**Bad Weather Halts** 

**Area Cotton Harvest** 35; Strict Low Middling l-in-ch-24, 60; Middling Light Sp-otted 15/16-20, 10; Middling The South Plains cotton harvest was at a peak until halted

by the adverse weather this week, according to W.K. Palmer, in charge of the Lubbock Cotton Classing Office of the US-Samples received at Lubbock, Brownfield and Lamesa

had reached a seasonal high of 40 to 45 thousand daily when the rain, sleet and snow interupted the harvest. The three South Plains Of-

fices classed 238, 000 samples during the week ending Wednesday, November 29th. The Lubbock Office classed 194, 000 of this total, the Brownfield Office-28,000 and the Lamesa Office-16, 000.

Through Wednesday, November 29th the Lubbock Office had classed 388, 000 samples of this year's crop, the Brownfield Office 85,000 and the Lamesa Office 33,000. This brought the total for the season for the three offices to 506, 000. The three offices had 157, 000 unclassed samples on hand on Wednesday. This brought the total classed and

received by the three offices to 663, 000. Cotton prices. the Consumer and Marketing Service of the USDA, declined \$5.00 to \$15.00 this week. Prices ranged from \$2.50 per bale over the loan for high grade, short staple cotton to \$75.

00 per bale over the loan for high grade cotton having staple length of 1-3/32 & longer. Demand continued strongest for cotton having micronaire of 3, 3 and better, and this cotton was selling at a greater premium over the loan. Cotton in the other micromire categories was generally selling at \$5.00 to \$15.00 per

bale over the loan. Average prices paid for the most predominant qualities in the 3.5 to 4.9 micronaire ranges were: Middling 15/16 -20. 95; Middling 31/32-24, 05, Middling 1-inch-26. 60: Strict Low Middling 3.1/32-22.

Light Spotted 31/32-22, 60 & Middling Light Spotted 1-inch -24, 65.

Cottonseed prices ranged from \$52 to \$70 per ton



### LEGAL NOTICE

RECORDATION AND LIMITATION OF CERTAIN CLAIMS OF WATER RIGHTS.

Notice is here given as required by Section 4 of the Water Rights Adjudication Act of 1967 (Article 7542a, Vernon's Civil Statutes) that all claims of riparian water rights, all claims under Article 7500a, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, to impound, divert or use public waters for other than domestic and livestock purposes for which no permit has been issued, all claims of water rights under the Irrigation Acts of 1889 and 1895 which were not filed with the State Board of Water En-gineers in accordance with the Irrigation Act of 1913, as amended, and all other claims water rights other claims under permits and certified filings, must be recorded with the Texas Water Rights Commission. Section 4 does not apply to use of water for domestic and livestock purposes as the same is defined by Com-

mission Rules. On or before September 1, 1969, every person claiming any water right to which Section 4 applies shall file with the Commission a sworn statement setting forth the nature of the claim of water right. Claims to which the Section applies shall be recognized only if valid un-der existing law and only to the extent of actual application of water to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year

PUBLIC NOTICE from 1963 to 1967, inclusive.
OF THE REQUIREMENT FOR However, in any case where any claimant of a riparian right has prior to August 28, 1967, commenced or completed the con-struction of works designed to apply a greater quantity of water to beneficial use, such right shall be recognized to the extent of the maximum amount of water actually applied to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1970, inclusive; provid-ed an additional sworn statement is filed on or before July 1, 1971. Failure to file the sworn statement or statements in substantial compliance with Section 4 shall extinguish and bar any claim of water right to which the Section applies.

Instructions and forms for recording claims may be obtained without cost from the Texas Water Rights Commission, P. O. Box 12396, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711.

The live tree is a symbol of the beauty and joy of Christmas; but a dry tree is recognized as a fire hazard. Most commercial Christmas trees must be cut well in advance of use. Often they are subjected to prolong storage. This in itself may not constitute a hazard; however, Texas imports over 3 million trees annually, and often storage may be in boxcars that undergoex-




