In order to vote in statewide elections, a person nust meet the following qualifications on the day of the election; he must be over 21 years old and must be a citizen of the United States; he must have resided in Texas for one year immediately preceding the election; and he must have registered for the voting year in which the election is held. In order to vote i local elections (county, school district, etc.), he must also have resided in the county for six months immediately precethe election. Residence in the city for six months is required for voting in a city election.

A new law enacted in 1967 permits voters who move from one Texas county to another within the period of six nonths preceeding an election to vote on statewide offices and issues if they have lived in the state for a year.

1968, The first and second classes may also register during the regular period. Registration certificates issued to persons not yet qualified to vote are marked to show the date on which they will become qualified.

Any person eligible to register apply for registration by mailing an application form to the county tax assessor-collector. Registration certificates will be mailed before the beginning of the voting year on March 1 to persons who apply by mail. Voters may also register by applying at the county tax assessor-

COACH L. T. "RIP" Sewell has resigned as head coach of the Plains High School Cowboys according to reports received today. His resignation will become effective on Friday, Jan. 12, pending acceptance by the school board.

He is leaving Plains to accept a job with an insurance company in Stillwater, Oklahoma, and will move there as soon as housing is available.

The Sewells came to Plains in the fall of 1957 and he has spent most of his time since then serving as head football, basketball and track coach. He also taught math, health, P. E. and Drivers' Education,

During his tenure here, he took an active part in sports away from his official duties, including mens and boys softball.

During his eight years as head basketball coach, Sewell's te-ams came home with five comference championships, four Bi-District and two regular chamtionships and placed fourth and second in the state.

During his five years as head football coach, the cowboys won or shared the District Championship three times.

Then, as track coach, Sewell's boys won two conference cham-

pionships. The Sewells have four children Karen, a freshman this year, David, a seventh-grader, Kathy, in the third grade and Danny who is in the first grade.

We are sure that their many friends and neighbors in Plains and the surrounding areas are going to greatly miss them. Mr. Sewell said that he deeply regretted having to leave Plains; that the people in Yoakum County were the finest people in the world and they had been extremely good to him and his ramuy.

The weather may have been cold but things were really warming up on the political scene today as two more candidates announced for re-election.






