## George Stands Against Racing and Liquor Bills

State Representative Jesse T. George visited Plains Friday and conducted a legislative meeting at Almas Cafe with Yoakum County residents in order that pending legislation could be discussed and to give area people a chance to talk with their representative about legislative questions and problems in general.

Rep. George appointed Harry Cayce, editor and publisher of The Plains Record to serve as legislative chairman for Plains and Mrs. Ruby Heald, Yoakum County Clerk, to serve as secretary on his lo-

cal legislative committee. The Yoakum County solon took a strong stand against Governor John Connally's proposed bills which would allow the avenues of horse racing and liquor by the drink to become a reality in Texas. Rep. George said he favors strict controls to be placed on the operation of private clubs in the state and legislation which would equip enforcement officials with the power to combat illegal sales of alcoholic be-

verages in Texas. The former teacher took a positive stand favoring legislation which would protect the business man in collecting debts. He also said the proposed bill would make buyers more responsible.

Rep. George is a member of the education committee and also serves on the important Constitutional Amendment Committee. He said he is working to help update the state constitutiona dn wants all amendments fully explained to the people on the ballot. He refereed to the last constituttional amendment election as

They include such measures as conservation cropping systems, Crop Residue Management, Range Land and Pasture management, Cover Crops. Irrigation Water Management. Brush Control and other conservation measures to protect and improve the soil.

Some outstanding jobs of Crop Residue Management can be seen all over the District, there are fields being protected by a good stand of grain sorghum stubble, forage, such as red top cane and then where there is not enough residue supplemental tillage is being used as in the case of cotton stalks or where a poor stand of the high residue crop resulted. The land can be protected and at a price we can all afford. When we protect our soil we protect industry, hospitals, schools, homes and highways thus we all benefit.

The week of February 18th to February 25th has been designated as Future Farmers of America Week in Texas. 

Mrs.Pat Minor related an ordeal filled with terror and desparation to the editor of the Record. She gave an account of the events which unrayeled before her last Sunday night telling her story with emotion. Mrs.Minor's face was badly bruised and many stitches were in her face where she had been brutally betten by her assailant.

In a special interview with the editor of the Plains Record Mrs. Minor said that she had been to church at the Pleasant Hill Union Church Sunday night and had gotten into

her Mustang automobile and started to drive to her home, which is located about two miles from the church. She said that she had started driving and had tuned in the radio as she usually does when she felt someone breathing on her neck and saw a black hand on her shoulder. She continued in saying that she smelled the odor of alcohol, and she screamed. The negro, who admitted that he hid in Mrs. Minor's car, told her not to be afraid and to stop screaming. Thomas had worked for the Minors, who are farmers, so she stopped screarning and asked what he was doing in her car. Mrs. Minor said Thomas told her that some men were chasing him.

and he was trying to get away. The negro then climbed over the seat and tried to kiss Mrs. Minor. Mrs. Minor said she was so frightened that she ran into a pile of dirt and stopped the car. After several attempts to escape Mrs. Minor was able to snatch the keys from the car and she ran into a field but was overtaken by the young negro father of two. The negro told Mrs. Minor repeatly that he did not want to hurt her and did not want to use his gun. Mrs. Minor did not see the gun. Mrs. Minor said she fell to

the ground in the struggle and that the negro bit her about the eye. About 12 stitches were required to close the wound. She was also bitten on the hand.

The Yoakum County woman reported that a car came by and that it slowed but didn't stop. She said the attacker held her mouth and she could not cry for help, but the terrified lady kicked her legs into the air in hopes that the occupants of the car would notice her. The car stopped and started to back up, and at this point the negro made Mrs. Minor say she would not turn him in, and he fled:

The lady ran to a farm home and the Boggs family helped When they returned to her. Mrs. Minor's car, her husband had been notified and was there.

Mrs. Minor was taken to the Denver City Hospital where Dr. Squires treated her. The negro was arrested about 30 minutes after the complaint was filed by the Sher-

iff's deputy Bill Jones. Olan Heath, Yoakum County Sheriff urged all ladies in the community to be certain to check their cars before getting into them at night. He said this is a lesson which was terrible for Mrs. Minor, but one which could possibly save somebody's life.

Judge Bennett told Thomas before passing sentence that he hoped that the defendent had learned a lesson from what alcohol could do to a person.


