YOAKUM COUNTY BUDGET

A public hearing on the Yoakum County budget for the fiscal year, 1964-65 was held at 10 a. m. Monday in the Commissioners' Court Room in the Courthouse here.

The budget, as drawn up, amounts to \$1,069,643, which is a \$15,000 increase over the budget for the county last year, but it was reported that no need for increase in taxes is anticipated at this time.

In the Monday meeting, approval, as was expected, for the budget was unanimously given.

In other business conducted by the Court that day, it was decided that Gene Bennett, his wife, Vera, and their minor children, should be granted full use of the facilities of the proposed Yoakum County Park but that they should not be charged for their use.

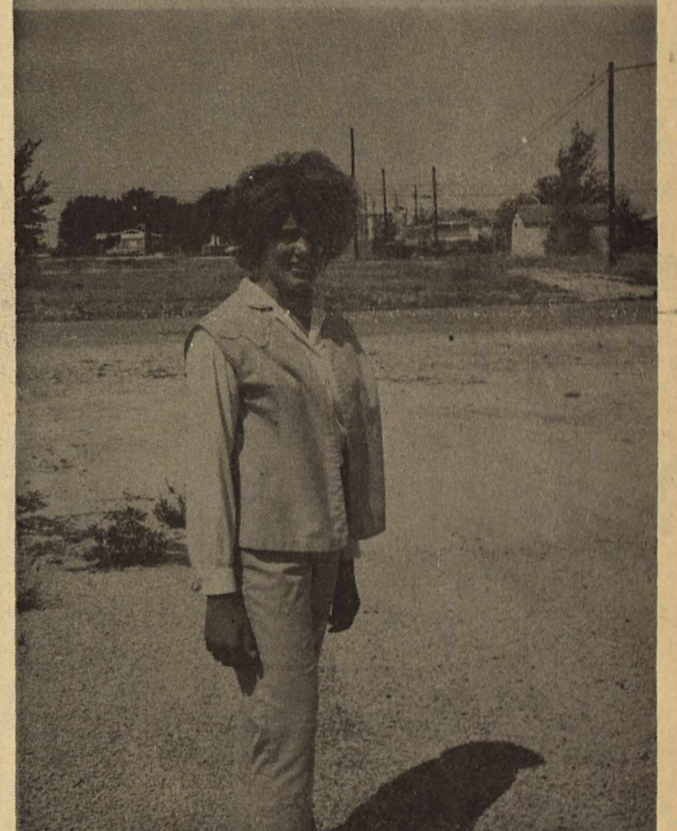
MISS DIANNE FITZGERALD -- Junior Girl Champ



