Call County Park Election

May 15 has now officially been designated as the date when the proposed bond issue for the purpose of constructing a Yoakum County Park, will be brought before the voters of Yoakum County.

The proposal to build the park has been a subject of very wide-spread interest throughout the county for the last several weeks.

A blow-up of one of the buildings that would be built on the park grounds is shown

in the picture at the top of this page.

It is the picture of the recreational building, which is to be provided for and made available for the use of County civic, professional, and social clubs, as well as for purely social functions and for such groups as the Boy and Girl Scouts of both Plains and Denver City.

As called, the issue is for a total of not more than \$235,000.00 worth of bonds, to

mature in not more than 20 years, at an interest rate of not more than 3.75%.

A complete election order can be found with all the information on page 2 of this issue of The Record.

It has been explained that in order to qualify as a voter in this election that a person must be a legal resident of Yoakum County who has paid his poll tax and has rendered his property, personal or real estate for taxation to the Co. Assessor.

Land for the construction of the park was donated for

this purpose by Mr. Gane Bennett of Denver City. The park will contain at least 160 acres.

To be included in the park will be a nine-hole golf course, the recreation building, 24 picnic units, a softball diamond, shuffleboard courts, horseshoe courts, swings, slides, scout council rings, kids fishing lake and a total of 1200 trees.

County Commissioners' Court has stated that this issue will definitely not cause a tax rate rise as it can and will be worked in to the present indebtedness payoff schedule.

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May 2 Primary Ballots Noted

Absentee balloting is still underway in Yoakum County in connection with the May 2 Democratic Primary and will continue through April 28.

A sample ballot, an exact replica of the one that will be used by County voters on election day can be seen on page 5 of this week's issue of The Record so that area voters may have the opportunity to see exactly who is running for each of the many posts both

locally and on a State level. It should be noted that only those area citizens with "paid" poll tax receipts are eligible to vote in this or in the second primary election slated to be held in June.

Texas citizens who have poll tax receipts of the unpaid variety are eligible to vote in only the General Election in November and then only for candidates seeking National Offices.

Drivers License Suspensions

A total of 15 citizens of Yoakum County had their driver's license either suspended or were denied a license during the year 1963. Of this total, 11 persons had their licenses suspended and 4 persons were denied a license.

Some of the major reasons for suspensions and denials of licenses included driving while drinking, 11; automatic suspension offense in other states 2; driving while license suspended, 1; and committed automatic suspension offense 1.

During the year, 25,022 licenses were suspended with 8,632 licenses denied over the state. Drivers in the 20 year-old bracket had the most licenses suspended with 1,307. The 19 year-olds ran a close awarded as the grand prize for the evening. It went to a musical group from Brownfield, called the "Rookies."

second with 1,305 suspended. The oldest driver who had his license suspended was 96 years of age, with one driver 95 years of age who denied a license.

The above information was obtained from the records of the Texas Department of Public Safety. The D. P. S. is required by law to file every application for a driver's license received by it. These records include the name of every licensee to whom licenses are granted, and the name of every licensee whose driver's license or driving privilege has been cancelled, denied, suspended or revoked and after each such name note the reasons for such action.

The Department shall also file all accident reports and abstracts of court records of convictions received by it under the laws of this state and in connection therewith maintain convenient records or

make suitable notations in order that individual record of each licensee showing the convictions of such licensee and the traffic accidents in which he has been involved shall be

readily ascertainable and available for the consideration of the Department upon any application for the renewal of a driver's license and at other suitable times.

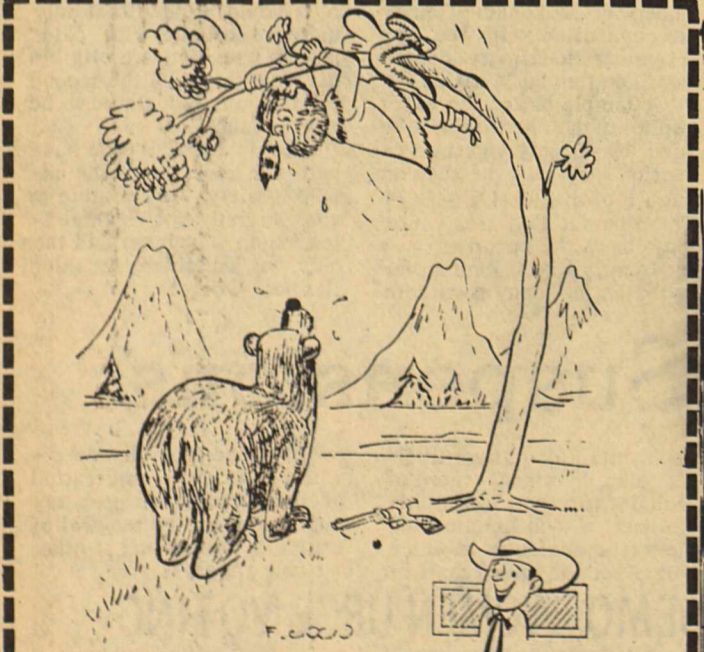

ELECTION ORDER

THE STATE OF TEXAS
COUNTY OF YOAKUM

ON THIS, the 17th day of April, 1964, the Commissioners' Court of Yoakum County, Texas, convened in regular session at the regular meeting place thereof in the Court-house at Plains, Texas, the following members of the Court, to-wit:

