*********** 1968 Cotton Program Told By Local ASCS Official

According to W. M. Overton, local ASCS office Manager, official notice has been received concerning the 1968 Cotton Pro-

gram, and the manager stated that the program had been announced. To be eligible for price support and diverted acre payments, at least 5 percent of the effective allotment must be diverted. This compares with 12.5 percent for 1966 and 67; with an option

to divert an additional 30 per cent. For diverting the 5 per cent, a diversion payment of 10.76 cents time the projected yield will be made; for diverting additional acres, a payment of 6 cents per lb. will be made. The price support payment which is made on 65 percent of the allotment will be 12.24 cents. This compares with 11.53 cents for 1967 and 9.42 cents for the 1966 program. The skip row regulations will be the same as in 1965; two rows cotton and two rows blank will be 50 percent cotton and two rows cotton and one blank will be two-thirds cotton. Based on 35% participation in the program, with the same yield and allotment, the total payments under the cotton program will be approximately 8.5 percent less than under the 1967 program and approximately 5 percent more than

will be the same as 1967. Cotton farmers will vote early in December to determine if cotton marketing quotas and the announced program will be in effect. Notices of farm acreage al-

lotments will be mailed to operators of cotton farms prior to the referendum. If marketing quotas for the 1968 upland cotton crop are disapproved by the farmers, the allotment program will re-

main in effect, but there will

be no acreage diversion program and no price support payments. Price support loans, however, will be available at 50 percent of parity to cooperators who plant within their allotments as provided

by law-The 1968 Cotton Allotments is expected to remain approximately the same as in the 1967 program. The County ASCS Committee will set a projected yield for each Cotton farm in the county and the final approved projected yield must not exceed the yield approved for the county which is based on a 5 year production period, 1962 thru 1966 with addiustments for abnormal weather conditions,

The final date for filing applications for the sale or lease of cotton allotments is january 2, 1968. Producers in 87 Texas cotton-producing counties have approved the transfer of allotments to farms cannot be transferred from one State to another.

A list of 87 counties that have voted to sell and lease allotment outside the county may be obtained at the local ASCS office. Farmers interested in leasing or buying cotton allotments should, however, keep in mind the announced program all depends on the outcome of the December Cotton Marketing Quota Re-





Historical Society

Mrs. P. W. St. Romain, chairman of the Yoakum County Historical Survey Committee as well as all members of the county committee have been invited to represent their county at the 1967 Annual Meeting of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee and the Texas Historical Foundation, its private affiliate.

The meeting will be held at the Moody Convention Center in Galveston, October 26 thru 28. The joint membership of the two organizations totals more than 3,000 members in 254 county committees.

The county committees will be competing for several annual awards at the meeting. These include "Best Committee Newsletter", "Best Program of Work for 1967", "Best Historical Scrapbook", and "Best Publication of Local or Regional History". Awards will also be presented for the "Best chairman of a County Historical Survey Somittee".

In addition to the awards, a versatile and informative program has been drawn up featuring noted speakers in the historical field as well as related areas of endeavor.

Keynote speaker for the meeting will be Ernest Allen Connally, chief of the Office of Archaelogy and Historical Preservation of the United States Department of the Interior, National Park Service. Connally Will address the Annual RAMPS Banquet on Oct. 7, at 7:00 p.m.

Topics to be covered at the meeting include "Authentic Restorations in Texas", "Texas Travel Trails" and "A Comprehensive Museum Program."

Participants will hear progress reports from the Institute of Texan Cultures; the State Building Commission on the state's archaeological work; and from the Parks and Wildlife Department on their Land and Historic Sites Acquisition Program as well as restoration of six historical Texas Forts.

There will also be scenic and historical tours of Galveston and the surrounding island. The group will visit Sea-Arama, NASA, San Tacinto Battleground and attend a complimentary Luau.
