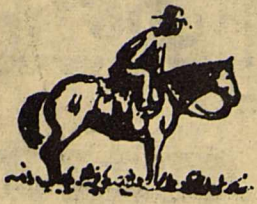

Big Flower Show Set For Saturday

The Eighth Annual Flower Show of the Plains Dirt Gardeners Club, entitled "The Greatest Show on Earth", will be staged Saturday, October 16 in the Plains School Activity Room. Mrs. Wilson Duke, General Chairman, announces. The Amateur show will be open to the public with admission charge from 3 to 6 p. m. Saturday afternoon. Special features of the show will include an exhibit of "Poisons in Your Own Backyard" and a conservation exhibit on cover crops prepared by the Yoakum County Soil and Water Conservation District.

Artistic design classes are entitled, "The Barker", an invitational class for student and national judges; "Pink Lemonade", Novice Class; "From the Jungle", a fresh foliage arrangement; "Wild West Show", "Circus Parade", "Trapeze", "Midgits" Trampoline Tricks", "Roustabout", "Fat Lady" and "Leotards". Members of the club will display exhibits showing some results of the past years work using these titles. Horticultural endeavors of members will be exhibited in Division I. All club members are required to exhibit in the show and to assist with the staging and dismantling.

Cowboys Hang Necks 37-12

The determined Cowboys of Plains crushed the Sundown Roughnecks 37-12 displaying a fierce running attack and a sound defense and putting the game out of reach early in the first quarter. The Cowboys gained 365 yards in the contest and ran the Roughnecks ragged with a stout defense which gave ground in the middle of the field but were exceedingly stingy near the goal line. Greg Jones shocked the Roughnecks with a 61 yard run in the first quarter and Ronnie Elmore proved to much for the Sundown crew throughout the evening.

Early in the first quarter the Sundown eleven drove inside the Pokes 20 when a fumble was recovered by Plains. Then Ronnie Elmore brought the Plains fans to their feet with an 83 yard scamper which hit pay dirt. Butch Gayle converted and the Pokes led 7-0.

Dennis Crutcher helped put the score up to 20-0 by the half when he ran wide for 12 yards to pay dirt. Gayle once again added the extra touches.

Plains scored twice in the third period before the Roughnecks were able to get their first. It was Crutcher again on a 6-yard run for the first Cowboy score, with Gayle adding the extra point. Fullback Joe Dan Cooke also went 6 yards for his score of the evening and then Gayle added the 34th Plains point.

Then it was Sundown's turn as Dub Holly and Ronnie Popejoy each plunged 1 yard for the 12 points. Holly scored in the third and Popejoy in the fourth. As if that wasn't enough scoring, Gayle decided to try a 30-yard field goal about midway through the last stanza and the pigskin flew through the uprights for the final three points.

With 15 first downs the Cowboys gathered in a total of 365 yards, 26 of them through the air. Only two yards of the 272 that Sundown gained were aerial shots. The Roughnecks picked up 13 first downs.

Leading the Plains running attack was Ronnie Elmore with 167 yards compared to the Sundown leader, Popejoy with 83. Sundown defensive work horses were linebackers Jimmy Douglas and Dub Holly.

For Plains, the top defensive men included Cooke as a linebacker, N. C. Clanhahan, tackle and Harold Swann, end.

The Plains Cowboys meet Tahoka for their first District grid contest tomorrow night.

