

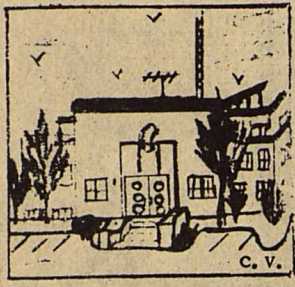

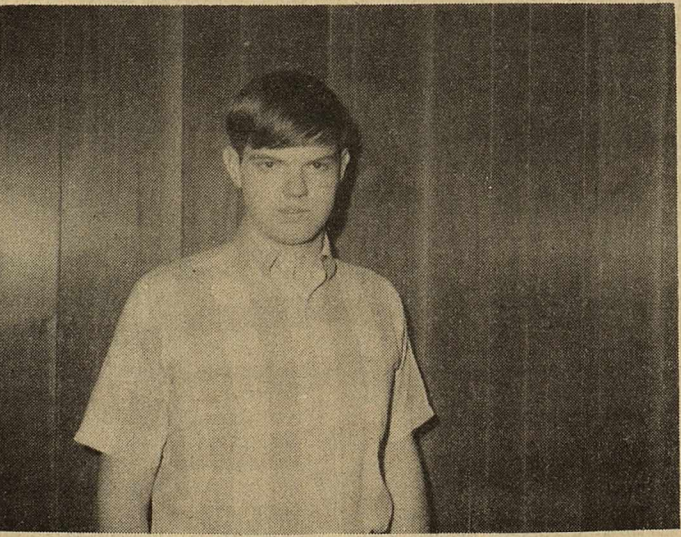
Baccalaureate Set For Sunday

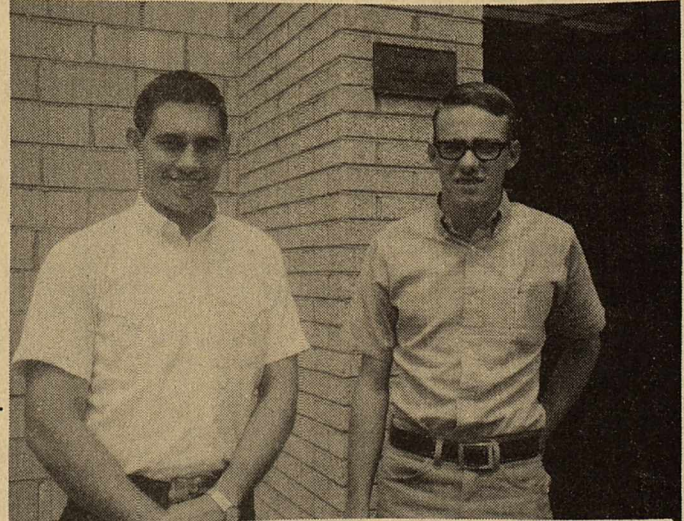
Annual Dedicated To Laura Johnson

6th Grade Band Places In Meet

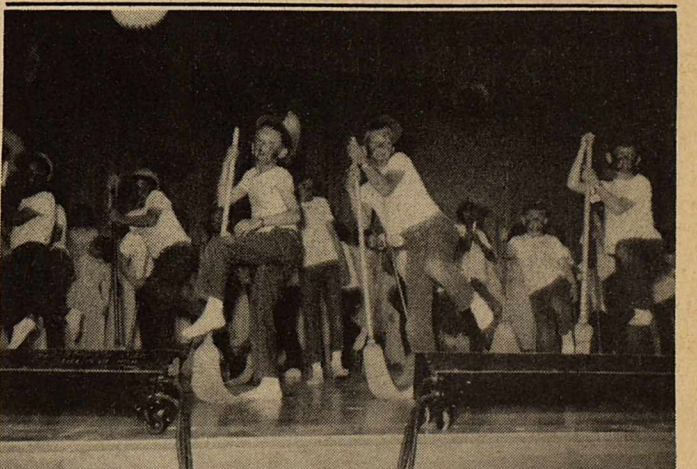

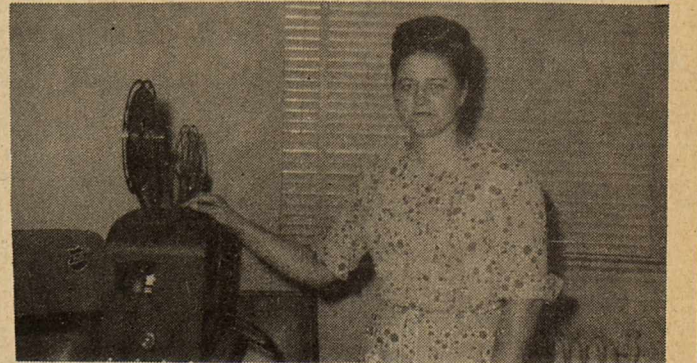
The judges rated the group as an exceptionally good band on sight reading for beginners. They also noted they were a neat looking group and attentive to director, Coy Cook.

