TFB Votes To Support Sales Tax-If Needed

The Texas Farm Bureau board of directors have voted to support an increase in the sales tax from two to three percent-in preference to any other taxif additional revenues are needed by the state.

dent Sidney Dean of Victoria ports the U.S. Department of said voting delegates to the organization's convention last November adopted a policy stating that any additional revenue needs should be met by an increase in the present sales

He said the board's action was prompted by the Legisla-tive Budget Board's estimate projecting a need for some gnals emitted by a ripening \$150-180 million in new tax avocado. These signals indirevenue for the next biennium.

Dean emphasized that the organization favors retention of present exemptions in any increase voted.

The Legislative Budget Board estimates that a one percent increase, with present exemptions retained, would yield about \$140 million over a twoyear period.

How simple this device is--

What a boon this will be to you when shop for avocadoes. If you need a ripe fruit for immediate use, you can quickly spot avocadoes with the bright yellow stickers. If you need to hold the fruit for several days, you can select an avocado with a purple sticker and watch it ripen. You'll know its ripe when that under new provisions of the the sticker turns yellow. Also, the sticker will prevent losses from overripe fruit, because retailers can quickly spot the ripe avocadoes and merchandize them while they are at

their peak.
You might like to know about these Consumer Clips: When buying vegetables-experience is the best teacher, but an educated eye helps. Re-

gardless of type, pick the freshest and avoid the wilted, shriveled or decayed. Here are some pointers from the US Department of Agriculture. Broccoli and cauliflower: flower clusters should be tight and close together. Avoid broccoli with yellow flower clusters. Smudgy, dirty spots may indicate insects. In selecting cabbage and head lettuce, choose heads heavy for size. Avoid cabbage with wormholes and lettuce with discoloration or soft rot. Root vegetables should be smooth and firm. Very large carrots may have woody cores. Oversized ra-

dishes may be pithy. Overly large turnips, beets and parsnips may also be woody. Buying poulty to freeze? Remember the importance of wrapping. Your packaging materials should be moisture-vapor resistant to prevent evaporation, says the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Broiler halves can be wrapped together like a whole bird--or wrapped separately. If you wrap them together, place a double pi-

Garrison urged motorists to

have their cars inspected as soon as possible in order to avoid the long lines which will undoubtedly develop as the inspection period draws to a

Garrison reminded car owners law the inspection will include front seat belts in cars where anchorages are part of the manufacturer's original equipment, sterring, and wheels and

"Those motorists who wait until the last weeks of the in-spection period to have their cars inspected may find that they will need to install seat belts," Garrison said, "and with the last minute rush, there may not be enough seat belt kits in supply to take care of the demand. Dealers will have no way of knowing how many sets to have on hand, so to be on the safe side we urge all owners to have the work done as soon as possible."
