

Married Men Face Draft in Dec. Call

State draft boards will be authorized in December to draft any young married man without children, regardless of the date he was married, to fill the biggest Texas draft

call in more than 12 years. This was announced Wednesday by Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, who said the new policy pertained to men 19 through 25 years old.

The state draft quota for December calls for 1,714 men, the biggest since June 1953, when a call for 1,749 was made on Texas borads. The November quota has been in-

creased from 1, 231 to 1, 456. The December quota of 1, 749 is the state's share of a national call of 45, 224 men, 40. 200 for the Army and 5.

024 for the Marine Corps. No married man with children, or an expected child, will be selected to fill the December call.

"Draft boards, of course, must have the information about children, "Colonel Schwartz said, "and an unborn child must be certified by a physician. Otherwise, a young husband and father may find

himself selected. " The state draft director explained that childless married men will be ordered for induction when boards exhaust pools of examined and acceptable single men 19 through 25 years old.

Approximately 9,000 men will be sent for pre-induction mental and physical examina-tions in December. The December local board quotas for induction and examination are scheduled to be mailed to the boards on or about November

Childless married men may be forwarded for physical and mental examinations in both November and December, as well as men down to age 18 years, 11 months if necessary.

Inductions are scheduled to proceed throughout each week in December.

Jack Cobb local fifth grade teacher returned from Corpus Christi Sunday after attending the Texas State Teachers Association Convention which was held on October 21, 22, and 23. Mr. Cobb was the Yoakum County TSTA Unit delegate to the state convention. 8,000 teachers assembled at this Gulf sea port to hear featured speakers as Harry Reasoner, noted newsman for the Columbia Broadcasting System, and Willard E. Goslin of George Peabody College for Teachers. Reasoner spoke on the world situation in general while Goslin emphasized the role which education plays.

More than 150 exhibitors had displays of the latest de. velopments in books and tea-ching aids available for the classroom teachers to visit, Mr. Cobb found these to be of great interest to the teachers.

Executive Secretary with the Washington Education Association, Seattle, in an address to the Classroom Teachers Association made these

points: "Imaginative thinking" is the most important challen-age for all facets of the education field.

About half of the school dropouts are actually "force - outs" due to the failure of the educational program to give these students what they need.

The House of Delegates meeting Saturday morning approved a resolution calling for a bill to be introduced in the 60th Legislature to bring teachers salaries up to the national level. A second part of the pay resolution will see legislative approval of a plan to adjust salaries to the national level automatically every two years. Currently, the stateaverage is about \$500 below the national average, The TSTA contends the spread will be about \$900 in two years.

Mr. Cobb felt he received a great deal from attending this convention and hopes next year more teachers from Yoakum county will be able to Attend the next convention.

Report From Sen. Tower On Draft Card Outrages

I know all Texans have been deeply shocked and dis-tressed by the recent rash of draft - card burnings and of left-wing student demonstrations calling for retreat in Vietnam and a ginerally soft attitude toward Communism. As a former College profes-

sor, I am particularly concerned that some young Americans know so little of their nation's history and that they would make the mistake of playing into the hands of Communist tyranny. Certainly, I do not deny the right of this tiny minority of students to speak their views freely, but I do lament the immaturity and which they evidence.

It is the very essence of of Americanism that patriots fight and die preserving a country in which dissenters are free to protest. But, a guaranteed right to protest does not carry with it guaranteed

what these anti-vietnam protesters fail to remember is that 4, 435 Americans died in the Revolutionary War to provide a country with freedom of protest; 2, 260 American deaths reaffirmed our freedom in the War of 1812; 116, 516 patriots died in World War I to prevent totalitarianism from wiping out freedom; in World War II 405, 399 Americans died in the continuing struggle against tyranny; in Korea 54, 246 dedicated Americans made the first stand against Asiatic Communism. Today, everyday, more patriots are fighting and dying to protect the American concept of freedom.

What these uninformed anti-Vietnam protesters fail to remember is that freedom is not guaranteed gift; freedom is maintained only by eternal vigilance. Only men who want to be free and will fight if necessary to be free, remain

Thses anti-Vietnam protesters fail to grasp the simple fact that only America's stre-nght and dedication to free dom stand between a world of

It is particularly significant that the vast majority of A-merican students have read American history, do believe in their country and are actively vocally condemning the minority appeasers. Unfort-unately, Communism may conclude from the protest movement that it still has a chance to defeat freedom. Thus, the naive protesters a prolonging war, adding to casulties and doing their ion a grevious desservice

faces to the city of his choos-


Mr. Newsom is a member of L. O. O. F. and the Knights of Pithias. Mr. Newsom joined the Methodist Church when he was nine years old.



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

Witness Stand Jitters

Right now, cases are pouring into our legal channels at the record rate of half a million every week. One result is a growing likelihood that you yourself, some day soon, will be summoned to the courtroom to be a witness.

Many people get the jitters at the mere thought. A woman witness was so flustered that, when asked for her age, she gave her bust measurement instead. A man, when



asked if he wanted to clarify point, blurted out that he would "rather depend on the ignorance of the court."

No doubt the very setting of a courtroom helps to frighten the witness. Above him sits the robed judge, majestically representing the awesome might of The Law. In front of him, hanging on his every word, sit the embattled litigants and their attorneys. Strangers in the jury box study him intently to see if he is telling the truth.

Yet, if you should be called upon to testify, you might find reassurance in a few fundamental facts:

1. You are a witness, not an actor. You are not expected to give a smooth and polished performance. Remember that the jurors, too, are in unfamiliar surroundings-likely to know just how you feel. Sincerity, not glibness, will impress them

2. You have powerful allies. One is the lawver who summoned you. And the judge has every reason to be patient and sympathetic. The more he helps you to do your job, the more you are helping him to do his.

3. That big bugaboo, cross-examination, is usually not terrifying. Tell the truth and you have nothing to fear. The slashing, bullying crossexamination, so often seen on TV, is seldom seen in court.

After all, a lawyer's cross examination-like a wife's cross-examination of her tardy husband-has one main purpose: to probe for lies. Unless the opposing attorney has good reason to think you are lying, he is not likely to treat you roughly. He would be running too much risk of winding up as a villain

in the eyes of the jury. Why not see for yourself? Before your own day in court, visit a New Mexico.