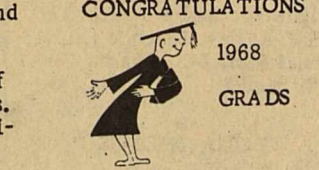

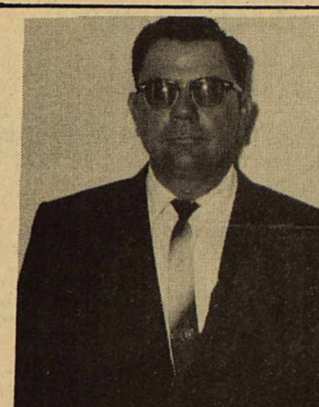

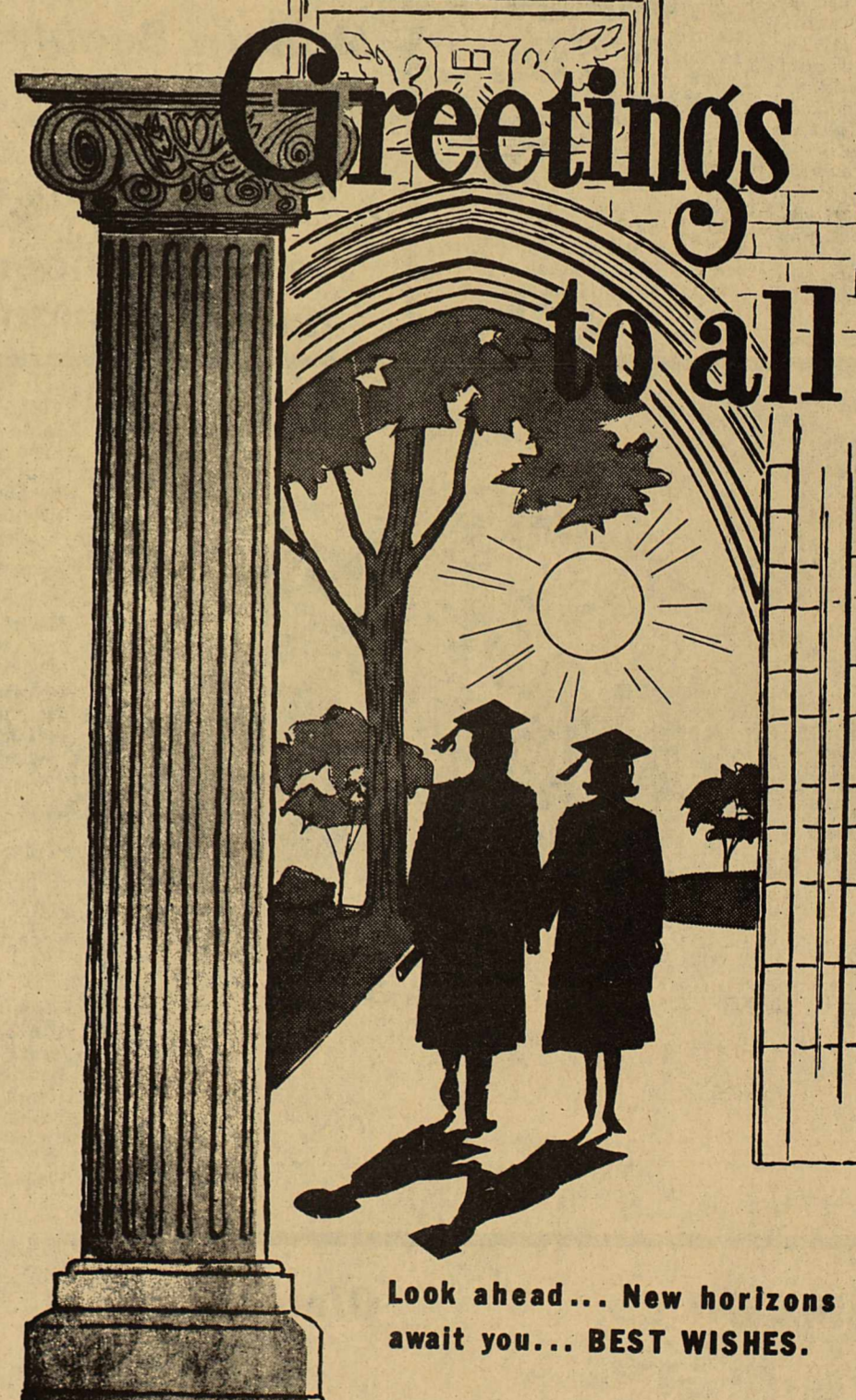

Mrs. A. B. Carpenter continued the tour by showing slides of the trip.

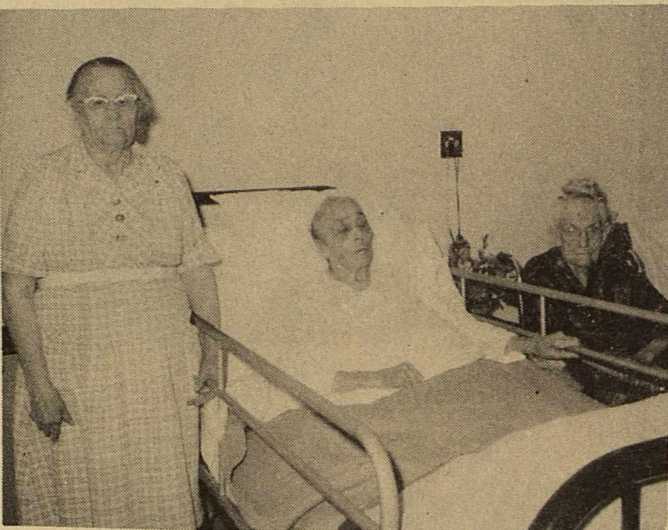
Mrs. P. W. St. Romain officiated at the installation of officers.

