## State Road News

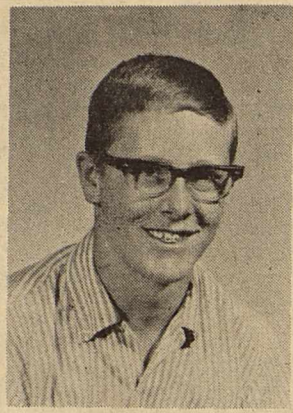
The Texas Highway Patrol investigated four accidents on rural highways in Yoakum County during the month of April according to Sergeant E. Roberts, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in two persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$8,750.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first four months of 1966 shows a total of seven accidents resulting in no persons killed, three persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$12,060.00.

Higher pay, more opportunities, and a chance to choose the geographical area of the state where they will be assigned are featured items in the Texas Department of Public Safety's bid this month for more than one hundred new patrolmen. "The pay during the training has been increased from \$468 to \$484 depending upon the branch of service to which the patrolman is assigned," the Sergeant stated.

## 4-H Play Days Start Next Week

The 4-H Club Play Days will begin the 1966 season on Saturday afternoon, May 28th. Mr. Polly Rushing is the president of the 4-H Adult Leader group to handle the Play Days. Each of the ten Play Days held this year will be in the rodeo arena at Plains. The first one is a day time affair as are the last three but the Play days during June, July and August will be held on the second and fourth Thursday nights.

## ASC Cotton

Under the 1966 Cotton Allotment Program, Yoakum County farmers will, according to W. M. Overton, local ASC office manager, if they comply with their signed intentions, plant approximately 26,000 acres of cotton.

This will be the smallest number of acres planted or eligible to be planted since 1950. Yoakum County farmers purchased, leased and transferred some 12,000 acres of cotton allotment from other counties making some 5,300 cotton allotment acres for Yoakum County based on projected yield.

Each 4-H Club member who participates in the Play Day will be allowed to choose any four of the six events. There will be Pole Bending, Flag Racing, Ring Sparing, Barrel Racing, Key Hole Racing, and Break-away Calf Roping. A point system will be maintained during the season and the winners of each group will receive a trophy at the end of the year.

A special class has been added for beginners this year which will be called the novice class. This class was set up for those who are learning to ride and are not familiar with the various contests in the Play Day. Points will be given in the novice class and the contestant will move into their regular class when they have earned as many as 25 points.

All 4-H Club members who were 17 years of age or less on January 1, 1966 are eligible to enter the Play Days. There will also be classes for Pee Wee boys and girls. This group is for those who are not 4-H Club members because they are less than 9 years old.

All regular members and Pee Wee's who wish to participate should be at the arena by 1:30 p.m. Saturday May 28th.

## Postal Cards Due

Postmaster Hayes reminds patrons of the Plains Post Office to be on the lookout for June Livestock Survey cards. Next week survey cards will be placed in a sample of boxes belonging to farmers and ranchmen.

"USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to this survey," Mr. Hayes explains. "It is important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the letter-drop. This way, USDA gets a true sample of the area's livestock and poultry holdings."

Survey cards will be forwarded to Cary D. Palmer, State Agricultural Statistician in Austin. After adding and analyzing these cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the State's milk production, calf and pig crops, lamb and wool crops, and the number of hens and pullets.

"Information from this survey will guide livestock and poultry producers in making important business decisions," Mr. Hayes concludes.

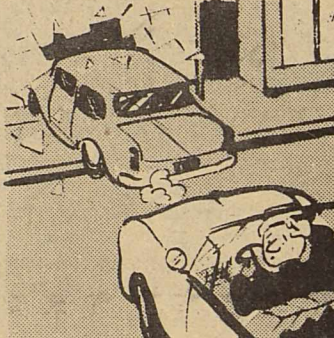
Whenever you set a second car in motion with your own car, you suddenly expand the scope of your responsibility. One judge put it this way:  
 "In so handling two cars, the driver must be as mentally alert and as physically responsive as a western cowboy riding two horses Roman fashion."  
 On the other hand, pushing another car is not wrong if you proceed with care. Even if there is an accident, you are ordinarily not liable if you were not negligent. For example:  
 A kindly motorist offered a push to a man whose car had stalled in the street. After pushing it about 20 feet, he let the front car roll ahead on its own momentum. The driver reached the corner, turned — and hit a woman pedestrian.

