Voters went to the polls Tuesday in six South Plains Counties and expressed mixed emotions on the creation of a Water Conservation District in Yoakum, Terry, Cochran, Dawson, Gaines, and Andrews counties. The measure carried in Yoakum. Terry, and Cochran, but failed in Gaines, Dawson, and Andrews Counties.

In Yoakum County the measure carried for the city of Plains and the county, but voters in Denver City voted not to enter the proposed district. Plains voters carried the measure by a three to one majority with the vote being 72-24. In the county the voters voted approval by a count of 63 to 43, while Denver City voters rejected the proposal by a vote of 99 to 65.



Over-ton, local ASCS office manager all Yoakum County farm operators signed up to participate in the 1966 Cotton program with 90 percent signing to divert the maximum and the balance signing at 25 or 12.5 percent. This does not include the small farms of 10 acres or less that are not required to make a reduction to comply. Under the feed grain program 360 farms signed intentions with approximately 96 percent signing to divert the maximum. There was 79 wheat farms signed up in the program for 1966. Operators should keep in mind that to comply with the program they must divert the acreage sign-

with the program, should keep in mind that they must set aside an acreage normally devoted to the crop being diverted which is equal to the intention which they signed to divert. This acreage must be cropland in whole fields or acreages of reasonable size and shape within a field. Farms that are diverting two or more crops are limited to six regular shaped plots. No crops can be harvested from the diverted acreages except the approved oil seed crops and no pasturing can be done after April 30 or before November 1st.