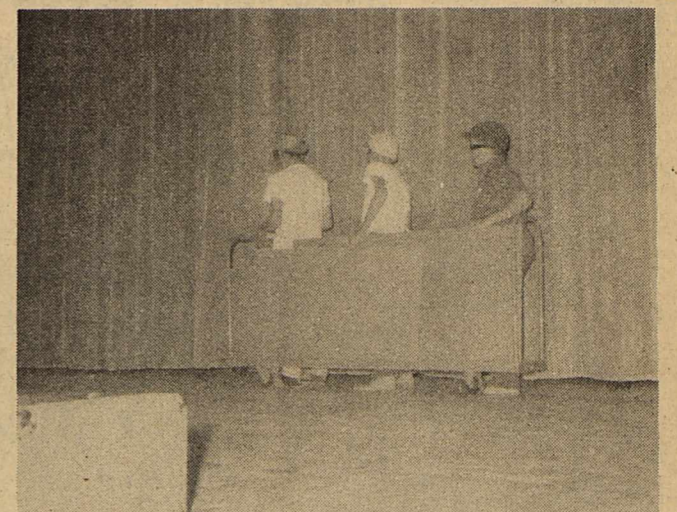

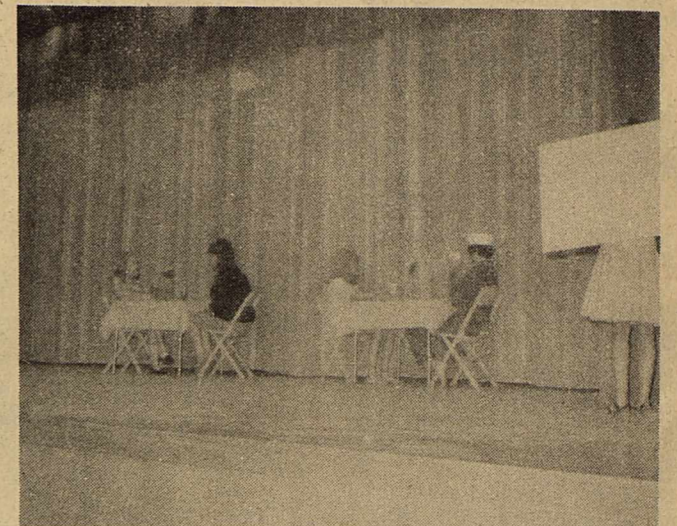
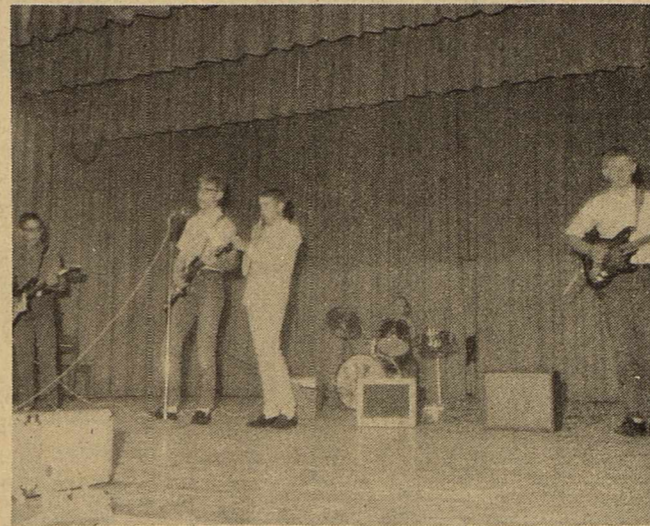

SOMETIMES THE IRON SHOULD COOL

"Strike while the iron is hot," admonish the sages. But anglers who use minnows for bait may be wise to sprinkle a liberal dose of salt on this particular adage. The fishing experts at Mercury outboards advise that hooking success is often directly related to the amount of patience displayed in setting the hook. Many fish are lost when a fisherman tries to set the hook too early and yanks the minnow out of the fish's "gums."

Most game fish strike a minnow hard to stun him, then wait until struggles have ceased, turn the tasty tidbit around and swallow it head-first. Thus there is a definite pause between the time a minnow is seized and the time it disappears down the gullet. Big fish usually are more deliberate than small ones when consuming dinner. Is that because

they find the larger morsels more difficult to subdue, or because they are more experienced with the wiles of anglers? We don't know for sure. We do know that during the mouthing period the fish is nervous as a nit, and apt to release the bait at the slightest provocation. Here is where patience comes in. And plenty of it may be required.

The fisherman must quiet his pounding heart, Mercury advises, release any drag from the reel, and allow that lunker to mouth the minnow undisturbed. This may take 10 seconds or it may take several minutes, but sooner or later the bass will take off again, probably in search of another meal. And that instant is the time to set the hook.
