





All farm operators should keep in mind that they must have the acreage reported on or before August 15 to be eligible for payments and price support loans and participate in any of the programs.

The housewife is getting blamed, the farmer is getting blamed, business is getting blamed, somehow every body is being blamed but the federal government which goes cation. merrily on its way spending more and more money it does not have.

During last year inflation cost the residents of Texas the equivalent of 4.6 percent sales tax on every purchase, that's \$235 lost by each average Texas citizen. Our state's average yearly loss toinflation from 1961 to 1965 has been \$468 million. During that same, time the federal government has run itself \$31 billion deeper into debt, and by February of this year the federal government already had exceeded by 164,000 the number of jobs on which the President's budget is based.

And the farmer? He's getting four cents a pound for lettuce the housewife is paying 28 cents for; he getting 33 cents for a dozen eggs that cost the consumer 54 cents; he's getting about two cents for a pound of potatoes for which the housewife pays six cents.

Both farmer and housewife are being hurt by inflation's two-way pinch. But the guilty party is the federal government's fiscal irresponsibility.



After studying the situation at length, and discussing the matter with people who are qualified in the financial world, and consulting with engineers, we believe that after the first of the year when the new county officials assume office that one of their first actions should be to consider the possibility of creating a central motor pool for county road equipment and vehicles and possibly employeeing a road superintendent for Yoakum County.

This system works to great advantage to the Army, Navy, U.S. Government, state, big business, and many counties. It saves duplication of equipment, and cuts the maintenance expense considerably.

We believe the plan to be one of merrit and urge officials to consider the proposal for the advantages which it may afford.

Another revision in the structure of county government which is required in counties with population of 10,000 or more which some smaller counties use is the possibility of setting up an office of purchasing agent for the county. We believe this is also worth exploring, and are convinced that there is a need for this office in our county. 



Lets Cook

BY SUDIE THOMPSON The Home Demonstration Clubs and the 4-H Clubs are now thinking of Out-of-Doors Cookery. With the beautiful weather and the lovely green parks it is a time to enjoy the fellowship with friends while cooking and eating out of doors, whether in the parks or in our own back yards. Modern barbecue furnaces provide a means by which food can be prepared in an attractive and nutritious way with little loss of time and ener-

gy. The following is a whole meal using live glowing coals in a barbecue furnace for cooking:

Pups in a Blanket TOBST COT Biscuits on a stick Somores Fruit punch Prepare the corn first by removing the outer shucks. Loosen the inner shucks and remove silks carefully. Brush generously the kernels of corn with garlic butter which is prepared from 1/2 cup butter, 1/4 teaspoon paprika, and 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder. Tie the shucks in place with a string and wrap in aluminum foil. Place on grill over glowing coals. The corn should be turned frequently. Cook 10 to 25 minutes depending on the tenderness of the corn. 'Pups in a Blanket' - Split frankfurters and insert a strip of cheese and pickle. Wrap with bacon and hold together with toothpicks. Place on a green twig. Heavy wire or a skewer may be used. Broil slowly over hot coals. Biscuits on a Stick are no trouble when made from Biscuit Mix. The recipe for the Mix was in the paper several weeks past. Put 1 cup Mix in mixing bowl. Add 1/4 cup water and mix slightly. Knead dough on floured board and make slightly stiffer dough than for ordinary biscuits. Heat and flour end of broom stick. Mold biscuit dough over end and up about 4 inches and cook over glowing coals about 12 minutes, rotating to get an even brown. For dessert have 'Somores.' Place a marshmallow on the sharp end of a stick or wire. Toast over glowing coals until brown. Place on a graham cracker. On top of marshmallow place 1/3 of a thin chocolate bar and on top of that place another graham cracker. Mash to flatten marshmallow. Fruit Punch; Yield; 25 servings Size of serving: 3/4 measuring cup each 3 pints of orange juice 1 cup lemon juice 1 cup grapefruit juice 3 to 4 cups sugar Add sugar to fruit juices and stir until dissolved. Add ice water to make 1 and 1/4 gallons of liquid.
