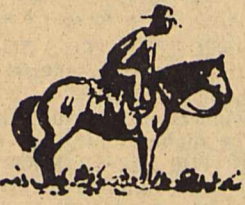

## County Water District Vote Passes; Plains Yes, D.C. No

Voters went to the polls Tuesday in six South Plains Counties and expressed mixed emotions on the creation of a Water Conservation District in Yoakum, Terry, Cochran, Dawson, Gaines, and Andrews counties. The measure carried in Yoakum, Terry, and Cochran, but failed in Gaines, Dawson, and Andrews Counties.

In Yoakum County the measure carried for the city of Plains and the county, but voters in Denver City voted not to enter the proposed district. Plains voters carried the measure by a three to one majority with the vote being 72-24. In the county the voters voted approval by a count of 63 to 43, while Denver City voters rejected the proposal by a vote of 99 to 65.

Head Basketball coach John Richey announced today that Plains will host the first annual Cowboy Basketball Tournament next January at the Cowboy Gym, and that eight teams are making preparation to play in the double elimination tournament. The Cowboy Invitational is slated January 5-6-7 and will offer games in the afternoon and during the evening. Coach Richey stated the coaching staff and administration had worked hard to arrange the tournament. The event will be the last athletic event for the Pokes prior to entering District competition next year.

If the vote stands in Gaines county it will apparently mean that Yoakum, Terry, and part of Cochran counties will be faced with going into the District alone. It also means that only two members were elected to the board of directors. These are Bob Loe, Plains, and John Kendrick of Brownfield.

The Gaines county vote was considered by workers for the creation of the district as a surprise, since Gaines County was expected to enter the district. The Denver City rejection was also unexpected by proponents of the creation of the proposed water conservation district.

## Mom and Dad Banquet Attended By Large Crowd

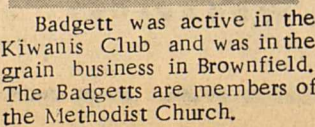

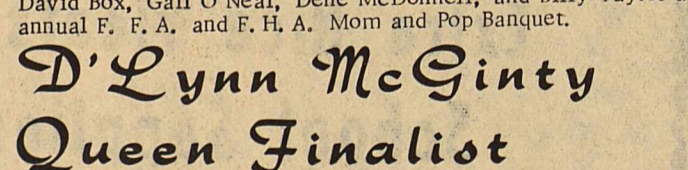


Badgett was active in the Kiwanis Club and was in the grain business in Brownfield. The Badgetts are members of the Methodist Church.

The Plains Cowgirl Volleyball Team will travel to Abilene this Friday, April 29, to play in the State Volleyball Tournament. The Cowgirls are the defending State Volleyball Champions.

The Cowgirls won the right to participate in the State Tournament by placing second in the Regional Tournament held last weekend in Lubbock.

On Friday, April 22, they played Lorenzo, Texas, and won both of their games by good margins. The scores were 15 to 10 in the first game

and 15 to 7 in the second game. They played in the finals at 10:00 a. m. Saturday, against Iraan and lost to them 15 to 4 and 15 to 7, coming in second in the Regional Tournament.

The State Tournament will start Saturday in Abilene on the campus of Hardin Simmons University. These games played in Abilene for the State Championship will close the Volleyball season for the Plains Cowgirls.

## Cinder Team Bound For State Meet

Coach Rip Sewell's cinders finished strong at regional last Saturday garnering 34 points for the home school, and qualifying the sprint relay team to go to state next week and seeing Calvin Smith qualify for State in the high jump and the pole vault.

Joe Dan Cooke, Ronnie Elmore, Alton Raines, and Dennis Crutcher splashed through the rain and mud with an amazing time 44.1 to earn the right to go to Austin to the state meet.

Calvin Smith jumped 5 feet eight and a half inches in the

high jump to qualify for state, and followed up with an excellent 12 feet two inch pole vault to represent the region at state.

In the high hurdles Smith was hooked and almost fell and did not qualify in this event. He was favored to win the high hurdles, but was thrown off balance when another athlete accidentally hit him in the face. This also removed Plains as a possible winner of the meet. Memphis won with 52 points followed by Coahoma with 46, and then Plains with 34 points.

ed for on their intentions, and in addition must maintain the farm's conserving acreage.

All farmers, if they comply with the program, should keep in mind that they must set aside an acreage normally devoted to the crop being diverted which is equal to the intention which they signed to divert. This acreage must be cropland in whole fields or acreages of reasonable size and shape within a field.

