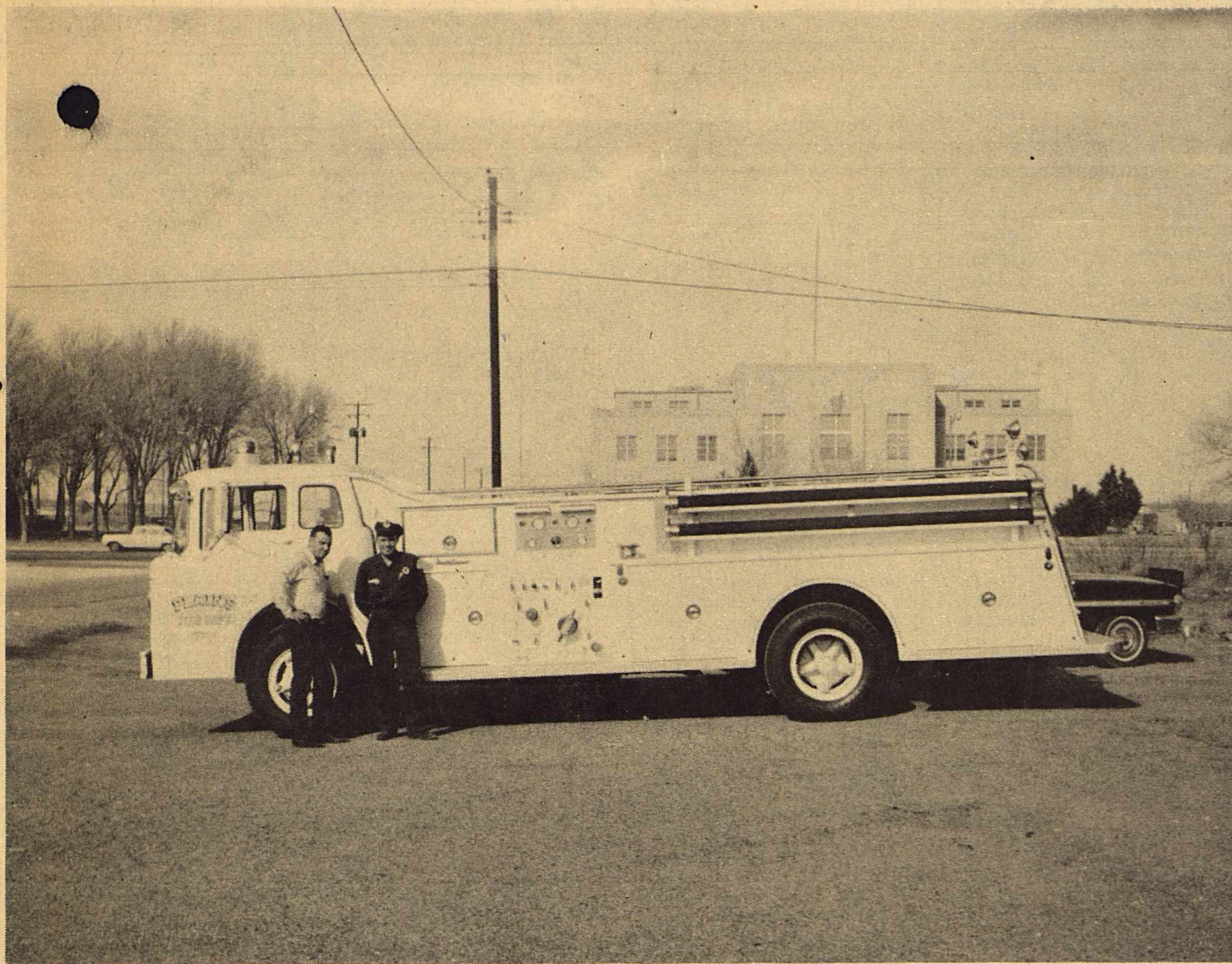

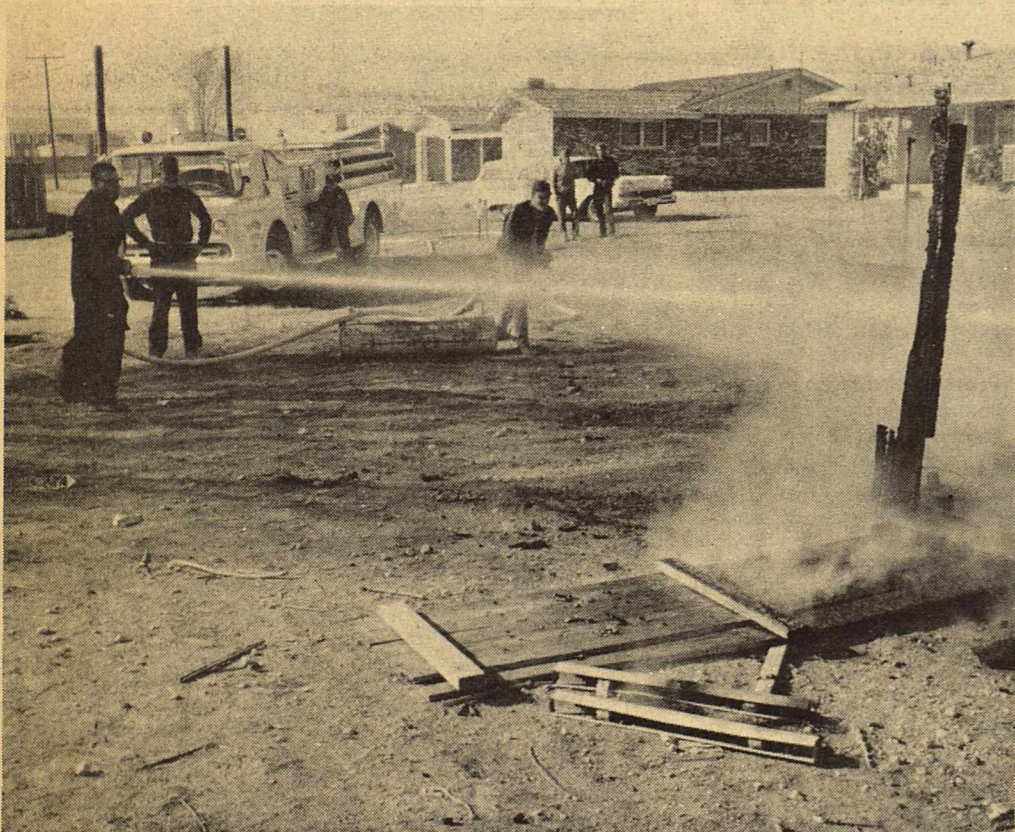

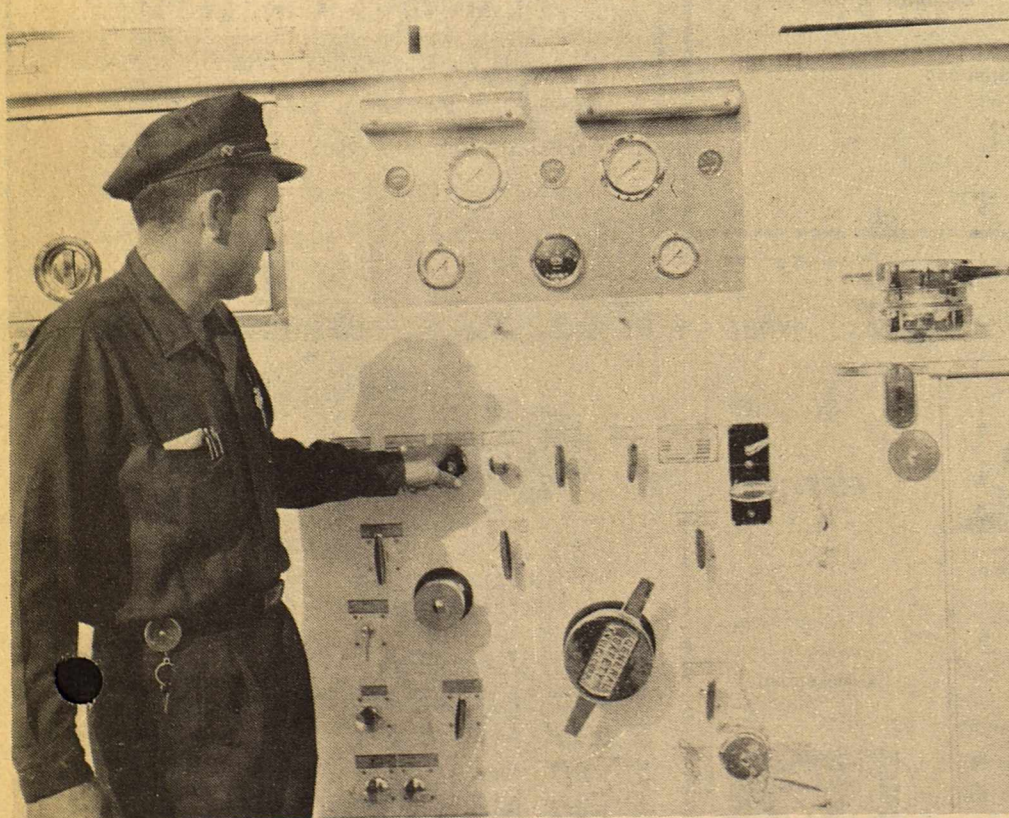


## NEW FIRE TRUCK ON THE JOB

## Cowboys To Wink Friday

Tuesday night, the Plains Cowboys fell to defeat in their first conference try of the season, in a game played in the home gym against highly regarded Seagraves. Plains managed to hold their own real well during the first half of the game, score being 21 for Plains and 24 for the Eagles at that time. But, in the third quarter, Seagraves managed to get a lead that the Cowboys were never able to overcome.

