

# LEONARD LEMLEY FREED BY GOV. CONNALLY

Chamber  
Backs  
Bonds

The Plains Chamber of Commerce met Tuesday morning and drafted a resolution in support of the City Council's ordinance calling for a bond election February 4th. The Chamber members went on record supporting the issue and cast a unanimous vote to work for the passage of the election.

Before the City Officials completed their study on the water proposal, the Chamber had voted support and urged them to effect a plan which would give good strong water to the city and to find a way to make Plains a protected city against fire hazard.

In passing the resolution, members of the Chamber expressed their belief that with an improved water system in Plains that the business outlook would be better to attract industry and new businesses.

The new Chamber president said he hopes that the voters of Plains will study the facts and see for themselves the advantages and disadvantages of voting a bond issue. He said if they do this, I am sure that they will find that the advantages of the proposal are far ahead of the disadvantages.

The Chamber of Commerce in Plains is composed of members from large and small firms, and also of individuals who have a civic interest in their town. The Chamber of Commerce uses the slogan 'Proud of the Past, Plans for the Future'. With this in mind, the Chamber of Commerce members adopted the resolution endorsing the City plan for water improvements.

Newsom also urged residents to register in order to become qualified to vote in the election. Newsom also said he is hopeful that other organizations and groups of people will speak out for the issue if they believe in it.

## Farm Talks Set Friday

There will be a meeting of farmers in the District Courtroom Friday morning, January 27, at 10:30 o'clock. A team of three specialists from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, A. & M. University, will be present to make talks and answer questions. All farmers in Yoakum County are urged to attend.

Dr. Robert W. Berry, Area Plant Pathologist, will handle the subject of diseases with special emphasis on verticillium wilt. Mr. William H. Lyle, Area Irrigation Specialist, will cover the subject of water conservation and pump efficiency. Mr. James H. Valentine will talk about fertilizers and soil testing. Mr. Valentine is the Area Soil Chemist and the technician in charge of the Soil Testing Laboratory at Lubbock. He is the one who makes the fertilizer recommendations when farmers send in a sample of their soil for analysis.

County agent, Leo White, says the meeting will begin promptly at 10:30 and these same men will be in a similar meeting in the afternoon at the Community Building at Denver City. Farmers in the Plains area who are unable to attend the morning meeting may want to be at the Denver City Community Building at 2:00 p.m.

## I.O.O.F. Lodge


The Friendship Circle will meet with the I.O.O.F. Lodge in Plains the 1st Thursday in February, said W.F. Upton spokesman for the lodge.

## Engineer Explains Scope of \$100,000 City Bond Issue

The editor of The Plains Record met with H. Bennett Reaves, P.E., one of the consulting engineers retained by the city to undertake a study to make recommendations for improvements to the water system, and the following is a description of the scope of the study and the recommendations which were made to the city:

The Firm of Parkhill, Smith and Cooper, Inc. was retained by the city of Plains to undertake a study and to make recommendations to the city on improvement for the water system as to standards required by the State Health Department and the State Insurance Commission. The local water system is neither approved by the Texas State Health Department, nor is it rated by the State Board of Fire Insurance and is an unprotection city.

The requirements of the State Health Department are that the water be disinfected or chlorinated. The water be from an improved source and of an improved quality, and that the wells be constructed to meet certain standards in order to eliminate possible pollution or contamination. That pump stations and reservoirs be constructed to preclude contamination and to insure a safe and reliable source of domestic water.

Among specific requirements of the Texas State Board of Insurance are the following:

### FINANCING PROJECT

To finance a program of this magnitude the City has applied to the Federal Government through the Farmer Home Administration for a Grant in Aid of \$250,000.00 and a loan of \$50,000.00. The funds for the city's share will come from the issuance of general obligation bonds and \$50,000.00 in water works revenue bonds subject to the approval of the voters February 4th.

The city fiscal agent and the engineering firm conducted a study of the past few years operation of the water department and other related city operations to determine if a tax rate increase or water rate increase would be necessary in order for the city to be able to repay the added indebtedness. The study indicated that with a normal rate of growth of a city this size, and with present city services remaining approximately the same that it would not be necessary to increase the water rate or taxes.

