they secured transportation back to Plains.


Association has tiled a tormal request with the Texas Water Commission asking that the and define boundries of the area's underground water.

Findings of the Texas Water commission in its underground water survey would delineate the boundaries of the proposed water district. Once the boundaries are defined, the associations then would petition the Water Commission for an election to establish the water district.

of a water district in this area and many Yoakum Citizens have expressed a desire for the local governing bodies to take the matter into consideration.

Just when the Texas Water Commission will make its survey was not yet known.

The idea of a water district for protection of area water resourceses is not a new one as it developed a few years ago but nothing came of it. The idea was brought again when several area irrigation wells were found to have been polluted with brine.

Putting new action behind the idea was the recent development of an oil field secondary recovery project in southwestern Ga ines County which is estimated to require ap-

proximately 7,000,000 gallons of fresh water daily over a period of two years.

Water Association men said that while the recovery project in itself posses no particular threat to the area's fresh water supply, the possibility of such project developing over the county could creat a threat and in danger water resources.

An ordinance defining and regulating itinerant merchants, itenerant vendors, and peddlers, and persons selling or taking orders for good, or wares, merchandise, services, photographs, newspapers, magazines, or subscriptions to newspapers or magazines providing for a license fee, requiring a bond, repealing ordinances, and providing penalties for the violation of this ordinance.

Be it ordained by the City of Plains, Texas

Section 1 This entire ordinance is and shall deemed an exercise of the police power of the State of Texas, and of the City of Plains, for the public safety, comfort, conthe City and citizens of said City, and all of the provisions hereof shall be construed for the accomplishment of that

Section 2. That it shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to go from house to house of from place to place in the City of Plains, Texas, soliciting, selling or taking orders for or offering for sale or taking orders for any good, wares, merchandise, services, photographs, newspapers, magazines, or subscriptions to newspapers or magazines, without first applied for and obtained a license to do so from the City Secretary of said City. It shall also be herafter unlawful to sell or solicit in said City as aforesaid without carrying such license while engaged in such soli-

citing or selling. Section 3. That any person desiring to go from house to house or from place to place in the City of Plains, Texas, to sell or solicit orders for goods, wares, merchandise, services, photographs, newspapers, magazines, or subscriptions to newspapers or magazines, shall make written application to the City Secretary of Said City for a license to do so, which application shall show the name and address of applicant, the name and address of the person firm or corporation, if any and whether such applicant upon any such sale or order shall demand, accept or receive payment or deposit of

delivery, and the period of time such applicant wishes to sell or solicit in said City. Section 4. The applica-tion mentioned in paragraph 3 hereof shall be accompanied by a bond in the penal sum of \$1,000.00, signed by application and the applicant and surety company authorized to do business in the State of

ness shall be carried on for a period of less than six (6) months, then such shall be presumptive evidence that such person, firm, or corporation is and will be an itinerant vendor under this ordinance. Section 6. That the license fee for in itinerant merchant or ininerant vendor shall be \$25.00 per month. Provided however, when any person, firm, company, partnership, corporation or association engages in any activity menioned in paragraph 2 hereof through one or more agents or employees such person, firm, company, partnership, corporation or association shall, in addition to said \$25,00 fee above mentioned, pay a license fee of \$2.00 for each agent or employee so engaged, all of which licenses shall be valid for one (1) month from the date of their issuance. Any person, firm or corporation violating any provision of this ordinance or failing to observe any provision hereof shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not less than \$10,00 and not more than \$200.00 and every day or fraction of day during which this ordinance, or any part hereof, shall be deemed a seperate offense and punishable as such.

Section 9. Each and every provision, paragraph, sentence and clause of this ordinance has been seperately considered and passed by the City Council and each said provision would have been seperately passed without any other provision, and if any provision hereof should be ineffective, invalid, or unconstitutional for any cause it shall not impair. effect the remaining portion nor any other part thereof, but the valid portion shall be enforced just as if it had been passed alone, and all other ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict hereith are hereby repealed.

Section 10. This ordinance shall take effect and be in

force from and after its passage and publication as provided by the laws of the State of Texas.