STANLEY DUVAL, COUNTY JUDGE, Presiding;
VANCE W. BROWN, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 1;

H. C. COTTON, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 2;

RAYMOND BOOKOUT, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 3;

Mrs. PAUL LOE, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 4;

being present, and, among other proceedings had were the following:

WHEREAS, the Commissioners' Court of Yoakum County, Texas, deems it advisable to submit to the resident qualified taxpayers voters of said County, who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, a proposition for the issuance of bonds of said County for the purpose hereinafter stated; therefore

BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF YOAKUM COUNTY, TEXAS:

That an election be held in said County on the 15th day of May, 1964, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified taxpayers electors who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon:

"SHALL the Commissioners' Court of Yoakum County, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said County in the principal sum of TWO HUNDRED THIRTY FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$235,000), to mature serially at such times as may be deemed most expedient by the Commissioners' Court of said County, not later than twenty (20) years from the date there-

of, to bear interest at a rate not to exceed THREE AND THREE FOURTHS PER CENT (3-3/4%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal at maturity for purchasing and/or improving lands for County Parks; pursuant to authority conferred by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly Section 9, Article 6 of the Constitution, Chapter 1, Title 22 and Article 6081e, V. A. T. C. S., as amended?"

THAT said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly Chapter 1, Title 22, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, and all persons who are legal voters of said Yoakum County, Texas, and who are resident property taxpayers of said County, and who have duly rendered their property for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V. A. T. C. S., Election Code, as amended, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF PARK BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF PARK BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

AS TO THE FOREGOING proposition each voter shall mark out the statement FOR the proposition or the statement AGAINST the proposition, so that the statement remaining shall indicate the way he wishes to vote.

ABSENTEE VOTING shall be conducted at the County Clerk's Office in the Court-house, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 424, Acts of the 58th Legislature, Regular Session, 1963.

THE POLLING PLACES and presiding officers of said election shall be respectively as follows:

PRECINCT NUMBER 3, POLLING PLACE, Sheriff's Office Courthouse Plains, Texas, PRESIDING JUDGE, Sherm Henard

PRECINCT NUMBER 4, POLLING PLACE, Tax Assessor's Office, Courthouse, Plains, Texas, PRESIDING JUDGE, Johnny Fitzgerald.

PRECINCT NUMBER 5, POLLING PLACE, C. & S. Gin, Turner Community PRESIDING JUDGE, Alton Elmore.

THE MANNER of holding such election shall be governed by the General Laws of the State of Texas regulating General Elections, except as modified by the provisions of Chapter 1, Title 22, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended.

A COPY of this order, signed by the County Judge of said County and certified by the County Clerk of said County, shall serve as proper and sufficient notice of such election. NOTICE OF SAID ELECTION shall be given by posting and publication of a copy of this order, at the top of which shall appear the words "NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS"; said notice shall be posted at each of the election precincts of said County and at the County Courthouse not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published in Yoakum County, Texas, the first of said publications to be made not less than fourteen (14) days prior to the date set for said election.

The above and foregoing order having been read, it was moved by Commissioner Brown and seconded by Commissioner Cotton that the same do pass.

Consumers - Businessmen Get Federal Protection

by Paul Rand Dixon
Chairman of the Federal Trade Commission

For almost half a century, the Federal Trade Commission has worked to keep the American market place both fair and free. And under the Kennedy-Johnson Administration, this task has assumed new importance.

Both the late President Kennedy, and now President Johnson, have shown persistent interest in the consumer. Just last February, President Johnson appointed Esther Peterson his special advisor for consumer problems.

Esther Peterson and the Kennedy-Johnson Administration's interest in consumer problems are a welcome supplement to the efforts of the FTC.

In 1914, Congress wisely decided that laws were going to be needed to protect consumers

in this country from unethical and even ruthless business practices. The FTC was created and given broad power to move against "unfair methods of competition in commerce, and unfair or deceptive acts or practices in commerce."

With this wide authority, the FTC has attacked thousands of devious schemes. The largest category is the area of fictitious pricing wherein goods are falsely advertised as bargains.