Scoring by quarters in the game for Seagraves ran 11, 13, 17, 19; and for Plains it ran 13, 8, 10, 20. High pointers for Plains were Jack Lowe with 10, Dan Smith with 8 and Ronnie Elmore with 8. Leading rebounders were Jim Smith and Calvin Smith, with five each. Final score in the tilt was Plains 51 and Seagraves 60. In the B game which immediately preceded the var-

sity tilt, Plains fared some better, overcoming Seagraves 49 to 37. Scoring in that tilt ran 12, 14, 12, 11 for the Cowboys and 8, 9, 15, 6 for the Eagles. High point man for Plains was Ricky Elmore with 22. Last Thursday, Friday and Saturday the Cowboys took part in the Seagraves Invitational Tournament. In that they fell to Morton 55 to 68 in the opening round.

On Friday night they took on a mighty good Bula quintet and were able to overcome them by a score of 78 to 49. In the final night's play in the round-robin affair, Plains was matched against host, Seagraves and were downed 46 to 58. Danny Smith was the lone Cowboy selection named to the all-tournament team. Friday night of this week the Cowboys continue to pursue the conference schedule, travelling to do battle with the Wildcats of Wink there. On Tuesday night of next week, Plains will host O'Donnell here.

## Harlem Stars Here Feb. 23

The hilarious Harlem Stars are coming to town. Admired as the greatest and funniest basketball team in the country today, the Stars are a combination of Negro Stars who tour the World making fans laugh. ## Released Cotton Acreage For '65

Final date for farmers with 1965 cotton allotments to file requests for additional allotments, which the county may receive from released cotton, is March 3. The application for signing for additional allotments has been received in the local ASCS office and all farmers that wish to be considered for a share of the allotment received, if any should come by the office at

their convenience and sign the application. To be eligible to be considered, an application MUST be filed by not later than March 3, 1965. A number of inquiries have been made at the local office by farmers and other interested persons in regard to the acreage of released cotton we will receive this year. We have, of course, no way of telling at this time how much acreage we will receive. In 1964 this county received 3,471 acres of released acre-

age. The cotton release and reapportionment law was signed several years ago and it permits farmers with cotton allotments to release all or any part of their allotment which they do not wish to plant. Each county accepts released cotton and takes applications for additional allotments. Each county supplies its own farmers first and then if they have more acres released than eligible application, the unused acres are

released to the State ASCS committee. After the final date for releasing to the State the State Committee reapportions the state allotment to the counties which have filed application for additional allotments. After the released allotment is received in the county the County Committees, that were elected by the farmers in each county, set up a policy on the method to be used to reapportion the allotment to the producers requesting

additional acreage. It is not expected that any county committee will set up a policy that will please all farmers. In checking with farmers on the proper method to be used to reapportion this acreage, I find many different opinions - in fact about as many opinions as there are farmers. The operator or the land lord may sign for the additional allotment, and we again urge you to not forget the March 3, final date.

## Credit Union Annual Meeting

Annual stockholders meeting of the Yoakum County Federal Credit Union is set for 7 p. m. January 18, and is scheduled to be held in the local club room. Main business of the evening will be the giving of the reports on last year's activities and the election of officers for the coming year. Speaker for the occasion is to be Mrs. Dyalhia Benson, long-time manager of the Hereford, Texas credit union,

considered one of the best and most progressive in the state. Mrs. Benson also has held offices on both the State and the National level of credit unions. A film is scheduled to be shown at the meeting which is concerned with credit union work in Peru. It was pointed out that all credit union members and all other persons interested are urged to attend this meeting.

