Zip Help Given

Residents in the Plains area will be offered an opportunity to Zip Code their mailing lists during October, Postmaster Hayes announced today. Beginning about Oct. 10 'No postage needed' cards will be placed in all post office boxes and on the route. The cards will have blanks for addresses used most often, but for which individuals do not know the proper Zip Code. These cards are to be filled out with street number, city, and state, the cards are to be mailed to the Postmaster. Post Office personnel will add the proper Zip Codes and return to the sender. This Christmas, Zip Code will be as important as shopping and mailing early for the efficent and on-time delivery of the record breaking avalanche of mail expected in the pre-holidays.

Previously, the Post Office department has embarked upon an extensive effort to help volume mailers convert their lists to Zip Code. 'This is a good time to get the Zip Codes missing from your lists'. Only addresses not names of correspondents should be listed on the cards, the Postmaster said, Zip Codes represent delivery areas for the Postal Service not individuals.


