

The feed grain payments

Provisions relating to tenants and sharecroppers, All tenants and sharecroppers who

share in the production of crops must be shown on the 'Intention to Participate and Application for Payment' form. Payments must be made through this office to producers who share in the production of crops. No application for payment can be approved if the county committee determines that any of the following conditions exist. If any of these conditions are discovered after approval, all of the payment or such part thereof as the State Committee may determine, shall be refunded to CCC. A. The landlord or operator has not afforded his tenants and sharecroppers, if any, an opportunity to participate in the program.

The landlord or operator, in anticipation of or because of participation in the program (s), has reduced the number of tenants and sharecroppers

on the farm. Failure to replace a tenant shall not be considered a reduction in the number of tenants or sharecroppers if:

1. The tenant or sharecropper leaves the farm voluntarily or for some reason other than being forced off the farm by the landlord or operator in anticipation of, or because of, participation in the program, 2. The tenant in the prior year was a cash-rent, fixed rent, or standing-rent tenant who did not live on the farm or receive 50 percent or more of his income farming.

C. There exists between the operator or landlord and any tenant or sharecropper any lease, contract, agreement, or understanding unfairly exacted or required by the operator or landlord which was entered into in anticipation of participating in the program and has the

effect of: 1. Forcing the tenant or sharecropper to pay over to the land-Cont. on page 5

2. Changing the status of any tenant or sharecropper so as to deprive him of any payment or right which he would other wise have had under the pro-

3. Reducing the size of the tenant's or sharecroppers producer unit.

4. Increasing the rent to be paid by the tenant or decreasing the share of the crop or its proceeds to be received by the sharecropper.

Any other scheme or device has been adopted for the purpose of depriving any tenant or sharecropper of the otherwise be entitled to receive under the program.

Social Security and Employer Identifying Numbers: Any person who is eligible to receive payments under the 19 67 programs is required to furnish this office with his social security number if he has not already done so. An employer's identifying number is required for trusts, estates,

History

Mr. Thomas Weldey was the founder of the I. O. O. F. in the United States. Weldey was born in London England on January 15, 1793. He was initiated into the London I. O. O. F. at the age of 21 and went through all the chairs in two years. On July 30, 1817 he left his home land and landed in Baltimore Maryland on the 2nd day of September. He came west to pratice his trade as a coach maker. He was an expert in making and tempering the heavy steel springs required on the vehicles of that

Wildey soon found work at his trade. In 1818 he met John Welch who was a fellow member of the I.O.O.F. and they became good friends, They discussed forming a lodge. Several other men met with them and the Washington Lodge NO. 1 was formed on April 26, 1819. Mr. Weldey was elected Grand Master in 1837. While making his visits to New Orleans he received a petition to establish a Lodge in Houston. The Houston lodge was formed in 1838 and is still a working Lodge. At that time Texas was not in the Union.






