Fred C. Eaves Buried Friday In Gorman Rites

Fred C. (Tidy) Eaves, 73, died about 7 a. m. Thursday at his home in Gorman. He had been in ill health about three years.

Funeral services were held at 3 p. m. Friday at the Congregational Methodist Church in Gorman, with the Rev. Marion Dennis, pastor, officiating; assisted by the Rev. Joe O'Neal, pastor of the Kokomo Baptist Church.

Burial was in the Simpson Cemetery.

Born November 14, 1896 in Limestone County, he married the former Miss Erma Neill August 24, 1919 in the Kokomo Community. They lived near Gorman all their married life and moved from Kokomo to Gorman in 1961, when they retired from farming and stock raising.

He was a member of the Gorman Congregational Methodist Church, the Masonic and Oddfellows Lodges of Gorman.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Neil B. Eaves of Weatherford and Delman Fred Eaves of the Kokomo Community; three daughters, Mrs. Paul L. (Verda Mae) Norris of Fort Worth, Mrs. Byron B. (Verna) Laminack and Mrs. Preston T. (Louise) Brown, both of Lake Jackson; thirteen grandchildren; two great-grandchildren; one brother, A. D. (Buddy) Eaves of Carbon; and one sister, Mrs. Leila Lowry of Hobbs, New Mexico.

He was a brother of A. D. (Buddy) Evans of Carbon.

Independent Fire Dept. Is Organized In County

Officers for the newly organized "Eastland County Independent Fire Company" were elected at a recent meeting held in Eastland.

The volunteer fire company, organized by charter on October 3rd, is composed of members from Eastland, Cisco, and Olden, with present membership of twelve.

Elected Chief is Jim George, of Eastland. And, elected 1st and 2nd Assistant Chief, respectively, were Monroe Wilson, Cisco, and Elmer Sullivent, of Olden.

The fire company, a non-profit organization, is presently dealing with the City of Dallas for a pumper truck, according to a spokesman for the group. It presently has one 2,000 gallon tank truck. This truck, according to Chief George, will be converted to a rural fire fighting piece of equipment just as soon as title papers are cleared up. The truck will be equipped with 200 ft. of 1 inch line, and 200 ft of 1-1/2 inch line. Chief George said the 1-1/2 inch line will be supplied by a 300 gallon per minute pump. This pump will also supply the 1 inch line, which will be carried on a 300 ft. capacity electric reel.

Also as standard equipment on this truck will be a gasoline driven fire pump, which will be mounted on the rear and be completely independent of the other pump, according to Ass't Chief Wilson.

Members of the group were quick to point out that the

fire company has no connection with the Cities of Eastland, Ranger, or Cisco. According to James Dabney, Sec'y-Treas., it is not at all uncommon in northern and eastern cities for more than one volunteer fire company to be in operation.

"For example," said Dabney, "the town of Oliphant, Penna., with 5,800 population, has five separate, and complete, volunteer fire companies." "And, Pristol, Rhode Island, with 14,000 population, has four volunteer organizations."

According to members, the main purpose of the Eastland County Independent Fire Company is to aid, and assist, any Eastland County fire department in fighting and controlling of fires when called upon by the Chief, or Fire Marshal, of that town.

"We will not interfere, or make a run to a fire, unless we are called upon to do so," said Chief George. "However, our equipment will be available, 24 hours per day, to aid any group that desires our help," he went on. "So far," George said, "we have had wonderful reception, and cooperation, from the Chiefs of Cisco and Ranger; and Chief Moore of Olden, and Chief Campbell of Carbon, have expressed their desire to work with us." "If things progress on schedule, we hope to have our rural truck in operation within a month," he said.

Radar Is Used for Traffic Safety Not Speed Trap

"Radar equipment was not designed to be a trap of any kind", says Acting Police Chief Johnny Morren. "Radar is a device to save: to save lives, to save injuries, and to save property".

Morren reported that the newly-installed radar equipment in Eastland has already caused through-traffic to slow down. "We have stopped enough traffic for the word to be passed around", he said. "We do not want to gain our town a reputation for being a "speed trap". We do want the regular drivers to know that they must respect our speed laws for their safety as well as for ours."

"Any law officer had rather help teach people to obey the speed limits than to give a speeding ticket", Morren added.

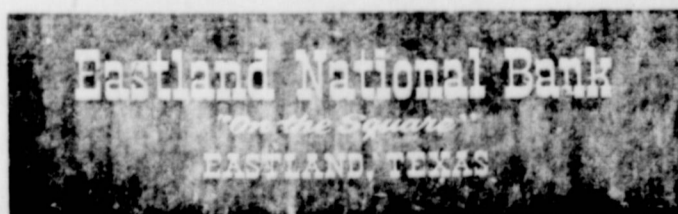

Holiday Death Toll Of 87 Forecast For Texas

Austin—The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety today estimated that traffic crashes in Texas over the Christmas and New Year holiday periods may claim as many as 87 lives.

Colonel Wilson E. Speir said 54 deaths are expected in the Christmas period beginning at 6 p. m. Christmas Eve to midnight Sunday, December 28. It also is estimated 33 traffic deaths will occur during the New Year holidays from 6 p. m. New Year's Eve to midnight Sunday, January 1.

"We urge each individual driver to accept the challenge

of proving our estimates are too high," Speir said. "Many holiday accidents can be prevented if Texans will drive safely and realize that no one is immune to a traffic crash."

Speir also announced that the Department of Public Safety will place all available patrolmen on the highways during the holidays to enforce the law and aid motorists. He said a special "Operation Motorcade" would be in effect over both holiday periods, during which periodic tabulations of traffic fatalities will be made and given the widest possible dissemination in order to focus public attention to the added dangers involved in holiday travel.

 thorities with the citizens'
 concern for authorization of
 the Sabanno project. At that

 approval.

Earlier estimates indicate
 that some 20 structures, some
 large and some small, would
 be necessary to implement the
 project through the South
 part of the county.

A planning authorization
 for the proposed Sabanno
 Watershed Development Pro-
 ject has been made by the U.
 S. Department of Agriculture
 according to an announcement
 by Congressman Omar Burle-
 son.

The approval provides fi-
 nancial and technical assis-
 tance by the Soil Conserva-
 tion Service in planning the
 watershed program.

The project was proposed
 by an informal organiza-

 flooding, counter soil damage
 and erosion and improve the
 productive capacity of the
 area.

Water would be conserved
 and flooding checked by a
 series of dams on tributaries
 of the Sabanno. The project
 is similar to that already un-

 Comanche County.