Farms that are diverting two or more crops are limited to six regular shaped plots. No crops can be harvested from the diverted acreages except the approved oil seed crops and no pasturing can be done after April 30 or before November 1st.

According to W. M. Overton, local ASCS office manager all Yoakum County farm operators signed up to participate in the 1966 Cotton program with 90 percent signing to divert the maximum and the balance signing at 25 or 12.5 percent. This does not include the small farms of 10 acres or less that are not required to make a reduction to comply. Under the feed grain program 360 farms signed intentions with approximately 96 percent signing to divert the maximum. There was 79 wheat farms signed up in the program for 1966. Operators should keep in mind that to comply with the program they must divert the acreage sign-

## Road Accounts

A look at the four precincts in Yoakum County in the Road and Bridge and Lateral road accounts reveals that each precinct operated in the black this year.

Precinct Four progressed into sound economic condition showing that on January 1, 1965 the fund was overdrawn by \$653.94 and at the end of business on December 31 that the account showed a balance of \$13,913.55. Mrs. Paul Loe is the Commissioner of Precinct Four.

In Precinct Three the balance on January 1, 1965 was \$397.85, and at the close of business for the year a balance of \$15,583.08. Raymond Bookout is the commissioner of Precinct Three.

Precinct Two also showed a balance at the end of the year, having had \$5,359.88 at the start of the year, and finishing with \$2,870.24. H. C. Doc Cotton is the Commissioner of Precinct Two.

## Nordyke Dies in Big Spring

Theodore R. Nordyke, long time resident of Plains, died in the Veterans Hospital in Big Spring Sunday morning following a heart attack which he had suffered while visiting in Big Spring.

Mr. Nordyke operated a water drilling business in Yoakum County for many years. He moved to Plains with his wife in 1951, and was a member of the Baptist Church. Nordyke was a veteran of World War II.

He is survived by his wife the former Elsie Proctor. Mrs. Nordyke is an employee at Maries Fashion and Fabric in Plains. Mr. Nordyke was preceded in death by his parents some years ago.

Nordyke was born June 4, 1904 in Cottonwood, Texas. Funeral services and burial were conducted in Cottonwood and Mrs. Nordyke has returned to her home in Plains.

In Precinct One the balance at the end of the year was also in the black, having started the year with \$3,493.52, and having concluded business with \$2,572.33. Vance Brown is the commissioner of Precinct One.

All four precincts finished with balances in the Lateral Road fund for the 1965 year. Precinct One started the year with a balance of \$691.26, and finished with \$25.35.

In Precinct Two a balance of \$1,346.01 existed, and the year was rounded out with \$151.89.

Mr. Bookout's Precincts showed a balance of \$1,738.88

and finished up with a balance of \$1,587.78.

In Mrs. Loe's Precinct the balance was \$1,308.79 in January of 1965, and the year ended with a balance of \$1,085.28.

Each of the County Precincts reflected in the Auditors Annual report that they are insolvent condition. Precinct Four's general picture was one of economic stability as were the other three precincts. The northeastern precinct had made steady improvements in the past few years and has joined the ranks of the other three precincts as a financially stable precinct.

## Fat Stock Show Planning Starts

The directors of the Yoakum County Livestock and Agriculture Improvement Association met last Monday night to begin planning for the 1967 Junior Fat Stock Show in Yoakum County.

One change made for the coming year had to do with weight limits of the animals. Lambs in 1967 will weigh between 80 and 125 pounds. The previous lamb weights were 70 pounds and up. All lambs must be partially groomed before weighing. Barrow weights are up ten pounds for next year. All barrows will weigh between 190 and 250 pounds. Steer calves will be divided

into three classes when there are 19 or more calves in the show. Only two classes will be used when there are 18 or less in the show.

There will be a sifting committee operation before the show to take out any unworthy animals. The fine wool lambs will be shown before the mutton lambs in 1967 in order to allow the judge to also be a classifier and move any lamb not showing the characteristics of a true fine wool lamb into the mutton class.

The directors selected a number of men to contact for judges and they agreed to have 3 judges in 1967 rather than 1.

