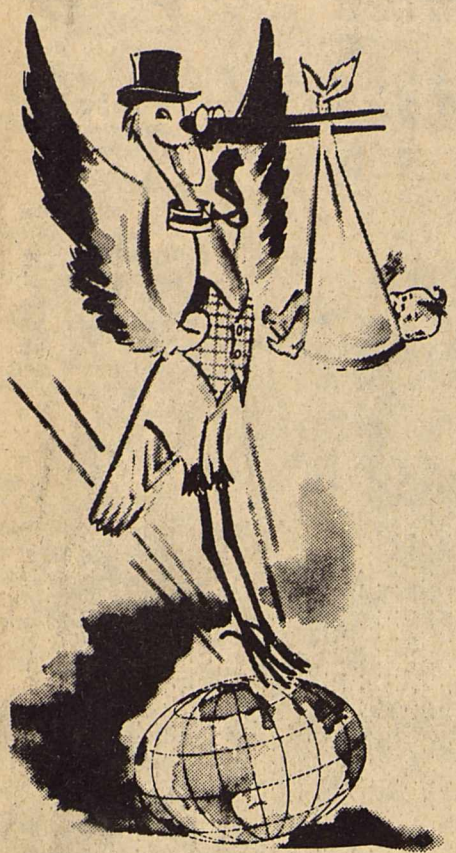

### Plains Record News Story Highlights of 1967

#### Recap Of News

THE TOP TEN news stories in Plains the past year have varied extremely good fortune to tragedy. The editor has listed the stories in the following order:

The state bound express of Coach Shirley Gross's Plains Cowgirls swept the opponents of the court at Gregory Gym in Austin and brought home a state Championship.

Ranking number two in importance was the Plains All Star Little League team winning the District title for the first time as the Plains team blanked Levelland 1-0 in a no-hit game.

In third place was the epidemic of infectious hepatitis which struck Plains, leaving a number of victims in the community.

The fourth place story occurred when young Donnie Morris was killed while serving his country in Viet Nam, becoming the first Plains fatality of the war.

In fifth place was the \$100,000

Bond Issue which carried by a two-and-one-half margin.

In number six place was the decision of Governor Connally to give Leonard Lemley freedom after a host of county residents plead for Lemley at the Austin hearing.

The number seven story was the First Annual Cowboy Basketball tournament from which Plains emerged as the Champion.

In number eight position was the sale of the Record by Harry and Ann Cayce to Joe D. Hughes and the appointment of Ray Trent as Editor and Publisher.

The number nine story happened when Rep. Jesse T. George resigned as State Representative and John Dendrick won the election for the balance of the term.

The number ten news story was the attempt to bring sugar beets into the Plains area and the asphalt mulch tests which were made here by Chevron.



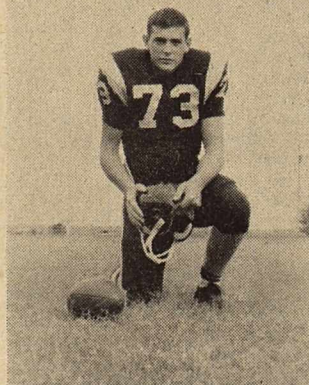
#### Kendrick Wins Run-Off

#### ALL STATE



Dan Field, six foot-two senior, was named All State tackle in the Fort Worth Star Telegram poll recently. The Star Telegram All State list is one of the blue ribbon lists conducted in Texas because it has the largest circulation in Texas. Also listed as honorable mention were Gregg Jones, Billy Taylor and Mike DeVries.

Field is the first player from Plains since Joe Dan Cooke to make the All State team. All four of the boys were named as District 5A All-District a few days ago.

The Cowboys had an impressive 9-1 record this year, losing only to Seagraves, the Quarter Final Champs of West Texas.

Dan is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ty Field of Bronco; Billy is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Neal Taylor of Plains and Gregg is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Jones of Tokio and Mike is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. O. DeVries of Bronco. Field, Taylor, and DeVries were part of the front wall that went all the way on offense and defense this season and Gregg Jones broke the school record in yards gained rushing this season.

It was not known at press time if any of the boys plan to play football in college.

### Death Toll Exceeds TOLL Of Last Year

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Christmas holiday traffic deaths exceeded the toll of a year ago but fell short of the record set in 1965.

Motor vehicle fatalities in the period that began at 6 p.m. Friday and ended at midnight Monday totaled 680. The total compared with 484 for a nonholiday weekend\* of equal, three-day length.

The record Christmas death rate for a three-day period was 720 in 1965. In the three-day observance last year the toll was 584. The all-time high for any

holiday period, 784, was set in a four-day Thanksgiving observance in 1966.