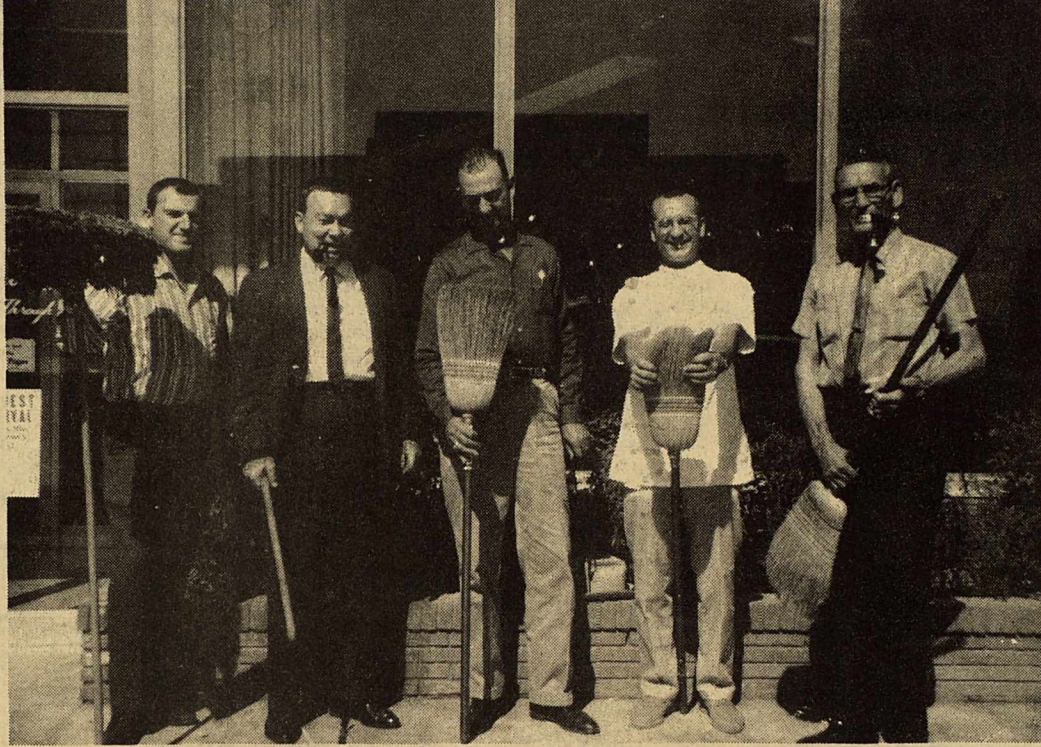
The Pokes ended non conference play with a respectable 4-1 record and now must play 60 minutes of ball each contest where it counts.

The Record shows that Tahoka is a good team which must always be considered a dangerous foe. After the Cowboy come back in the last 3 games they are rated a 13 point favorite to sink Tahoka's hopes for an upset.

After last week's lopsided victory of the Cowboys the Pokes displayed team work which had been lacking in all of the other contests. Instead of a one-two punch as had been prevalent in the other four games, the whole team worked hard to turn back a determined eleven from Sundown. If the Cowboys continue with the threat that they displayed last week, they will be a strong favorite to up-end all of the district.

The Cowboys have come uphill since their defeat at the hands of Friona, and have unleashed a fierce ground attack. Passing and pass defense is the weak link in the Cowboy team, since they have been able to stay on the ground so far this season, but Bobby Taylor has developed and could throw some big surprises into future foes this season.

We will go out on a limb and predict that the Cowboys will sweep the district clean and bring the title home this year.

Men Get Rare Game Permits

Buster Graham, Farm Bureau Agent, registered a prize kill of an antelope this week about 12 miles northwest of Plains, on the Guetersloh Ranch. Bill Fitzgerald, local rancher also killed one of the prize antelope. Graham and Fitzgerald obtained permits from the state to kill the antelope for the purpose of taking blood samples from the herd for the State Game and Fish Department.

These were the first antelope which were legally killed in Yoakum County in the past 25 years. The herd of antelope has over 30 in it, and has been growing in number over the past few years. Lindsey said that this is the first official check of the herd in 25 years.

Mark Lindsey, game warden from Seminole went with Graham and Fitzgerald when they bagged their trophies. The game warden also killed one of the antelope.

Graham said that he and Fitzgerald are having the heads of the antelope mounted in Lubbock. It takes about 2 months for a taxidermist to mount the heads, Graham said. Meletti's Taxidermist in Lubbock are doing the work. Graham says that Napoleon Meletti is the leading taxidermist in the area.

