

Yoakum County will have been organized 60 years next Wednesday. As far as we know there will be no celebration or noise making when the birthday event rolls around ... but this wasn't the case back on September 21st in 1907 in the county seat of Plains in Yoakum County out on the South Plains in West Texas.

The birth of the county called for an all day picnic, and people came from far and near to enjoy the events of the day which sound to me like we could learn how to live and enjoy ourselves a little more if we would turn our entertainment back over to GrandPa, and let him put us on a real party.

One of the main events of the day was a horse race. What did they do for a race track? They built one of course! The track was made by getting a big iron wash pot and turning the thing upside down and securing a chain through the handles and dragging it on the ground using horses to pull the thing. The race was a real thriller, and John Hudson raced to the finish line to victory to win the first race in the history of the county. As he crossed the finish line, the horse he was riding fell, and old John went tumbling head and heels in need of some vineager and brown paper. The horse broke its neck and was dead, but John was just shaken up a bit.

Another event which is still talked about was the greased pig chase. The porker was greased and turned loose, and the chase began. From what we can find out, the pig was as slick as the label indicates when a fellow says its as slick as greased lightning. After a merry chase and a lot of belly laughs, the greased pig was snared by Roy Fitzgerald who became the first pig snitcher champ of the new county. What about it Roy, could you still catch the greased pig? Roy sold the pig for a fat sum of \$5.00 after becoming the first champ in pig chasing contests on the books of the new county.

That must have been a fine all day picnic with all the trimmings. What a day it was for the whole community to get togather and have fun like that without worring about when 'As The World Turns' comes on the idiot box, or if a baby sitter could be found to keep the children while the parents attended the affair. In those days the whole family went along, and it wasn't a sin to enjoy a good horse race. (I wonder how much cash changed hands on the race. The records don't tell us.) From all accounts we have of the big event, it must have been a grand day for those who were there. The first officials of the new South Plains county were judge Holmes, Less Boyd, Clerk, M. G. Cash, Treasurer, J.

S. Webber, Tax Assesor, and Sheriff Lum Hudson. Members of the Commissioners Court were Pat McHough, Lee Roy McGravey, Roy Beal, and J. W. Hooker. The first District court officials included judge L. D. Kinder, L. C. Perry, Attorney, F. L. Boyd, Clerk, and M. B. Cannon, stenographer. The first members of the Grand jury included H. M. Haskew, M. Ceflet, D. T. Cates, C. H. Burrus, Harvey Hamilton, B. J. Edison, J. J. Kendrick, L. Townsend, L. B. Minor, James Hoppes, S. J. Dixon, and Bert Tingle. As quickly as possible W. J. Luna had the town site sur-veyed, and gave every voter in Yoakum County a lot in the city of Plains.

A lot of living has been crowded into those 60 years. We have come from the horse and buggy through two world wars and the auto and air age into the atomic and space age. Many people who attended the picnic 60 years ago are still liv-We wonder what they will think next Wednesday when ing. they turn back down memmory lane and remember old friends and great times when a new county was given birth out on the South Plains in West Texas. This is an experience that will not happen again, because the land is settled and a civilization has been built which lasted. The sun has risen 21,900 times since that day that Yoakum County was born. With each day a little more light has fallen on the South Plains bringing education and enlightenment to our area. Today the great schools and church houses are common place. We even have a airport and a modern farm supply center with towering elevators and gins, and big trucks to take the cattle to market. Sulphur Draw is no longer the highway to make a tiresome journey to Big Spring for supplies or for a doctor. Supplies are at hand and we can motor or fly any place that we feel the urge to see. Our county has taken its place with dignity with its sisters throughout the Lone Star State. It all started back in Plains at that picnic in 1907. Yes, 60 years is a long time, even in West Texas, out on the South Plains.