Section 4: Contract Required: Before the City of Plains, Yoakum County, Texas, shall construct any sewer and/or water and/or gas extensions under the terms of this ordinance a contract shall be entered into between said owner or owners and the City of Plains. Texas acting by its City Manager such contract to provide for deposit and repayment only according to the terms of this ordinance and no other contract shall be authorized to be entered into by and between than as herein specifically provided. Section 5: Water and Gas Service Connections. The

City of Plains, shall install and maintain all water and gas service connections, complete, including meters and meter boxes, in the streets and alleys, or easements both inside and outside of the City limits of the City of Plains, and shall charge for the installation and maintenance of such complete service connections, in accordance with the following schedule: On services larger than one

(1) inches in diameter, an estimate will be made of the total cost of the service, by the City, and such estimated amount shall be deposited with the City of Plains before work is tarted on such connection, the final cost shall be adjusted upon completion of the work and if the actual cost is higher than the estimate cost, the increased cost shall be paid to the City before service is furnished through the connection if the actual cost is less than the estimated cost, the City will refund the difference to the party making the original

Section 6: Penalty: Any person, firm or corporation that shall ciolate any of the

provisions of this ordinance, provisions of this ordinance, or fail to comply with any of the requirements hereof, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be hable for a fine for not more than \$100.00 and each day such violation exists shall constitute a separate offense. The owner or owners of the premises of part thereof where any item is in violation of this ordiance shall be placed or shall exist, or any builder, contractor, agent, person, firm or corporation employed i connection therwith and wh has assisted in the commission of any violation of the terms of this ordinance shall be guilty of a separate offense and upon conviction shall be fined as herein provided.

Section 7: Validity of ordinance: If any section, paragraph, a subdivision, cause, phrase, or provision of this ordinance shall be adjudged in valid or held unconstitutional, the same shall not affect the validity of this ordinance as a whole or any part of provision thereof, other than the part so decided to be valte or unconstitutional.

All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict of this ordinance are hereby repealed and this ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after its passage and publication as required by law.



BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read, respectively, as follows:

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this state one year next preceding an election and the last six months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces; and provided further, that before offering to vote at an election a voter shall have registered if required by law to do so. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. This Amendment shall take effect on December 1. 1963.







The use of cotton in the manufacture of flexible laminated plastics offers a good possibility for expansion of the fibers industrial market, says

the U. S. Department of Agri-

culture. In the making of plastic la-minates, cotton fabrics are incorporated as a surface material or as a textile backing for plastic film, sheets, of foam. Vinylcoated cotton fabrics are widely used in furniture and automobile upholstery, and in

wall coverings. Also, new types of lamints with plastic foams may create an even lar-ger market for cotton in the clothing industry, says the Department.

At present, strong, rigid high pressure laminates are the main type made with cotton, but this use offers little promise of expanding the demand for cotton. Low pressure, flexible laminate production does not now use large amounts of cotton and this is the area which scientists see as one of possible

expansion.
The USDA's Economic Research Service says three things are needed to help cotton increase its share of the flexible laminate market. First, cotton cloth must be free of field trash and e :ess sizing for good lamena on; cotton must have inpro id finishes such as one to increase the fabric's moisture resistance; and it needs new and more acceptable cloth construction for use in la-

If these problems can be solved, cotton should gain a bigger share of the market for flexible laminated plastic production, says the USDA.

However, Postmaster Hayes noted that he had received instructions not to accept mailings other than first class, air mail and air parcel post which are destined for points farther than the second postal zone, which is generally approximately 150 miles from Plains for the duration of the rail strike tail strike, if it occurs.

"We are prepared to handle any letters or parcels addressed to any point provided first class or air mail postage is paid on the items, 'Postmaster Hayes'

But he cautioned that service will be temporairly suspended on 2nd class magazines and newspapers, third class matter and fourth class parcel post packages addressed to points beyond the second parcel post zone - extending 150 miles from the point of mailing--as part of the national post office contingency phan for operating under the rail strike

Postmaster Hayes advised mailers that any emergency shipment, such as medicine or badly needed spare parts, should be sent first class or air mail during the strike, if it occurs, and if the shipment demands delivery beyond the second postal zone. Perishable items, such as baby chickens and honey bees, should not be mailed for the duration of the strike, if it occurs, he recommended,

Mailing of items covered by the temporary and limited

service suspension, deposited at post offices immediately prior to the strike, will be made at the risk of the mailer. The Department cannot guarantee early delivery of perishable items and other than first class and air mail parcels, letters and other matter if they are in transit at the time the strike commen-

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
