# Pole Uprooted Minor Damage Caused By Sunday Twister

A twister near Plains Sunday was added to the list of Mother Nature's Whimsical Moods for the month of March.

After days of high winds, balmy sunshine, snow and ice, the twister was spotted at 2:30 P. M. about four miles west on Highway 380.

Yoakum County Sheriff Olan Heath and Deputy Bill Jones related the twister cut across Hi ghway 380 over to Highway 314 and was headed toward Levelland before it dissipated.

The only damage was an uprooted power transmission pole

day, the storm could be followed by means of a six-milewide path covered by two inches of hail stones. No hail damage was report ed. Measurable moisture was re-

Drifts were reported to be four and five feet deep in parts of the county west of Plains.



## Sudie Thompson CHDA Says...

The Safety Committee of the Home Demonstration Association of Yoakum County has done some very fine work in getting many people of Yoakum County to become aware and to practice some safety measures that will make for better living.

Not only have such programs as refresher courses in Drivers Education, safety practices in the home, study of backyard poisons, snake bites, dangers of cleaners: but the testing and treating of drinking water has been extensively practiced.

Mr. Kyle Adams, the sanitarian serving Yoakum County, gave a demonstration to the Home Demonstration Council in the fall of 1966. The meeting was held in the Sligo Community Center. Mr. Adams demonstrated collecting samples to be tested. He also supplied the bottles for collecting the water. Within a very short time many samples had been brought into the Home Demonstration's office. The Sanitarian took these samples and after the water was tested reported to the office, and the user of the water. The wells in which bacteria were found were tre-

ated. As of December 1967, approximately 175 wells have been tested, and 45% were found to contain harmful bacteria. Mr. Adams is advising that the wells be tested again for

safety.
The following is from Mr. Adams: "Suitable water for drinking purposes seldom occurs in nature, Rain and snow waters become contaminated quickly by dust, insects, animals and man, Some of the organisma ininto water by these means cause typhoid fever, para-typhoid fever, bacillary, and amoebic 'dysentary, In order that we may free ourselves of these dreaddiseases, certain safeguards must be provided. We cannot depend on the physical appearance of water as a measure of safety, for it is possible for clear and sparkling water to be un-safe. For complete satisfaction the water supply should be safe pleasant to taste, clear, and free of gases and minerals that impart disagreeable odors. Too, a good water supply is one that is adequate for needs, dependable and convient. A minimum of 50 gallons per day is require:d in these homes with complete plumbing facilities. In homes not equipped with indoor plumbing the water demand may de-crease to about 10 gallons per person. Of course, additional

allowances must be made if livestockor irrigation water is obtained from the household

In this area practically all our water is obtained from we-11s usually from depths of 100 or 150 feet. Water thus obtained is more often free of bactteria than water from other sources. However, the mineral content on underground water is usually very high, Much of our water approaches the upper limit of 500 P. P. M. total. solids. Our water is usually very hard containing a great deal of calcium, magnesium, and bicarbinates. Most of our water contains 3 or 4 P. P. M. Floride which is about twice the reccommended level. This causes brown stains or mottled teeth.

Although underground water is usually safer than other sources. Test show that we are finding more and more wells that are contaminated. Mr. Bruce the State Water Engineer, said Lubbock County made a survey

of private wells and found ov-er 70% to be contaminated, Miland County had so many bad well they required all cesspoals to be replaced by septic tanks. Their water has improved. Our records show that we teat from 15 to 20 well a month, with about 45% showing contamination. Since a lot of wells we test are known to be bad, I estimate that only about 20 or 30 percent of our total wells would test bad. This figure would increase with our growth in population. We can prevent alot of this by proper location

and construction of wells. The well should be located 150 feet from stock and poult-ry yards, privies, cesspools, septic tanks, and adsorption fields. It should be located so that flooding and the entrance of surface water are prevented. Water formations located less than 10 feet from the ground surface, or wells drawing water from rock formations that are creviced or channeled should not be used for domestic purposes, until several tests have shown the water to be safe. Even than tests should be run a t frequent inter als as poluted water may travel long distances through cre ices in the rock. I think that some of our wells' are contaminated by polluted caliche and entering the water well".

straight through an abanded well or seismigraph hole which ha ve not been properly sealed. Abandoned wells should never be used for the disposal of se werage or other waste. I understand Mr. Cox, my predessor, once had to go to court to stop an individual who was polluting the community water supply running sewerage into an abandoned well.

The well should be cased from the water bearing formation to at least 18 inches above the finished concrete floor of the well house and should extend at le ast one inch above the pump or motor base. If possible it should be developed with a lar ger pump than the one to be used as in irrigation wells to reduce pumping of sand. It should be pressure cemented around the top ten feet of casin to preent contamination from top water, snails digging under the concrete and falling in, etc. One man told me that he cemented the top 20 feet of his well. to prevent a cesspool water from getting in. We occasionally find daed animals in wells that are covered with a six or ten foot concrete floor, Evidently they dig under and fall in be-'tween the casin and the outer wall of the well.