The engineering firm submitted their report with recommendations to the city based on the foregoing requirements. Included in the recommended improvements are:

1. Drill and equip two new wells on a 60 acre tract of land on which the city has acquired water rights;

2. Construct a 12 inch water main from the well field to a new 500,000 gallon ground storage reservoir to locate-

ed in the vicinity of Ave A and 11th.

3. Construct a Booster Pump Station with 1500 gallon per minute pump and chlorination facilities.

4. Extend existing distribution mains to furnish fire protection to practically every residence and business within the city limits. These mains consist of approximately 16,000 feet of 8 inch pipe and 11,000 feet of six inch pipe together with 36 standard fire hydrants.

5. Cost of these facilities is estimated to be approximately \$300,000.00.

Members of the Plains Chamber of Commerce elected Doyle C. (Hoss) Newsom as new president to head the local

Newsom owns and operates the D.C. Newsom Gin in Plains. For many years he was associated with his father D.C. Newsom, who announced his retirement last year.

The new Chamber of Commerce president has been active in Chamber of Commerce work in Plains for years and was one of the people instrumental in securing the Morton Food Company vegetable contracts for the county last summer.

The Plains Cotton Ginner said he will work hard to help build a stronger Chamber in Plains and made plans for a membership drive which will start soon. Newsom appointed Darrell Lindsey as membership chairman. Businessmen and farmers can expect to be called on during the drive; however Newsom said if anybody is accidentally missed to please notify him and he will be happy to secure their membership in the Chamber.

Bill Loyd was elected First Vice President. Loyd is the president of the Plains State Bank. He has also been active in Chamber of Commerce work.

Harry Cayce, editor and publisher of the Plain Record was named second vice president, and Pete St.Romain, manager of Romain Telephone Co. Inc., was re-elected as secretary and treasurer. D.N. Taylor was acting as president after the resignation of Cleatus Phelan, who was recently named County Attorney in Tahoka.

The Chamber president also appointed D.N. Taylor to set a date of the Annual Awards Banquet.

## Nursing Home Accepted

The Plains Nursing Home, 505 E. 7th, Plains, was accepted as member of the Texas Nursing Home Association by the TNHA Executive Board at their January meeting in San Antonio, Texas. Delila Mae Lowe will serve as the representative of the home in TNHA activities.

By becoming a member of the Texas Nursing Home Association, the Plains Nursing Home has agreed to abide by the TNHA Code of Ethics and to join with the state organization in its efforts to raise nursing home standards and to improve patient care in Texas.

TNHA is the professional association of licensed nursing and custodial care homes in Texas. Its membership is made up of proprietary and non-profit homes. All members of TNHA are also affiliated with the American Nursing Home Association.

The areas of activities in which TNHA engages include information, education, publications, representation, public relations, and many others. TNHA's prime objective is to work for the professionalism of nursing home personnel with the care of the patient as the ultimate consideration.

In what was described by veteran capitol observers as a rare action, Governor John Connally refused to sign extradition papers requesting the return of Leonard Lemley to Alabama to prison last Friday after Secretary of State John Hill conducted a hearing for Lemley in the Old Supreme Court Room in the Statehouse at Austin. Secretary Hill took the recommendation of 26 Plains area friends and neighbors of Lemley who attended the Austin hearing and asked Governor Connally to block Alabama's efforts to imprison Lemley for the balance of a 20 year sentence which was received in 1942, before Lemley's now famous deportation from an Alabama prison farm in 1944.

Governor Lurleen Wallace was quoted in the Huntsville, Alabama paper as saying, 'We have no comment on the decision of Governor Connally as we do not have available to us the facts on which he made his decision. However, we feel that he had sufficient reason to justify the action he took.'

Jim Spotswood, editor of the Birmingham News said that newspaper opinion in Alabama also favored the action that Governor Connally took.

The Plains farmer and his family were overwhelmed with the good news which was received by them during the noon hour Friday while they were at the office of Lemley's attorney, Calloway Huffacre, Tahoka. The Lemley's phoned their daughter and her husband in Lazbuddie, Rev. and Mrs. Calvin Beach, and talked to their other daughter in Alaska. The Lemleys have four children and nine grandchildren.

Jim Spotswood, editor of the Birmingham News broke the news to Lemley several minutes after it came over the wire. Spotswood in telephone conversation with the local editor, Harry Cayce, said that Lemley was almost overcome with joy upon learning of the good news.