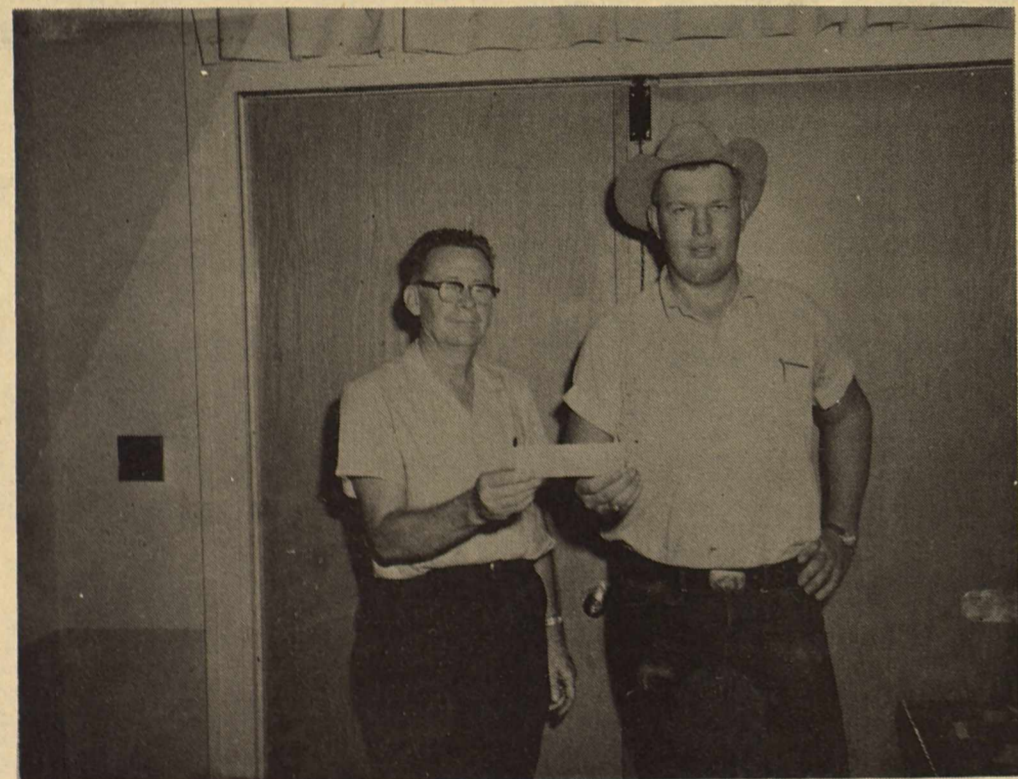
KENNETH MCGINTY -- Senior Boy Champ

GEORGE MAHON SENDS TELEGRAM

A telegram, received by The Record just before press time today from U. S. Rep. George Mahon in Washington, revealed the following:

"U. S. Department of Agriculture offer haying and

grazing privileges on diverted crop land in Yoakum Co. through October 31 as a result of the prolonged drought.

This action will give ASC Committee authority to permit livestock grazing and hay

harvesting on land diverted from crop production under the Conservation Reserve and under the Feed Grain and the Wheat Diversion program.

Farmers are required to obtain approval from the local

ASC Committee before grazing or haying.

Downward adjustments will be made in payments to farms where these lands are grazed or harvested for hay.

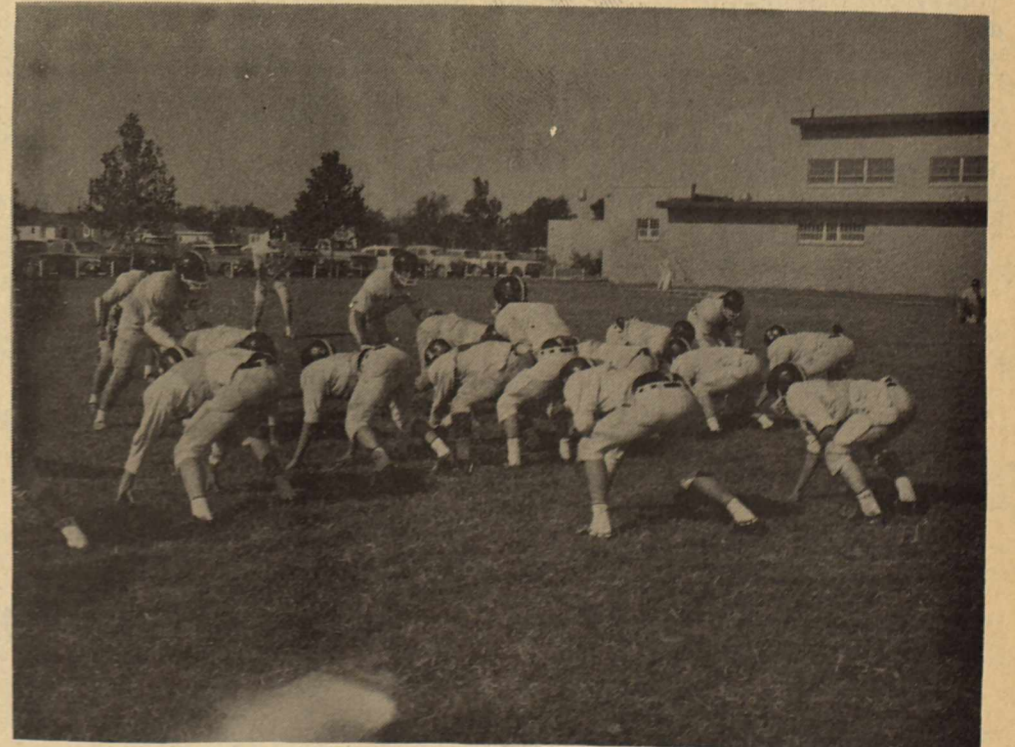

Begin Price Support Payments

Dallas Powell received the first Price Support payment in Yoakum County issued under the new 1964-65 Domestic Cotton Allotment Program.

The check in the amount of \$365.76 is the tenant's 3/4 share of the farm's domestic allotment payment; and is based on the normal yield established for the farm times three and one-half cents per pound times the domestic allotment. The above check

was presented to the Yoakum County farmer by W. M. Overton, ASCS Office Manager, on August 17.