In due course the injured woman sued the good Samaritan, arguing that he had provided the original impetus to the car that struck her. But a court held him not liable, since the accident happened after he had broken off "control" of the front car.  
 As a rule you may assume, in pushing, that not only the other driver but also the car itself will behave in a normal manner. Consider another tight-parking-space case:  
 Here, the motorist nudged the car ahead, little suspecting that it had been left in gear with the ignition on. The motor caught—and, as he watched in helpless horror, the car crossed the street and crunched through a plate glass window.  
 But again, the motorist was held not liable for the damage done, since the front car's behavior was so unexpected.  
 Thus, in judging your liability for pushing another car, the law requires you to allow for dangers that may fairly be anticipated—but nothing more. The law demands foresight. It does not demand clairvoyance.

## THE FAMILY LAWYER

### Pushing Another Car

Trapped in a tight parking space, a motorist decided to push against the car behind him. He glanced into his rear view mirror, then started moving backward.  
 Unhappily, his quick look hadn't shown that the woman who owned the other car was just opening her door to get in. As he pushed her car, the open door struck and injured the woman.  
 She sued later for damages, and the man was held liable for his failure to take a better look before pushing.  
 "Such a maneuver," said the court, "is dangerous and should not be undertaken until safety has been made reasonably certain."

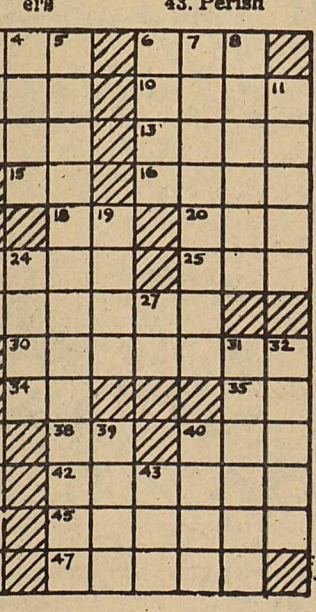

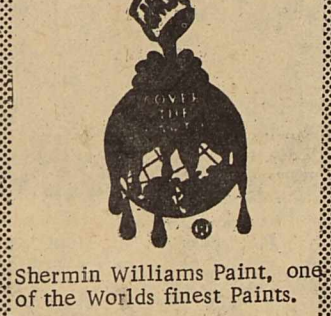

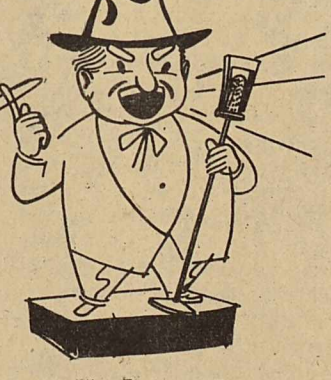

## WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" By C. WILSON HARDER

As any working newspaperman knows everybody knows more about how to run a newspaper, especially those who have never run one.  
 But so far newspapers have been fortunate in the fact that the doctrine of the freedom of the press has kept out of their hair the interference by bureaucrats.  
 Thus, news papermen can by and large, feel some sympathy for the C. W. Harder broadcasting industry under the thumb of the government in the form of the Federal Communications Commission.

As everyone recognizes, television is mainly show business. What one thinks of the current offerings is not so important, as no one is forced to look at a bad show. But the shows are designed to reach an audience, just as a movie or stage play is designed to attract people.  
 One of the severest critics of the TV industry has long been E. William Henry, retiring chairman of the FCC. He is a 36 year old law school graduate who spent some three years practicing law before hooking on with government.  
 Despite the fact that he has never written a show, produced a show, and perhaps not even acted in one, he has been quite voluble about what the content of TV shows should be. This is a strange manifestation of bureaucracy. A man can be appointed to a job like this, with absolutely no experience in the show business, and by virtue of the appointment immediately becomes another George Bernard Shaw. Ibsen, Shakespeare and Cole Porter rolled into one. And judging by some of their utterances, it is doubtful even with effort that they would ever attain in show business a level above Minsky.

In the youthful retiring FCC chairman's latest blast at the broadcasting industry, he fulminated quite extensively on cigarette advertising. Obviously some TV cigarette advertising is pretty stupid, but it is doubtful that it accomplishes much in undermining nation.

Of course, he refers to the current bit of governmental nonsense whereby it is now the law that all cigarette packages announce use of the product may be a health hazard.  
 Now this piece of information was perhaps not startling news to anybody. Every youngster in school is taught that cigarettes are bad. They are also taught that alcohol is harmful. This has been going on for years, yet the consumption of both keeps going upward.