## Pancake Supper A Success

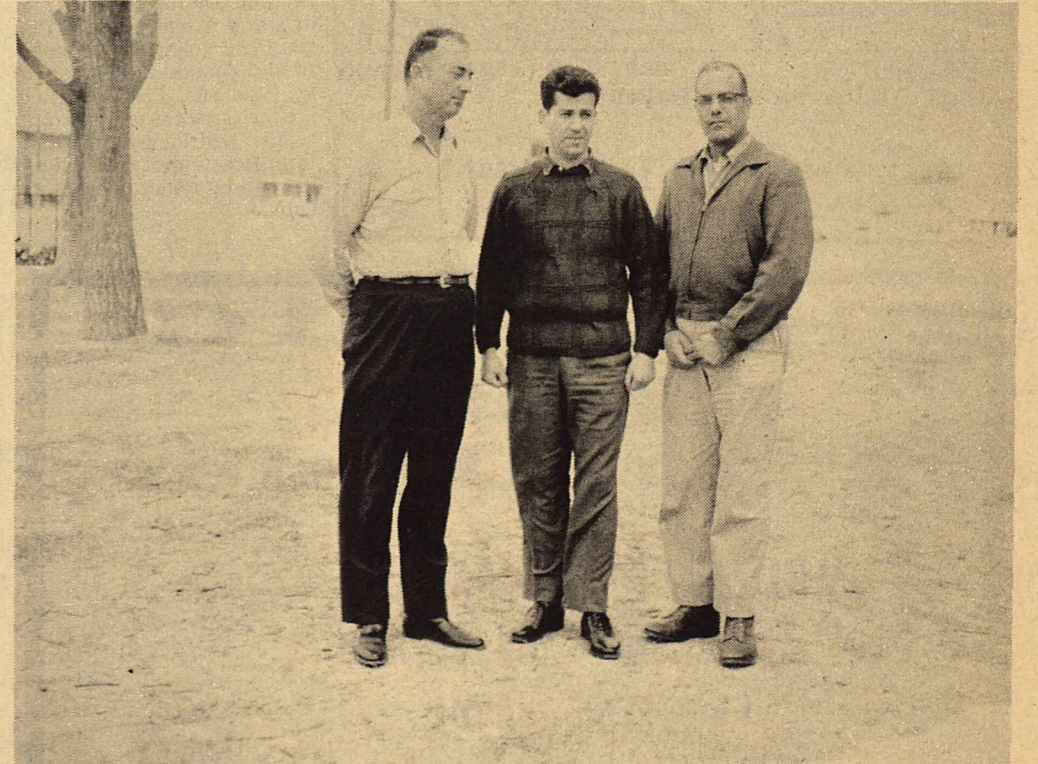

# News Of Soil Conservation

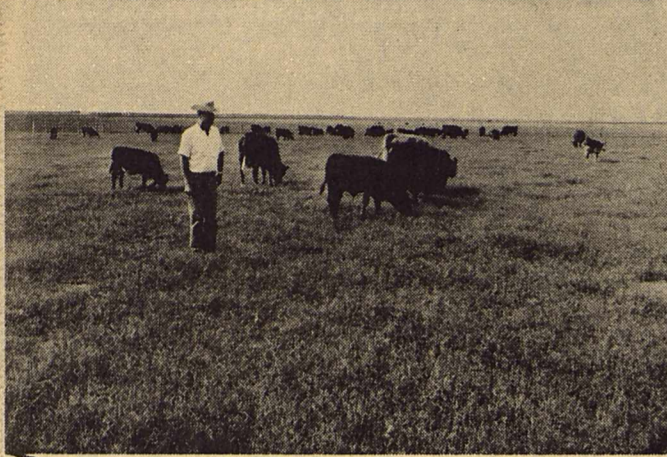

New conservation plans and Great Plains contracts to help carry them out are Sam String, owner, V. L. Duncan, operator, nine miles east of Denver City and I. S. Cross, owner and Alex Crops, operator, 14 miles southwest of Plains. These plans call for reorganizing irrigation systems, planting of grass, brush control and many management practices such as conservation

cropping system, crop residue management, irrigation water use and cover cropping. Speaking of management practices, we can begin to see the benefit of cover crops such as done by Dorman Scott, J. M. Deering, D. V. Phipps, Charles Roseberry and many others, who have sown rye in cotton just prior to the last watering last August, as it is making real good growth in

spite of the dry weather. Too, now is a good time to start planning a fertilizer, water, and grazing program on irrigated pasture.

Good grazing and good-doing cattle like those in the photo on Paul Cobb farm SE of Plains don't just happen. Pre-emergence watering and fertilizing on grass is just as important as pre-plant watering and fertilizing is on crop land.

Some very good work is being done now by a lot of conservation farmers in the form of supplemental tillage on grain sorghum stubble. Some good examples are A. K. Gilliam, Quenton Johnson and Wallace Randolph.

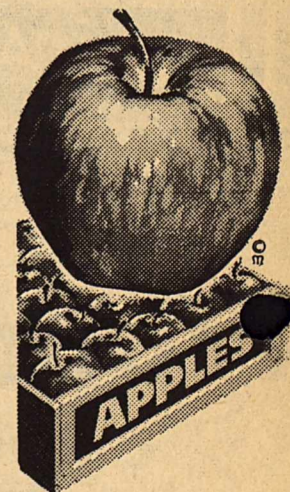