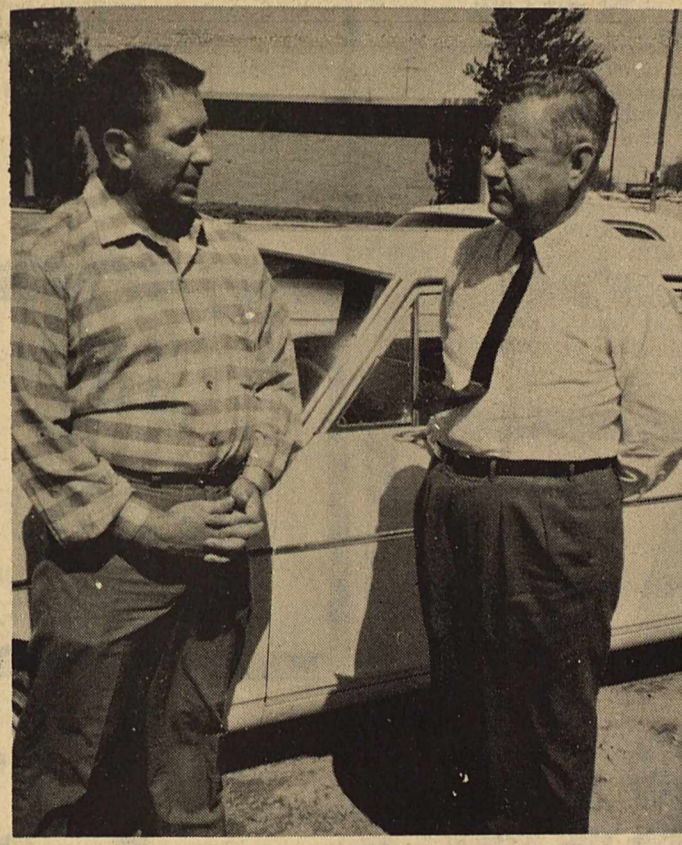
## Morton Food Co Takes Local Acres

Nelson Parkhill, representative of Morton Food Company of Dallas met with members of the Chamber of Commerce Tuesday morning, and told of his company's plans to obtain 250 acres in the Plains area for cucumber production. Morton Company is a branch

of General Mills and built a factory in Dallas recently. He announced the company would contract the crops at 1 cent per pound, and that the crops would be a quick cash crop. It takes about 50 days to produce the cucumber crop. The Morton Company will take care of harvest arrangements, and will send in a crew to harvest the crops during the six weeks it will take to gather the cucumbers.

D. C. Newsom and Doyle "Hoss" Newsom brought Mr. Parkhill to the chamber meeting as their guests. Hoss was named by the chamber to aid Mr. Parkhill in securing the acreage. The senior Mr. Newsom gave a report to the 25 members at the Chamber meeting explaining that there is a possibility that farmers in the area can build up a promising vegetable business with the production of peas, beans, carrots, chili, etc. Less Barrett was also instrumental along with the Newsoms in getting the Morton Company representative to allot acreage to Plains.

In explaining the program further, Mr. Parkhill said that the Company will analyze the soil and make recommendations on the fertilizer and care of the crop. The Chamber endorsed the Morton Company's proposal and felt that it would help the economy of Plains.

Leaving Houston, the group went to Galveston where they collected specimens for the Science lab from the beach. The Sea Arama was also visited, where the group enjoyed a delightful act by trained porpoise and viewed many different species of fish. The group then traveled to San Marcos to view the fresh water aquarea. Here they were entertained by a spectacular submarine theater featuring Aqua Maids feeding huge cat-

fish, bass and perch. A sky-ride over Hariginez Gardens and an authentic Pioneer Town rides in glass bottom boats were also enjoyed.

The group then travelled to Austin, there the Texas Capitol and the University of Texas Campus were toured.

Enroute home the group stopped in Johnson City, the home of President Johnson.

### Cleatus Phelan Speaks To Tsa Mo Ga

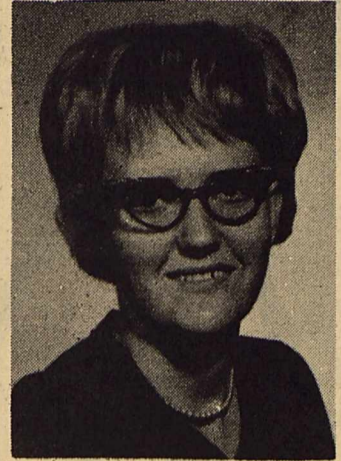
The Public Affairs program of May 11th postponed because of Easter holidays was presented when the Tsa Mo Ga Study Club met April 25th at the clubhouse.
