CLUBS HOLD JOINT MEET

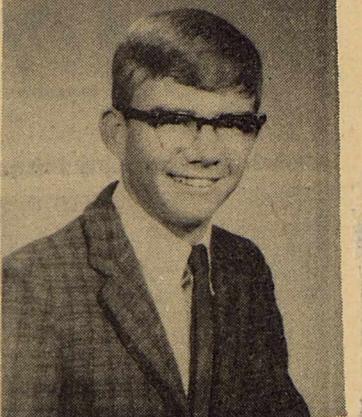

The next Lucky Clover meeting will be June 10 at 4:15 in the Club Room with a program given on manners.



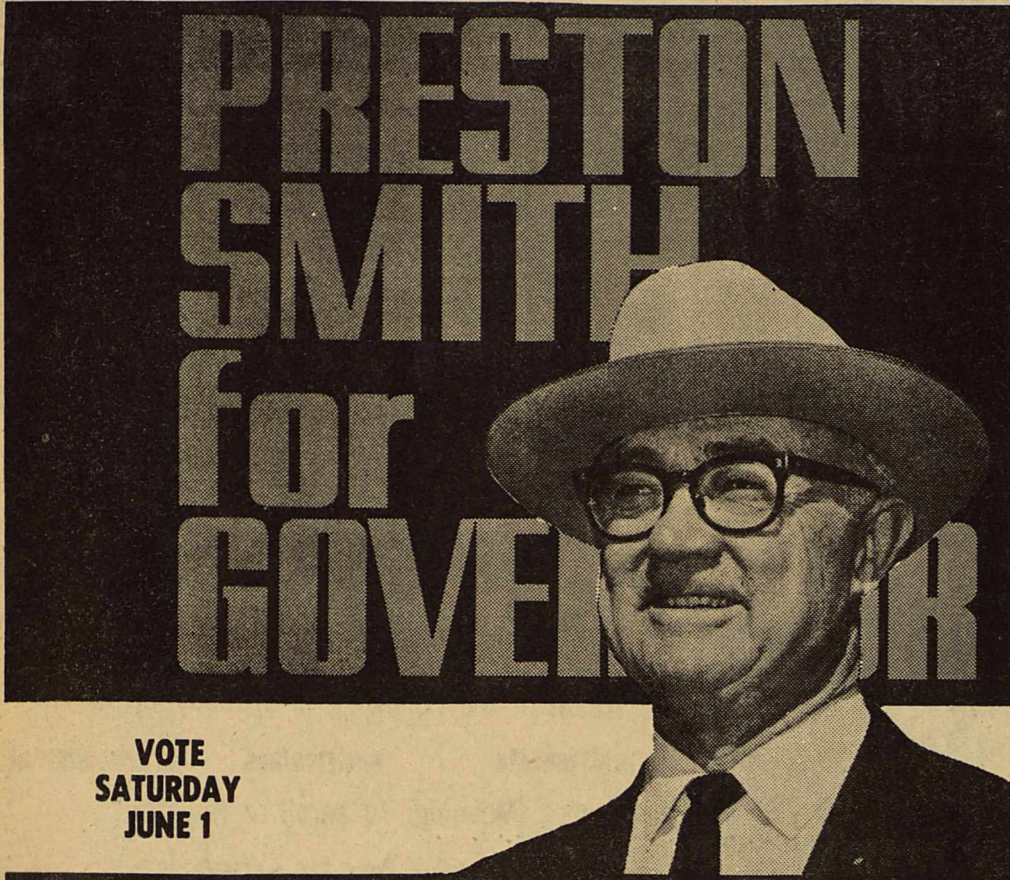
RECEIVES SCHOLARSHIP

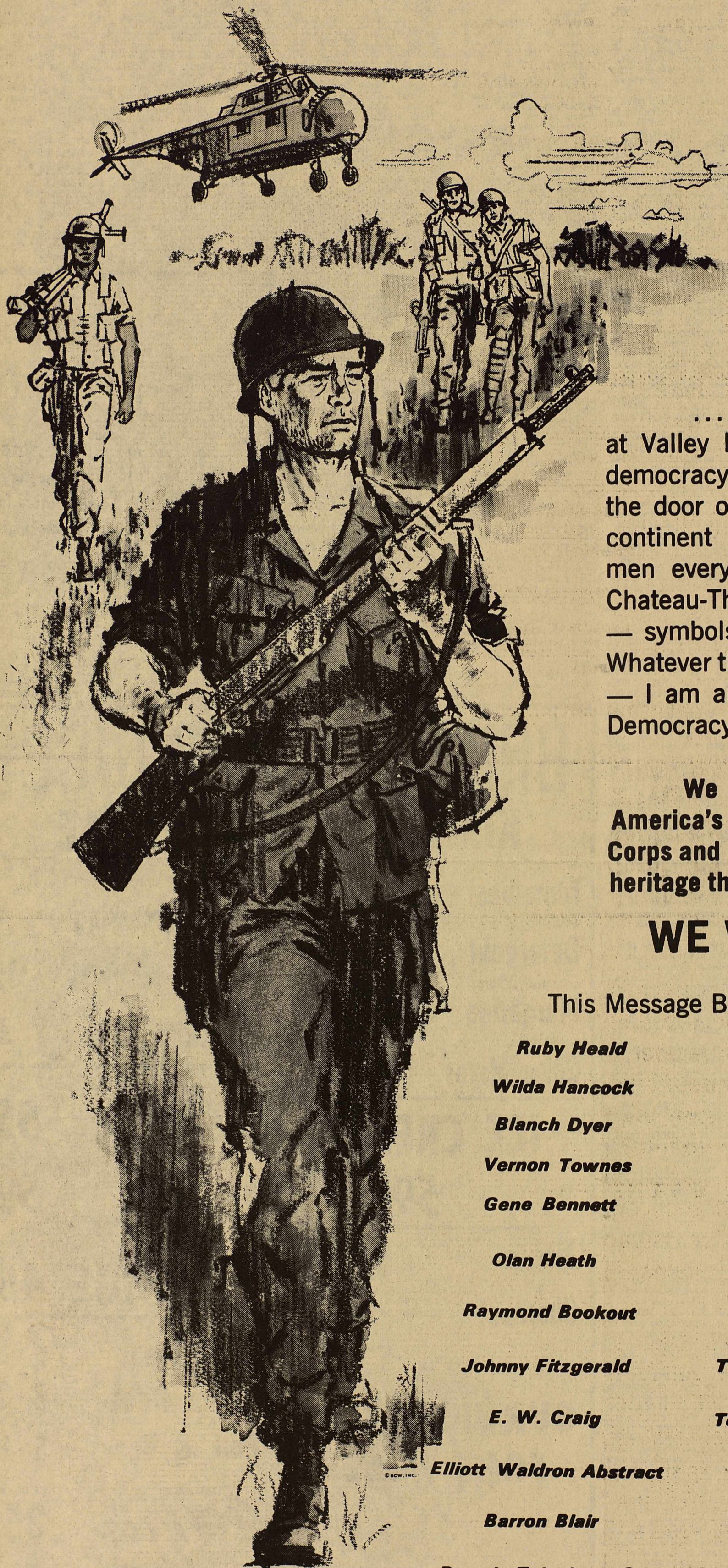