Mrs. Lemley said that they had been unable to sleep during the ordeal of the waiting for a hearing in Austin and were worried sick, then this good news came to us, and now we just can't relax because of the excitement of hearing the news.... Both Lemley and Mrs. Lemley said they thank their friends and neighbors for standing with them during their time of need. They said that the Good Lord for this blessing of having another chance.

Both Leonard and Mrs. Lemley said that words just couldn't express their gratitude to those who signed the petition and who went to Austin in their behalf. They did not want to name the many who stood by them in fear that somebody would be left out, but the Lemleys asked that special thanks be given to Brother Cecil Williams, minister of the Hillside Church of Christ and to Rev. Jim Bozeman, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Plains.

One friend of Lemley's just about summed it up when he said, 'I isn't what a person was, but rather it is what he is and will be that really counts'. Lemley's friends are glad that he can at last call Plains his real home without the fear of being taken away at any given time.

It could have happened in a Zane Grey Western, but it didn't, it happened in Plains, just a small village in West Texas, U.S.A.

## Fat Stock Show Beef Feed News

The boys and girls who are feeding beef calves for the 1967 Yoakum County Junior Fat Stock Show have their animals going down toward the finish line.

On February 17th they will weigh the calves for the last time and the big day will be Saturday morning, February 18th. That is the day Mr. Calvin Holcomb, County Agent from Seminole, will de-

cide which calf gets the big rosette and is named the Grand Champion Steer of the Show.

Mr. G.W. Cleveland is sponsoring the beef calf gain contest which began on the third Saturday in May and continues until the weigh-in at the show. Lynne Fitzgerald was the winner of that award last year and she has a good chance to be the winner again. Lynne has two calves this year and both of them are good gaining animals. She has a young Hereford calf that has gained 658 pounds with almost four weeks yet to go. Diane Fitzgerald has a heavy Hereford calf that has gained 641 pounds and is in second place at the present. Lynne's other calf is a big cross-bred steer that has gained 624 pounds.

All the other calves weighed in the January weigh day last Saturday had gained less than 600 pounds. The calves will be divided into two weight classes after they get to the







**Dirt Gardeners Hold Arbor Day Ceremonies**

The Plains Dirt Gardeners held their annual Arbor Day ceremony, Friday, January 20 at 4:15 p.m., on the Courthouse lawn. Participants in the ceremonies were Mesdames: Wilson Duke, who spoke on 'Nothing More Beautiful'; Bill Overton, her topic was 'Trees'; Foy Cogburn gave the Benediction.

Mrs. Joe Henry Thompson, County Agent gave the history of Arbor Day. Many members of the Dirt Gardeners attended and special guest, Judge Gene Bennett.

The following are excerpts from Mrs. Sudie Thompson's informative talk.

An evergreen will be planted on the Courthouse lawn in the near future by the Plains Dirt Gardeners to be decorated and used as community Christmas tree each year.

Arbor Day was born in the minds of a few people who understood the importance of trees, particularly the economic importance. In less than a century after its origin, Arbor Day has become a

National and International movement. Throughout its development, the observation of Arbor Day has been accelerated by a growing public awareness of the importance of forest resources.

Arbor Day as we know it, was first observed in Nebraska, a State in which only 3% of the land area was covered by tree growth.

The need for observing Arbor Day in Texas was first recognized in a community which originally had comparatively few trees, Temple, Texas. It was in 1889 that the Citizens of Temple held a mass meeting on a street corner and passed a resolution advocating the 22nd of February as Arbor Day. Senator Tyler of Belton introduced this resolution in the legislature and it became a law.

Then less than half a century after its citizen's requested the establishment of Arbor Day, Temple was recognized throughout the state as an attractive city with tree lined streets. What was ac-

complished in Temple can be duplicated in many other Texan communities, especially in areas where landscaping is sorely needed.

Celebration of Arbor Day as a community and Club function pays dividends in added beauty and civic pride.

Our original Arbor Day law expired in 1925 and during the succeeding 24 years, the custom of observing Arbor Day on George Washington's birthday was continued by the Governor's proclamation. Then in 1949 the Texas State Legislature adopted the resolution designation the third Friday in January as Arbor Day.

In commemoration of Arbor Day in 1967, the State Forest Service presented Gov. John Connally of Texas with a new gavel manufactured from five different kinds of Texas trees.