"It's a sad commentary if we have to take consolation from the fact that we didn't set a record this year," a spokesman for the National Safety Council said.

He said Americans apparently have forgotten the national fervor about traffic safety that engulfed the Christmas season last year during a time Congress was considering the subject.

"If the popular concern with traffic safety showed up during the last 12 months were still in effect, the total this holiday

probably would have been toward or below the low end of our estimate," he said.

The safety council, with headquarters in Chicago, estimated beforehand that 625 to 725 persons would lose their lives on the nation's highways during the Christmas holiday period.

As a comparison, The Associated Press on a nonholiday weekend of equal length to the Christmas span logged 484 traffic deaths. This count was made between 6 p.m. Friday, Dec. 15, and midnight Monday, Dec. 18.

The traffic tolls for previous holidays this year were: New Year's—469 in three days; Memorial Day—608 in four days; Independence Day—732 in four days; Labor Day—604 in three days; Thanksgiving—665 in four days.

### Brownfield Jailbreak

Tired, cold, hungry and suffering from exposure, James E. Adams, 32, surrendered to police in Brownfield just before press time, Wednesday evening.

Joe Audon Gutierrez, 27, still remains at large and is considered armed and extremely dangerous.

Five prisoners escaped from the Terry County jail Monday night. One prisoner, Charles Cleve Brooks, Jr., 38, defendant in a murder case, was captured following a gun battle in Plainview early Tuesday morning.

James T. Stevens, 24, charged with felony theft and burglary, was arrested Tuesday in Oklahoma City.

#### Office Closed

The cotton harvest was 95% complete in the Brownfield area and the Brownfield Office closed on Friday, December 22, according to W. E. Cain,

in charge of the Brownfield Cotton Classing office of the USDA. Samples remaining to be classed in the Brownfield area will be shipped to Lubbock for classification.

The Brownfield Office classed 14,800 samples during the week ending Friday, December 22, bringing the total classed this season from the Brownfield area to 160,000.

Grades of the cotton classed at the Brownfield Office last week were lower as the harvest neared completion. Light Spotted, Spotted and Tinged cotton made up 90% of all Cotton classed.

Middling Light Spotted made up 19% of the total classed, Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 22%, Middling Spotted 25% and Strict Low Middling Spotted 11%.

Staple length averaged between 15/16 and 31/32. Thirty eight per cent of the cotton classed at the Brownfield office last week stapled 15/16, 25% 31/32 and longer.

Micronaire continued the seasonal decline. Twenty-seven per cent of the cotton classed at Brownfield last week was in the desirable category of 3.5 and better. The previous week 35% was in this category. Sixteen per cent "miked" 3.3 and 3.4, 29% 3.0 through 3.2, 21% 2.7 through 2.9 and 7% was 2.6 and below.

Cotton prices, as reported by the Consumer and Marketing Service of the USDA, were lower for cotton in all micronaire categories. Cotton with Mic-

ronaire continued the seasonal decline. Twenty-seven per cent of the cotton classed at Brownfield last week was in the desirable category of 3.5 and better. The previous week 35% was in this category. Sixteen per cent "miked" 3.3 and 3.4, 29% 3.0 through 3.2, 21% 2.7 through 2.9 and 7% was 2.6 and below.

Cottonseed prices were steady and ranged from \$57 to \$70 per ton at the gins.