Typical examples are "bait" advertising in which customers, lured into a store by a spectacular bargain not intended to be sold, are "switched" to other purchases. Exaggerated claims for the efficacy of drugs and cosmetics are familiar. And misrepresentations as to the quality of products, selling used products as new, and misrepresentations as to the quality of products have led to FTC action.

In addition, the FTC regulates, under separate authority, the labeling of furs and textiles so that a buyer can be sure the products are made of the material claimed on the label.

Cases before the FTC may arise in several ways. Sometimes a businessman feels his competitor in chicanery, or a consumer who believes he has been bilked by a dishonest merchant may write the Commission about the matter. Or, the FTC may act at the behest of Con-

Facts about Fire and Clean-Up

All who hold any office in the church are accountable to God for being honest in the sight of God and men. Leaders of men in every station in life have responsible positions and the very dig-

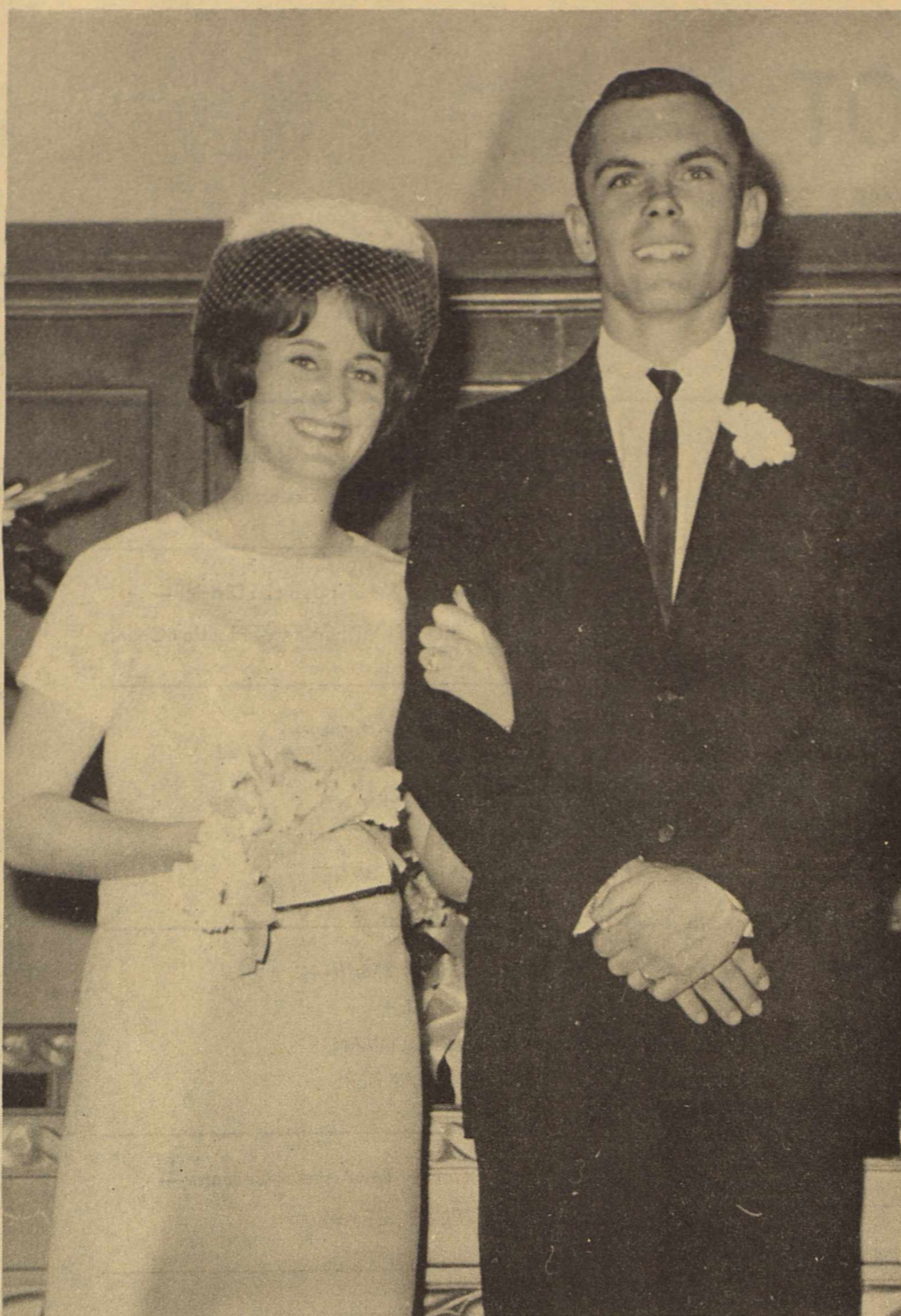
nity of their office demands that they be honest. God put them there to do right and then to see to it that those who do wrong are punished.
