he believes to be the 10 top news stories of the year.

Beyond a doubt the story which ranks number one was a top regional story in the area. It was carried over the wire service in nearly every state in the Union and was published in foreign papers. This of course was when friends and neighbors rallied to help L.E. Lemly retain his freedom when it was discovered that he had walked away from an Alabama prison.

The number two story of vote. the year was the weather. Plains was given regional coverage last summer when the area received 14 inches of rainfall in the period of a week. Early freeze on the cotton crop caused near disaster to farmers in the area. This in turn caused the number three story to take

Rated number three was the emergency grant totaling about \$400,000 which was awarded last week to the local F.H.A. Office. Congressman Mahon helped secure the grant for the

Politics reigned as the number four story. In the primary election well known ranch er Gene Rennett defeated judge Stanley Duvall in his bid for another term. Johnnie Fitzgerald won a seat on the Co. Commission by defeating incumbent Perl Loe. J.W.O. Alldredge did not run for another term as county clerk after serving over 20 years, and and the electorate selected Ruby Heald as new clerk of the county. Incumbent Vicie Hinkle was defeated by Wilda Hancock for treasurer. Politics kept much alive in the news after the county was re-district ed and Doc Cotton won reelection over his opponent. Other victors included Blanche Dyer and Jesse T. George. Sen. John Tower won re-election in the state and also car-

ried Yoakum County by a big Two deaths rank as number five. These included the late Murphy Luna, prominent rancher, and Mrs. Addie Mc-Ginty, pioneer ranchwoman.

The High flying volleyball team from Plains were once more in the top 10 news stories as they won their 5th consectitive state championship and their coach, Mrs. Bob

Gross was named Citizen of the Year for 1966. When electors voted for the creation of a water district it made big news during the year. Plains and Yoakum County voted approval, but Denver City

rejected the plan. The number eight story of the year happened when Morton Food Company contracted for cucumbers to be raised in the Plains area, and \$55,000 was pumped into the economy as a result of Morton Food Company, Inc.

Last January Plains was honored when their star fullback, Joe Dan Cooke, was named All-State, and made the first team.

Rounding out the top ten stories was the closing and reopening of the Yoakum County Clinic when Dr. Reynolds came to Plains. This also closed the book on medical reporting in the State of Texas, and and Harry Cayce won first place and received the Anson jones Award for journalism.





Death Watch Starts For Big Week-end

The 'Death Watch' will resume for the New Year's weekend, beginning at 6 p.m., Friday, December 30, and continuing through 11:59 p.m., Monday, January 2. Indications for the New Year's period are that 36 persons will die in traffic accidents.

Legal Notice

AN ORDINANCE REGULA-TING THE KEEPING OF DOGS IN THE CITY OF PLAINS PROVIDING FOR A LICENSE AND TAX: PROVIDING FOR THE VACCINATION OF DOGS: PROVIDING FOR A DOG PO-UND: PROVIDING FOR THE REDEMPTION OF DOGS AND THE DISPOSAL THERE OF IF NOT REDEEMED: AND PROVIDING A PENALTYFOR THE VIOLATION OF THIS O-RDINANCE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PLAINS, TEXAS.

PROVIDING FOR DOG TAX AND VACCINATION.

Beginning the 1st day of January, 1967, an annual Tax of \$2.00 per dog will be assessed within the city limits of Plains.

All dogs must be vaccinated for rabies by a licensed veterinarian with certificate of proof furnished annually. No refunds will be made on any dog license fee collected by the City of Plains.

It shall be the duty of the animal warden or City Policemen to seize and impound dogs running at large within the City of Plains.

Any citizen of Plains may be authorized to seize stray dogs and deliver them to the dog pound.

Dogs will be held for 6 days and if unclaimed will be ordered destroyed.

Violation of said ordinance will be subject to fine not to

exceed one hundred dollars. If any dog within the City of Plains shall unprovoked, bite or otherwise attack any person who is not trespassing or teasing such dog will be declared vicious or don-





Tips on Tuna

½ teaspoon salt Biscuit dough (below)

Heat oven to 425° Mix all ingredients except Biscuit dough. Roll Biscuit dough into a rectangle, 12x10 inches. Place on baking sheet. Spread tuna mixture down center of dough. Make 7 cuts on each side from edge of dough to tuna filling. Bring first two opposite strips over filling; seal ends. Continue to crisscross remaining strips. Bake 15 to 20 minutes. Serve with creamed peas, if desired. 6 to 8 servings.

Biscuit dough: Mix 2 cups Bisquick and % cup milk with fork. Beat vigorously 20 strokes until stiff and slightly

sticky. Knead 8 to 10 times on lightly floured cloth-covered board.

A fishing plug is much like a naughty child when it misbe-haves. Both should be cor-

Few fishermen recognize the Few fishermen recognize the errant ways of certain lures, claim the fishing authorities at Mercury outboards, and as a result, they fail to sense the delicate balance between effective lure action and that which seems to flash "beware!" Plugs go astray for numerous

reasons. They take a beating when cast against rocky shores or snagged on underwater obstacles, and they also suffer damage when carelessly banged

around in tackle boxes.

Unfortunately, the difference
in action between a healthy plug or a crippled one may go unnoticed by the average angler . . . even when it doesn't catch fish.

If the line-tie, or screw-eye to which the line attaches, is the the side the plug won?

bent to the side, the plug won't track correctly. Lips that have been banged or twisted, even slightly, will destroy intended action. Hooks must swing freely and hangers must be in line. Hooks that freeze at an angle are a decided problem.

Most difficulties can be remedied with a pair of long-nosed pliers and a few minutes of testing. On long winter evenings, the bathtub will serve as a good proving ground. Make slight adjustments and then test the action by pulling the plug through the water.

Often, the action of new plugs can be improved by minor "surgery," say the Mer-cury folks, but always work cautiously and test often.

Remember, if a plug doesn't

zig, zag, wiggle or nod exactly as it should, it won't catch fish.



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