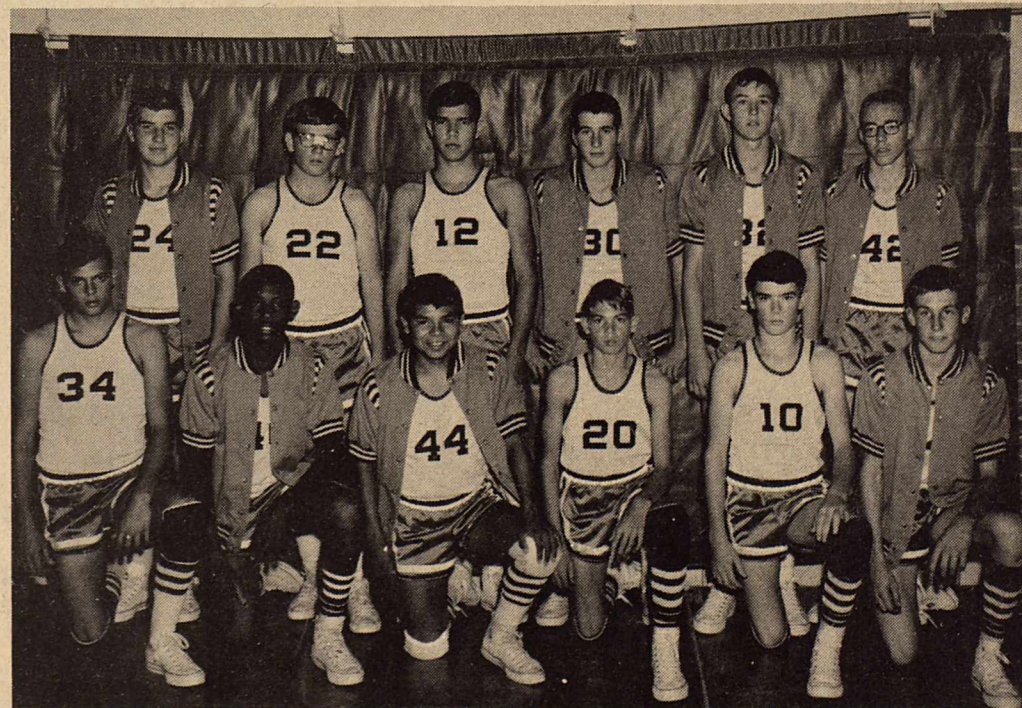
#### SLAYING PROBE Police Admit No Progress

For the protection of cultivated land against erosion by wind and water, nothing can take the place of continuous cover of dead or living plants, or both. This is true regardless of location, rainfall, soil, or the kind of farming or ranching that goes on. In the Plains country, however, the need for plant cover goes more important as conditions tend toward the dry side. At the same time, getting good cover becomes a tougher job. The job is two-sided: First, a crop must be grown that will yield good amounts of residues; second, the residues must be managed in a way that will protect the soil until a new crop covers it. Experience of farmers and ranchers and research work have taught us important lessons. We know that burning crop residues is one of the worst mistakes that can be made. And too much tillage wears out the residues and therefore should be held to a minimum. Leaving stubble and other crop residues on the surface has proved especially valuable in the grain summer-fallow areas where 15 or 16 months usually pass between harvest and the planting of a new crop. One way of leaving such cover and disturbing the soil surface as little as possible is by using equipment having sweeps or blades 32 inches or wider. This practice is known as stubble mulching. It is a year-round system. In it all tillage, planting, cultivation, and har-

vesting operations are done in a way to keep crop residues on the surface to protect the soil, where wheat is grown each year, more cutting or stirring of stubble is possible without serious harm. The period for seedbed preparation is shorter. Narrow sweep chisel-type implements, or even disk types in some instances, may be used. When sorghums are grown separately or in rotation with wheat, the principles are the same. They involve the conservation of residues during the critical period to protect against wind, runoff, and splash erosion. The same practices help develop a soil condition that will take in

moisture faster and keep it longer. In growing sorghums, if there is a high yield of stalks, as on irrigated land, it is safe to shred stalks coarsely and tuck them lightly into the soil with a disk. On dry lands, where yield are not so high, it is best to leave a high stubble during winter months. For sorghums in rows 24 to 42 inches apart, the usual minimum height recommended is usually enough. More residue than the minimum is better. Stalks and straw put organic matter into the soil, something sorely needed in all cultivated land. The wise use of crop residues, including stubble mulching, takes top billing in any plan of operations in the Great Plains Conservation Program.

Take twelve, fine, full-grown months, see that these are thoroughly free from all old memories of bitterness, rancor, hate and jealousy; cleanse them completely from every clinging spite; pick off all specks of pettiness and littleness; in short, see that these months are freed from all the past -- have them as fresh and clean as when they first came from the great storehouse of Time. Cut these months into thirty one equal parts. This batch will keep for just one year. Do not attempt to make up the whole batch at one time (so many persons spoil the entire lot in this way), but prepare one day at a time, as follows: Into each day put twelve parts of faith, eleven of patience, ten of courage, nine of

work (some people omit this ingredient and so spoil the flavor of the rest), eight of hope, seven of fidelity, six of liberality, five of kindness, four of rest (leaving this out is like leaving the oil out of the salad -- don't do it), three of prayer, two of meditation, and one well selected resolution. If you have no conscientious scruples, put in about a teaspoon of good spirits, a dash of fin, a pinch of folly, a sprinkling of play, and a heaping cupful of good humor. Pour into the whole love and libitum and mix with a vim. Cook thoroughly in a fervent heat; garnish with a few smiles and a sprig of joy; then serve with quietness, unselfishness, and cheerfulness, and a happy New Year is a Certainty. .... Leaves of Gold
