SNAKES

While most snakes in the United States are not poisonous, approach all snakes with caution. Signs of a poisonous snake bite are: bleeding, however slight; burning pain (little or no pain with a coral snake bite); rapid swelling; nausea and vomiting (not always evident); rapid pulse; low blood pressure; and discoloration. The victim should rest quietly until a doctor arrives.

SESAME SWISS CHEESE LOAF 1 loaf

2 cups sifted enriched flour* 3 tablespoons sugar

4 teaspoons baking powder 11/2 teaspoons salt

1 cup shredded Swiss cheese

Sift together flour, sugar, baking powder and salt. Stir in cheese and sesame seed. Blend eggs, milk and oil. Add liquid all at once to flour mixture, stirring only until flour is moistened. Pour into greased 4½ x 8½-inch loaf pan. Bake in preheated 375° oven 65 to 70 minutes, or until done. Cool 15 minutes before removing from pan.
