# Yoakum County Vote Heavy In Close Primary Races

Gene Bennett, well known Yoakum County rancher and member of the board of regents of Abilene Christian College, lead a field of four to win a place in the run-off for the office of County Judge in the primary election Saturday. Incumbent Judge Stanley
Duvall managed to also keep hope for re-election alive by edging Plains lawyer Cleatus Phelan for second place on the ticket. Dr. Boyd finished fourth. Bennett held his own in the balloting in the Denver City precincts and far outdistanced Duvall in the rest of the county. It was apparent that the recent re-districting of the county precincts played more than a major role in the election, since out of almost 700 votes cast in county precincts three four, Judge Duvall only polled 33 votes, while Bennett received 267 votes and Phelan 318 votes. Bennett will challenge Judge Duvall in the special run-off election next month and the race will be decided between the two at that time. Duvall received majorities in all of the Denver City boxes except one, and he lost it by only three votes to Bennett.

Veteran County Treasurer Vicie Hinkle was defeated for her bid for re-election by Wilda Hancock of Denver City. The vote ended in a close contest with Mrs. Hinkle losing 1015-1163. A close contest had been predicted in this

Long time County Commissioner Pearl Loe will face Johnnie Fitzgerald in the special run-off election. Fitz-gerald lead the field of four in the race with 192 followed by Mrs. Loe with 132, T. J. Bearden with 113, and Allan Wagley with three votes.

In the race for County Clerk Ruby Heald lead the field with 698 votes, and will face Marguerite Barron who polled 549 votes. It was a close contest with the other candidates receiving many votes. Bufford Dulin polled 506 votes and Wanda McCrary received 440 votes. Long time clerk J. W. O. Aldridge did not seek re-el-

Judge Bandy won a landslide election over challenger Sherm Tingle in the race for Justice of the Peace. Judge Bandy received 517 votes to

173 for Tingle.

In the District Clerk's race, incumbent Blanche Dyer lead the ticket, but will face opposition from Ray Trent in the special election. Blanche Dyer polled 871, followed by Ray Trent with 517. Art York, 505 and J. E. Jim Cooke with 290.

Veteran County Commissioner H. C. Doc Cotton won his bid for re-election by out-distancing Glen Hennington 513 to 359. Cotton is Com-missioner of precinct Two.

Voting was considered as heavy in the recent election in Yoakum County since every race was contested except state representative and state senator. Jesse T. George won re-election to the Texas House and Senator Doc Blanchard was uncontested for re-election to the state senate.

wyer, and a former candidate for county judge issued a formal endorsement of Gene H. Bennett for the office of county judge. Bennett opposes incumbent Judge Stanley Duvall in the run off election.

Phelan said he was endorsing Bennett because he believes Bennett to be the most qualified man in the race. The Plains attorney carried the northern end of the county in the first election, but did not receive enough votes to get into the run off.

Phelan stated he is asking the people who supported his candidacy to vote for Bennett in the run off election. The Plains lawyer said he believes if elected that Bennett will serve the county as a whole

When contacted by the editor of The Record, Bennett said he was aware that Mr. Phelan was endorsing his candidacy publicly, and that he accepts the endorsement with

gratitude.

Both Phelan and Bennett stated the re-districting of the precincts in Yoakum County was one of the main issues in the race and that the expenditures at the County Park were also major issues in the cam-

## Cotton Vote Soon

County will vote this month to decide whether they want to be able to sale or lease their cotton allotments outside the county. This year the referendum will be conducted by mail during the deriod of May 16th thru May 25th. Ba-llots amy also be delivered in person to the ASCS County

The question to be decided by the balloting is whether upland cotton allotments may be transfered by sale or lease during the next three years to other farms outside the county (Texas counties only) which are owned or controled by someone else. A yes vote by at least 2/3 of the counties cotton farmers who vote will permit transfers out of the county for 1967, 1968, and 1969

crop years. A referendum on the same question was conducted last fall at which time Yoakum County farmers did not approve the transfer by sale or lease of Yoakum County cotton allotments to other co-

unties in the state. Under the 1966 program cotton farmers in 60 Texas counties voted to sale and lease allotments and operators of 82 Yoakum County farms purchased acreage allotments from the counties eligib1sale or lease allotments for

Ballots for the May 16th to May 25th referendum will be mailed to all cotton farmers on our mailing list within a few days. All cotton farmers are urged to mark the ballots and return it to the county office on or before May 25th, For a ballot to be counted it must be in the county office before the close of business on

May 25th. Eligible cotton farmers that do not receive a ballot by mail may obtain a ballot from the local ASCS Office.

CROPLAND ADJUSTMENT PROGRAM

The final date to make application under the cropland adjustment program will be May 13th, 1966 and the final date to sign a contract will be June 10, 1966. Under this program a producer must divert least all of one allotment or base for at least 5 years.
COVER CROP ON DIVERTED

Cruelty to Animals

To brighten up a dull afternoon, two men tied an oil can to a dog's tail and set the oil on fire. At the time it seemed hilarious. But the men did not laugh when they were hailed into court and found guilty of cruelty to animals.

Few of us today would quarrel with the court's ruling, Yet, until comparatively recent years, cruelty to animals was not a crime at all. The common law did protect the property rights of an animal's owner, but did not protect the animal itself. Thus:

Suppose A abused B's horse. B, having suffered an injury to his property, could collect damages from A. But suppose B abused his own horse. Or suppose the horse was a stray, with no owner to be



concerned. Then the law kept silent. Nothing stayed the brutal

But if the common law did not condemn, common decency finally did. In a striking shift of public opinion, cruelty to animals-in itself-has now been branded every-

where as a crime. Economics has nothing to do with it. When a man was fined for turning an old horse out to starve, the court spoke not of the dollar value of the horse but of the moral outrage to one of God's creatures.

reason. Thus we may kill an animal-humanely-for food. "Otherwise," a judge noted, "one could not slaughter a pig or ox for

the market, and man could eat no more meat." Furthermore, we may hit an animal in self defense. A man who struck a frenzied cat, which had a

death grip on his hand, was held to have acted within the law. Also we may chastise an animal as a matter of training - or perform surgery on it as a matter of health. Nor are cruelty laws carried to unreasonable extremes. Surely it is no crime to swat a fly

or bait a hook with a worm. What the law does denounce is conduct that affronts the modern conscience. One court put it this

'Animals whose lives are devoted to our use and pleasure deserve kindly treatment. The dominion of man over them, if not a moral trust, has a better significance than the development of malignant passions and cruel instincts. Human beings should be kind and just to Mr. & Mrs. Tom Box and ir dumb brutes, if for no other reason than to learn how to be kind