Dallas farms the cropland on the Murphey Luna Ranch, and the cropland is dry land, not irrigated. The farm's effective cotton allotment is 113.7, and the domestic allotment is 76.2.

According to the local ASCS records, most all the dry land farmers will be in compliance

with the domestic allotment, and will participate in the price support payments. The domestic allotment in most cases is 87 per cent of the effective allotment on farms with an effective allotment of 22.4 acres or more.

To be eligible for the price support payment on the domestic allotment on farms with an effective allotment of more than 15 acres, the feed grain base on the farm must not be exceeded.

END OF THE DROUGHT

ONE of the most interesting episodes in the career of Elijah, stern prophet of ancient Israel, was his conflict with Ahab, the wicked king who ruled or misruled the Northern Kingdom in its tempestuous history. In the time of Ahab, a great drought parched his domain until the wretched day on Mount Carmel when Elijah called down fire from heaven to consume the sacrifice and the priests of Baal were slain, the skies were black with clouds and there was a torrential rain that ended the long drought.

Thus we learn from the Scripture that the skies have withheld their moisture at intervals in this or that land, and great desolation has prevailed. Here in our own country in recent months there have been reports of large loss because of lack of rain. Here in my own section we have used the garden hose to keep the flowers growing and blooming normally, while in the surrounding country and pasture lands have given cattle scant grazing, the corn and the cane are far behind in their growth and even cotton which is generally regarded as a hot-weather plant has suffered in the prevailing dryness.

So there has been much rejoicing in the ending of the near drought in our section. After many days of dry weather, the rains have come and great joy. Tenneyson writes of "the dead unhappy night when the rain is on the roof." But to me the patter of the rain-drops on the roof is a lullaby sent from God, especially when the drought has ended.

Austin, Tex. State Supreme Court took a recess last week after handing down a heavy volume of new ruling including one which in effect upheld the 1959 High court decision to hear arguments attacking the law granting free access to the beaches and oceans. It left standing a Houston Court of Civil Appeals decision stating the public is entitled to use Gulf Coast beaches from the water to the vegetation line. In other cases, the Court permitted Texas Liquor Control Board to continue regulation of liquor exporters along the Mexican border during court attack on a law authorizing such control; Set down arguments by State Optometry Examiners to force Judge Dallas Blankenship to rule on Dr. Ellis Carp's suit challenging its ethical practices order of 1959; Overturned a contempt judgment against the city manager; The liberals are not alone and mayor of Hurst, Tarrant in connection with a condemnation case involving land for drainage easements; Agreed to review an Austin district court decision denying a state savings and loan charter to Metropolitan Saving Association of Houston; Refused review of a \$1,000,000 lawsuit in Hutchinson County brought by union members who claimed they were fired for following orders of their officials in a 1958 strike at Phillips Petroleum handle; Refused a state AFL-CIO request to enjoin alleged "pro-employer lobbying" by Texas Employment Commission, leaving in effect lower court opinions. Third Court of Civil Appeals overturned a district court ruling blocking Upshur Rural Electric Co-Op from building a \$9,000,000 power plant near Ore City. However, it held the co-op cannot sell power to non-members.

Alamo highway State Highway Commission heard requests from a group of Texans representing cities from Texarkana to Round Rock. They asked that a route through their area be called "the Alamo Highway" and sought recommendations on ways to bring it to top condition by 1968. Alamo Highway Association is made up of prominent boosters from cities and villages along Marshall; S.H. 43 from Marshall to Henderson; U.S. 79 from Henderson to Round Rock, to San Antonio. F.B. Elliott of Jacksonville said "1968 will be a banner year in which to attract people from all over the east and the north to follow the Alamo route to the HemisFair in San Antonio and to the Olympics in Mexico City. Highway Commission did not grant the request immediately. But its members, Herb Perry of Carrizo Springs, Hal Woodward of Coleman and Jack Kulgen of Waco, expressed interest in the tourist attraction idea.

