

Yoakum County Clerk Ruby Heald Friday received from Texas Acting Gov. Preston Smith an order calling for a special election in Representative District 75 for the purpose of selecting a successor to State Rep. jesse George who has resigned.

The special order sets the election date for November 11, 1967. This is also the date that the public will vote on the constitutional ammendments.

The order affects five counties comprising the 75th District. They are Yoakum, Cochran, Terry, Bailey and Hockley.

Deadline for candidates to file for places on the ballot is midnight October 11 and the applications, plus \$5 filing fees, must be in the office of Secretary of State john Hill by that date.

Applications for places on the ballot are available from the county clerk.

Immediately upon receiving the special election order, Mrs. Heald began preparing new maps howing voting precincts in Yoakum County. Since the last general elections, two new polling places have been added.

The United States has been called the 'Melting Pot' of the world by historians and socialoligists, and nothing could be more discriptive of West Texas than this statement. We are a people who live close to the soil and even in the atomic age mother earth regulates our lives much as it did in the days of Grandad. West Texas is filled with people of Anglo, Spanish, Mexican, French, German, Swedish, Danish, Dutch, Iewish, Italian, Bosque, Dutch, Norwegian, Chineese, and American Indian decent. These people of the South Plains till the soil, and tend to stock animals as their primary source of livelyhood.

In general the inhabitants of the South Plains are more conservative than are their cousins who inhabit the state. For the most part, their approach to the mysteries of life is in the fundimental method. Their code of living today remains much as it was four generations ago. They want to be left alone, and are not primarily concerned with problems which they are not primarily concerned. Inhabitants of the South Plains are as unlike their cousins in East Texas as they are their neighbors in California. West Texans on the South Plains live with a fierce pride that is similar to that displayed

by their forefathers when they came out on the Plains to build a civilization to last. They live under a code of life which can be put in simple terms amounting to a lot of prayer and a little rain can solve almost any problem which arrises. They are even convinced that their land is as rich in beauty as any other part of the country.

West Texans, on the South Plains, still are a unique breed of people who are part of a minority which is fast approaching a thing of the past. We are still rural America, and are among the minority who finds pleasure in association with friends and a group who delights themselves in self entertainment with friends. The parlor games are a thing of the past in urban America today, but on the South Plains, out in West Texas, people need no invitation to visit a neighbor. and stick to the tradition of visiting a friend without a thought being given to what Emily Post has written as proper.

Emily says don't call a person on the phone after 9:00 p.m. or before 9:00 a.m. This rule wasn't intended for this area. With the exception of teenage calls, probably about half of the phoning in the area happens between these hours.

West Texans on the South Plains, like their cousins, have to a degree become addicted to the 'idiot box' (T. V.), and in most cases do not retire to bed as early as dad did; however they are still quick to rise, and hit the floor at hours that would seem ghastly to their city cousins.

Because of our peculiar sounding speech known as a nasal twang we have an unplesant sound to the rest of our countrymen, but this remains a part of our separate identity, and as we travel in other areas, we are immediately detected as West Texans. I've always felt that we speak what could almost be described as a foreign language all of our own which sounds to an outsider something like this . . I'ma gonna tellya how Texuns speek . . . Perhaps we could learn a great deal about speech from our cousins, but then again they can learn a great deal from West Texans on the South Plains. We still base our principals upon a firm foundation of a man can make out of himself what he wants to make. . . a man is judged by the fruits of his labor, and not by the size of his treasure chest. . . West Texans on the South Plains are not as interested in putting a man on the moon as they are in balancing a budget. They have always been quick to arrise to meet national emergiencies and will defend their country to the death, but they Cont. on Page 2

Increased physical activity such as swimming, tennis, and out door life-or even more walking-can help one lose weight if he is a careful calorie counter.

A sensible reducing diet is one that provides three wellbalanced meals a day. Naturally, one must cut down on the number of calories; for unless the calorie intake is less than the body needs for energy, excess fat will not be lostsay nutritionists with U. S. D. A. 's Research Service. Our Food Specialists also tell us that the fat content of home baked goods can be cut as much as 50%.

A typical cake recipe calls for about one part of fat for every 4 parts of flour, and the Research Service found that cakes with half the usual fat content looked as appealing as the regular cakes. The taste and feel was rated a little lower, and there was a small reduction in tenderness and velvetiness.