E.O. Winkles Wins Prize

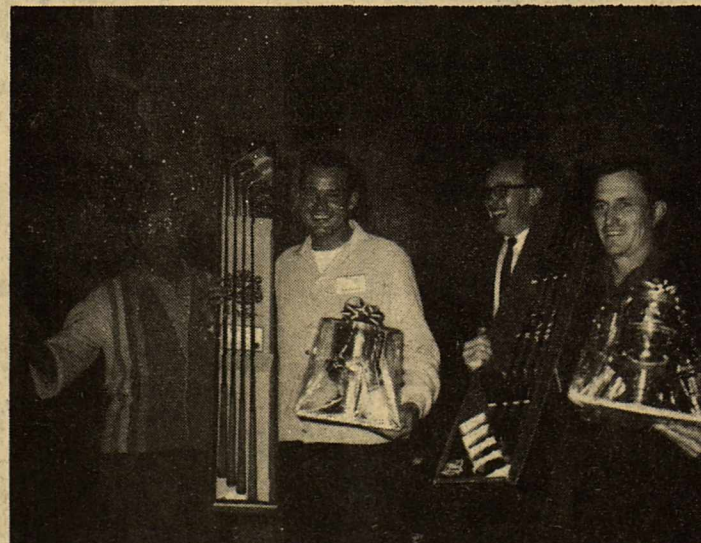

Editorial

FOR THE RECORD

Last week The Plains Record ran an editorial re-stressing the urgent need to get a physician to locate in Plains. We believe that in order to be objective that more needs to be written concerning this subject. Mrs. Paul Loe and Mr. Raymond Bookout in our opinion have maintained an open mind concerning our clinic. Both commissioners have stated that they preferred a M. D., however, they have also stated that their mind is not closed concerning an osteopathic physician, if he is a competent doctor. Both commissioners have stood up for what they believed to be right when they opposed the recent re-districting of our county. The commissioners from the southern part of the county withdrew their personal interests in Plains when they moved the boundary several miles south. Now we believe that the decision should be left to Mrs. Loe and Mr. Bookout concerning who occupies the clinic in Plains. Both of the southern commissioners have stated that they would never consider leasing the clinic to an osteopath, but this was before they voted to re-district.

We believe that both Mrs. Loe and Mr. Bookout will take a stand for the people whom they represent if a competent physician can be obtained, as they have on other occasions, pertaining to other issues.

We also believe that the whole court realizes our desperate need to obtain a physician here, and we know for a fact that all four commissioners and Judge Duvall have sincerely sought a medical doctor for our community. We hope that this feeling will prevail if a qualified D. O. applies for the clinic. Even though the clinic belongs to the county, it is still located in Plains, and the people of Plains have spoken out in an overwhelming majority for a physician, regardless of the fact if he is a M. D. or D. O.

It is neither the intent nor the purpose of The Plains Record to cause division in our county. This would be a poor objective and would bring discredit to our community, and certainly if the good people of Denver City were without the services of a physician, we would do everything in our power to help them get a doctor, and we believe that anybody worth his weight in salt living in other communities in our county truly want us to have a doctor in Plains.

It is our fervent hope and keen desire that we locate a qualified physician soon. Mrs. Loe and Mr. Bookout are our representatives on the county court from the Plains area, and we find no cause to doubt either's sincerity and we believe that they will continue to serve their constituents honorably, whether it be the doctor issue or any other matter which their people need and desire.

Gipson's arrest followed after he was involved in an automobile accident about ten miles north of Plains Monday night at about 8:45 p. m.

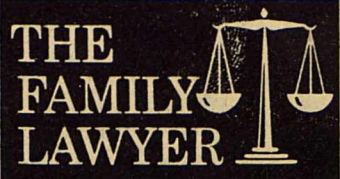

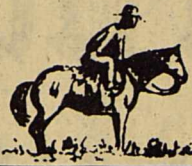

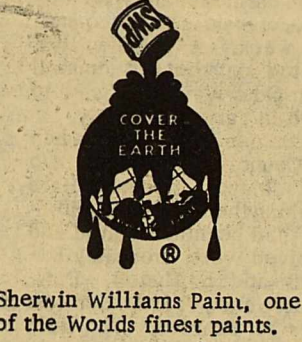

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Yet, the motorist did have a point worth weighing. Is it the wrongdoer's fault if you, as the victim, don't make a reasonable effort to get well? In all fairness, the law has to draw a dividing line between harm truly caused by the wrongdoer and harm truly caused by your own neglect.

For example: A woman's foot was injured in a railroad accident, and her doctor ordered her to use crutches during the healing process. Nevertheless, because she found the crutches awkward, she often hobbled around without them. As a result, a court ruled later that she could not collect damages for being left with a permanent limp.

In another case, a man's failure to consult a doctor for almost three months—despite a serious back injury—barred him from collecting damages for the complications that developed.

Even submitting to surgery might be included in your duty to take care of yourself. If the operation is both simple and safe, a court may find you at fault for refusing to have it.

After all, the law is not forcing you to get well. It merely says that, if you foolishly fail to try, you should not expect somebody else to pay for the consequences.