Water aid Texas Water Commission has been busy trying to help communities suffering from the extreme drought. In little more than a week's time, the Commission sent one of its members, H.A. Beckwith, to Brackettville to help that city drill a water well when Las Moras Spring went dry; granted Thorndale a permit to pump 20 acre feet of water from the San Gabriel as an emergency measure; and secured a Kerr County court order restraining irrigation in the county from using water from the Guadalupe River and its tributaries for anything except domestic, municipal and livestock purposes.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10 proposing an Amendment to Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Subsection to be known as 51a-2; giving the Legislature the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of individuals sixty-five (65) years of age or over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States for such medical payments; providing that the amounts paid out of state funds shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds for such purposes; providing that certain means relating to the correction or remedying of abnormalities of vision shall be included within such medical care service or assistance; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection to be known as Subsection 51a-2, which shall read as follows:

"Subsection 51a-2. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by General Laws and to make payment for same, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age or over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age and over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such medical assistance; and providing that the amounts paid out of state funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and the laws of the State of Texas.

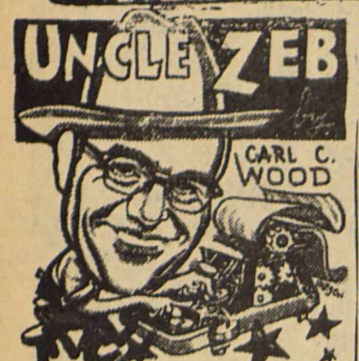

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an amendment to Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection which reads as follows:

"(d) No law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless notice of the intention to introduce such a bill setting forth the general substance of the contemplated law shall have been published at least thirty (30) days and not more than ninety (90) days prior to the introduction thereof in a newspaper or newspapers having general circulation in the county or counties in which said district or any part thereof is or will be located and by delivering a copy of such notice and such bill to the Governor who shall submit such notice and bill to the Texas Water Commission, or its successor, which shall file its recommendation as to such bill with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker

of the House of Representatives within thirty (30) days from date notice was received by the Texas Water Commission. Such notice and copy of bill shall also be given of the introduction of any bill amending a law creating or governing a particular conservation and reclamation district if such bill (1) adds additional land to the district, (2) alters the taxing authority of the district, (3) alters the authority of the district with respect to the issuance of bonds, or (4) alters the qualifications or terms of office of the members of the governing body of the district."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

This early registration is being conducted to avoid the confusion which generally prevails on the first day of school. It's The Driver Who Counts

Law enforcement officials, editors and any of the public concerned with the appalling toll of traffic accidents feel a common futility about how to cope with the problem.

There are many causes, and various remedies have been advanced by experts.

But a Dallas citizen, in a letter to a newspaper in that city, speaks more truth in blunt language than all of the learned dissertations on the subject we have seen.

Speaking of drivers' tests, the Dallas man wrote:

"Wrecks are not caused by people who do not know how to drive. Most of them are caused by the idiot who doesn't care. Grounding the habitual lawbreaker is more important than drivers' tests."

Drivers' tests are essential, and serve a good purpose, but they alone do not guarantee traffic safety.

The intent of the driver behind the wheel, toward law enforcement and toward the rights of others, unquestionably is the greatest factor bearing on traffic safety.

Texas' toll of accidents and deaths is increasing and unless the trend is reversed, and it seems unlikely, this will wind up a grisly year indeed.

This problem deserves the most careful attention of the 59th Texas Legislature which will convene next January. Every cause and every measure relating to improving traffic safety should be considered.

If the laws need to be stricter on revocation of licenses of incorrigible drivers, it should be done.

Let us hope that the legislature does not become so burdened and preoccupied with the problems of congressional redistricting, legislative redistricting, teachers' salaries and higher education that the crisis on our streets and highways is slighted.

The rural traffic accident summary for Yoakum County from January through July shows a total of 14 crashes, resulting in one person killed, 15 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$18,125.00.

Warning To 18-Year-Olds

Lagging registration under the draft law in Terry, Hockley and Yoakum counties, has prompted the local board of the tri-county area to warn every 18-year old male that the law requires him to register within five days after his 18th birthday. This law is the President's Proclamation Act of 1948, as amended and approved June 24, 1948, Sec. 15 A through J.

Failure to register, like failure to comply with other provisions of the law, may subject men to prosecution, or induction into the Army, out-of-turn and ahead of other men. Maximum penalty for failure to comply with any

provision of the law, upon prosecution and conviction, is five years in prison, fine of \$10,000 or both.

After a young man registers he is required to keep the local board informed of every change in his address, or personal situations which may affect his classification such as: marriage, dependents other than a wife or child, physical defects which, in the opinion of the registrant, may disqualify him from service in the armed forces, verified by a physician's statement; student activity; such as high school or college, and moral involvements with the police. The board can only determine the proper classification of a registrant from the information in his file at the time of classification.
