



Texas Supreme Court To Hear Water Case

A writ of error has been set in Austin June 19th to determine the validity of the South Plains Water Conservation District No. 4, after attorneys for a Gaines County man appealed a Texas Court of Appeals decision Which upheld the District. The Water district composes parts of six South Plains Counties, including Andrews, Cochran, Dawson, Gaines, Lynn, and Yoa-

kum Counties. The Water District was ruled invalid when C. R. Shaddix, Seminole, and others, Went to court to challenge the validity of the District. An Appeals Court in El Paso set aside the ruling of the District Court and up-held the Water District. Shaddox's attorneys appealed

to the Supreme Court, The city of Seminole and Denver City rejected the District in a vote in April of 1966, While other residents in the counties gave their approval. When the District was formed. the cities of Denver City and Seminole were excluded and those other areas where the measure did not carry.

The first point is that a majority of voters cast rejecting votes in the original boundry. The second point is that the

Appellate Court erred when it ruled that the District could be formed to include only those areas in Which voters approved the Water District, and that the boundries do not coincide With the original underground reservoir which was defined by the Texas Water Rights Commission.

The District has been functioning since theEl Paso court ruled on its validity, and an office is maintained in Brownfield. Many farmers have utilized

depreciation information on water tables for their income tax since the Brownfield office was opened.

Much regional publicity has been given to the court battles which the proponents and opponents have waged.

ASCS Manager Reminds Farmers About Loans

W. M. Overton, office manager of the Yoakum County AS CS, reminds farmers that the final date for producers to obtain loans on 1967 crop cotton is May 31, 1968.

Measuring service is available this year, but requests must be filed and payment made on or before June 1. Cost is eight dollars per farm plus two dollars for each plot over one.

Crops and diverted acres must be farmed and cared for in a workmanlike manner to earn program benefits and history credit.

If four normal rows are idle this acreage may be classified as diverted acres for program purposes. Less than four normal rows do not qualify as diverted acres. Skips of less than four rows may be used in meeting the conserving base for the farm. Cotton planted two in and two out is counted 50 percent

will understand how a one row pattern is figured.

Another reminder is that diverted acres cannot be grazed beginning May I through September 30, 1968. No crops can be harvested from such acreage except the approved alternate crops such as castor beans, seasame, etc. Sovbeans used as cover crop on diverted acres shall be destroyed by plowing not later than Sept. 30, 1968,

County Gets \$61.5 Million From Oil and Gas Source

Oil and gas wells provide approximately \$61.5 million a year of Yoakum County's economic output, according to statistics released this week by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

Based on most recent U.S. Bureau of Mines production figures, the Association compilation showed that Yoakum County produced crude oil valued at \$58.6 million in 1966 and natural gas worth \$2.9 million.

Texas oil production in 19-67, responding to demands for more domestic crude as a re-

sult of the Israeli-Arab conflict, totaled 1,050,000,000 barrels, a statewide increase over 1966 of about 5 percent. Production last year varied widely among state Railroad Commission districts, however, ranging from 3.5 percent below 1966 to 15 percent a-

"Production from Yoakum County last summer helped prevent any oil scarcity for U. S. consumers at a time when one-third of the world's supply was cut off," said Corbin

J. Robertson, Houston, Association president. "We must keep in mind, however, that it may be difficult for Texas fields to sustain production in future emergencies if the discovery of new reserves continues to lag, due to lack of exploratory drilling."


The annual study showed that Yoakum County ranked 17th among Texas counties in total value of its production of some 19.7 million barrels of oil and 22.1 billion cubic feet of natural gas.

Texas oil men, according to Rinehart's yearbook, drilled 51 wells in the county risking some \$3.8 million. Twentyseven percent of them were dry holes, costing about \$1 million.

County landowners and others with mineral interests cashed royalty checks totaling about \$7.7 million during the year. Likewise, the county's flow of oil and gas generates \$2.9 million a year in production taxes paid by producers and royalty owners to the state treasury.

Reports from the Texas Employment Commission show some 613 persons directly employed by the oil and gas industry in the county, with an annual payroll of \$3.5 million.

Plants which convert crude oil and natural gas into useful products also add to the value of a county's output. The Oil and Gas Journal lists two gas processing plants, with a total capacity of 201 million cubic feet a day for the county.
