Farming Without Soil? It's Being Done Here

Farming without soil? It can't be done, you say? It is being done in Eastland County — and ironically, this most modern of farming methods is being carried on at one of the most historically significant locations in Eastland County.

C. L. Hash, 34-year-old Albany native, is growing stock feed "hydroponically" (without soil) on his farm on the banks of the old McGough Springs, seven miles southeast of Eastland.

The Springs in days of old, naturally attracted the first settlers to this area, and Hash's modern operations today may be the forerunner of farming methods of the future.

The venture is a joint undertaking by Hash and Bill McGough, a native of the county, now of Andrews.

McGough owns the land and the two young men are partners in the feed-producing, space-age style, operation.

Every day, Hash turns out a 1,000 pounds of high-protein, highly-platable feed. He uses four ingredients — Oat seeds, water, chemical fertilizer and "control".

He's had the plant in operation for six weeks and the present cycle of six days from seed to feed is proving to be a money-saver.

Tornadoes Most Frequent During Spring Season

Experts can appreciate the paraphrase of Shelley's poem. In the past two years, the U. S. Weather Bureau tallied 253 tornadoes and 353 other severe storms which resulted in millions of dollars of property damage, 85 deaths and 668 injuries.

With tornado season soon to be in full swing, the Office of Defense and Disaster Relief of the Texas Department of Public Safety has issued a special leaflet containing safety information for coping with these destructive storms.

The leaflet details procedures titled "Tornado Precautions," to follow when tornadoes threaten, whether in open country, in cities and towns, schools, factories or industrial plants. Knowing a few basic rules of what to do when a tornado is approaching may mean the difference between life and death.

The leaflet also contains descriptive material on occurrence, frequency and weather conditions most apt to produce tornadoes.

thermostatically controlled 12 by 22 feet building, the trays of oat seeds grow to a seven-inch delicacy for stock in six days.

Temperature is kept at 68 to 72 degrees and with all the water inside the building, humidity is always high.

Saving? Well, Hash figures the feed is costing from \$9 to \$10 a ton, versus about \$40 a ton for alfalfa hay or \$20 for Johnson grass hay.

The facilities cost Hash \$8,100 completely installed, and "You've got to have the stock to be fed to justify the expense," he says.

Right now Hash is feeding 20 head of cattle, 117 goats and 42 hogs from the automated project. The calves didn't like the oat shoots at first, but they learned.

Today they line up at the feeding trough as soon as Hash turns on the auger that takes the ground fresh feed from the building right into the pens.

Every day Hash empties the "ripe" trays as feed, and refills them with 100 pounds of oat seeds. Chemical fertilizer is added to McGough Springs water, 225 gallons a day, and the pans are flooded automatically, from the top and soaking each in line.

Two "coffee dispenser size" dippers of the fertilizer are used daily. Analysis is 15 per cent nitrogen, four per cent phosphate and 33 per cent potash, and the fertilizer costs \$7.50 for three pounds.

The finished feed has a 26 per cent protein content and other trace minerals which whet the appetite of the animals causing them to eat and gain from other, less rich food stuffs.

Hash and his wife, Paula Jo, have two children, Charla Jo, 3 and Mike, a Carbon High School fifth grader.

The amount of feed the plant produces, is equal to about that of a 100 acres of irrigated wheat pasture, Hash says.

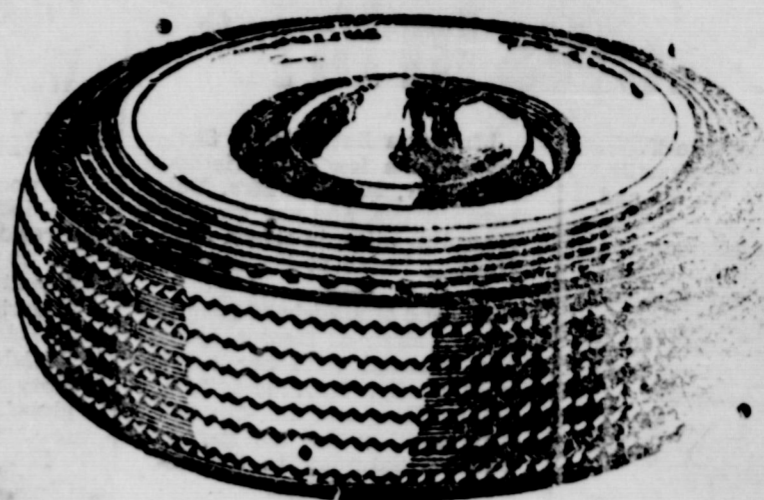

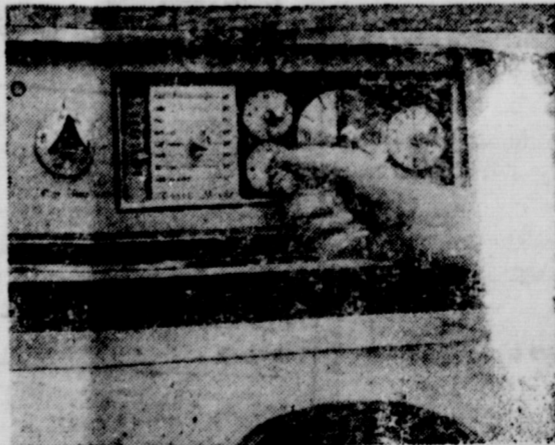

18,700 Acres Of Small Grain To Be Harvested

There are 18,700 acres of
 small grain crops to be har-
 vested in Eastland County, ac-
 cording to the Texas Employ-
 ment Commission.

Of that total, 4,700 is in
 wheat; 10,000 in oats; 1,600 in
 barley; and 3,000 in rye.

The figures are estimates.
 Dry, hard, freezes during
 the winter caused extensive
 damage to wheat in some
 areas and even more damage
 to other small grain. This
 coupled, with the fact that
 moisture is urgently needed
 over practically the entire
 Texas Wheat Belt, will prob-
 ably reduce production con-
 siderably.

The Commission estimates
 that there are 4,181,972 acres
 of small grain in the state to
 be harvested.

Mrs. J. A. Bates, chairman

 ter of the National Founda-
 tion-March of Dimes, made
 his vaccine against polio was

this observation in recalling
 that on March 26, 1953, Dr.
 Jonas Salk revealed in a na-
 tionwide radio broadcast that
 just around the corner.

The Salk vaccine has pre-
 vented an estimated 154,000
 cases of paralytic polio in the
 United States with a savings
 to the nation's economy of
 more than \$6.7 billion, Mrs.
 Bates said.

She added that approximate-
 ly 12,000 of those saved from
 polio would have died had the
 Salk vaccine not been avail-
 able.

County Is Short Of Bond Quota

December Savings bonds sales in Eastland County were \$48,638, according to Guy Peyton Parker, chairman of the Eastland County Savings Bonds Committee. During 1962 the citizens of this county purchased \$459,183, which represents 88.3 per cent of the 1962 sales goal of \$520,000.

Sales in Texas during 1962 totaled \$143,146,965, which is 36 per cent of the state goal of \$165,100,000.

U. S. Treasury records disclose that the number of individual bonds issued during 1962 set a five year record with over 73 million individual bonds issued during the year. The number of 50 bonds purchased was the highest amount since the war years, and the sale of 25 bonds was at a five-year record.

The cash value of E and H bonds outstanding reached a new high of 45.49 billion. This represented a gain of over a billion dollars during 1962. Redemptions during 1962 were next to the smallest amount of cashing for any of the past eight years.