And if the teachers in a person's youth, and his private physicians in his adulthood cannot sell him this viewpoint, how does any bureaucrat expect he can succeed.

This is a perfect example of bureaucracy running amok.

If the mere fact of holding a government job makes anyone infallible and omnipotent, then it is perhaps fair to quire how come that infallible wisdom was not employed to prevent a situation wherein boys are now killed in Vietnam.

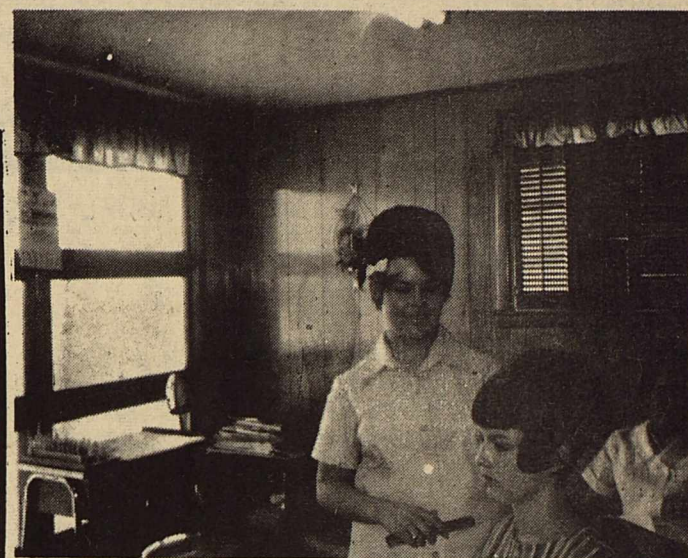

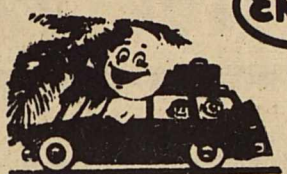



SEVERAL MYTHS regarding the current grain sorghum situation are developing among some national and area farm and grain trade people. This could be exceedingly damaging to producers and the trade serving them if decisions on future production, marketing or financial plans were to be based on the MYTHS rather than FACTS as reflected in the new grain sorghum statistics just out.

MYTH No. 1. Government programs causing cutbacks in grain sorghum production is the cause of reduced grain stocks.

FACT No. 1. Either from the stand point of acreage or bushels, the production of grain sorghum is expanding both in Texas and the Nation—since 1956. Maximum grain sorghum acreage in Texas was 7.6 million in 1958, but production was only 251 million bushels—37 million bushels less than this past year.

MYTH No. 2. Exports are the principal drain on current stocks and main cause of reduced carryover and that grain sorghum exports have been unduly increased as compared to other grains.

FACT No. 2. Even with strong promotion efforts, sorghum exports have not increased as fast as corn exports. Corn exports in 1959 were 211 million bushels, in 1965 they were 570 million bushels—up about 3 times. Sorghum exports in 1959 were 98 million bushels, in 1965 they were 200 million bushels, up 2 times. The biggest increased use of sorghum has been in area and other domestic livestock feeding, up from 172 million bushels in 1956 to 435 million bushels now. Over twice as much grain sorghum is fed as is exported.

MYTH No. 3. There will be a 30% decrease in milo production on 1966 because of the big sign-up.

FACT No. 3. The number of sorghum acres out of the government program will expand more than acres in the program. With normal weather and usual yield increases, 1966 sorghum production is expected to equal or surpass the 1965 record crop. Feeding and exports will both be up a little more so the carryover may be less and the market strong.

MYTH No. 4. Increased aid and trade demand an immediate release of sorghum and other feed grain acreage to production, and farmers look only to these increased sales for maintaining or expanding income.

FACT No. 4. Secretary Freeman said that "Even if food aid is increased it will have little effect on corn and grain sorghum exports for hungry nations don't feed livestock." Trade for feed grains will continue to develop at about the same rate as in the past few years. These demands could have a strong effect on sorghum growers in 10 to 15 years—but what about this year's and next year's need for income—with current freight and port situations, it doesn't appear that looking for it is the answer and that keeping some soundness in the administration of current farm programs hold greater promise. The stated purpose of the current reserve commodity bill which indicates that the principal purpose of a reserve should be to protect consumers against price rises in grain.
