

Vacation minded and don't know where to go? Two new Texas Travel Trails folders were released recently by the Texas Highway Department and will serve as guides and detail numerous points of interest along the Texas Mountain Trail in far West Texas, and the Texas Forest Trail in deep East Texas.

The new Statewide system of trails were started last January. Each county erected special Travel Trail signs along the 10 official trail routes. The Mountain folder will guide you through the tallest region of Texas, Where some 90 peaks thrust above a mile high. If you follow this route you will visit Big Bend National Park, the scenic El Camino del Rio from Big Bend to Presidio, and through the cities of Van Horn, Fort Davis, Marfa, Alpine and El P-

If you are more fond of forests take the Forest Trail and travel through the Piney Woods of Texas. On this route you will visit popular areas such as Lake O' the Pines, Caddo Lake

and Sam Rayburn Reservoir. These folders are available from the Texas Highway Department tourist bureaus and district offices and at chambers of commerce along the

In recent Commissioners Court action the Yoakum County Hospital will raise private room rates July 1 and will boost nurses salaries July 31. The Court approved the action

Hospital Administrator Roy Wheeler reported that the daily rate for four private rooms in the hospital will be increased from \$23 to \$28; that the daily rate for 17 rooms will increase from \$23 to \$25; and that 21 rooms will be increased from \$21 to \$23.

An average of about \$50 per month increase in salary will be received by registered nurses and licensed vocational nurses. The beginning salary for RNs has averaged \$450 and LVNs has averaged \$250. Beginning salaries will now average \$500 and \$300, respectively. The wage hike will affect approximately 16 employ-

The room rate increase is the first for Yoakum County Hospital since December of

1966, Wheeler pointed out. Persons hospitalized in the hospital when the new rates go into effect July 1 will not be affected by the increase. It will be effective for those entering the hospital on or after that



Grand Jury Indicts Two

The Yoakum County Grand Jury, meeting last week, returned two indictments to District Judge M. C. Ledbetter of the 121st District Court here.

True bills were handed down against Lewis W. Driver and Charlie Sims.

The indictment against Driver, former manager of Radio Station KKAL in Denver City. alleged embezzlement. The indictment against Sims, an oil field worker, alleged theft of oil field pump equipment.

The true bill against Driver alleged that he, on or about Jan. 22, 1968 "did fraudulently embezzle, misapply and convert to his own use without the consent of Calvin Mc-Adams' a check described as a \$110.40 instrument signed by Southwestern Public Service Co. and made out to KKAL Radio Station. The allegation said that the check was endorsed with the station name, KKAL, with Driver's name under the station name.

Sims' indictment was for the alleged theft of oil field pumping equipment valued at approximately \$1,500. The theft was reported to have occurred from a Texaco, Inc., lease just west of Denver City on or about Jan. 1, 1968. Sims was arrested by Sheriff Olan Heath Jan. 4 in Seminole.

The indictments against the two men were signed by Grand Jury Foreman C. G. Gayle with a \$1,000 bail being setfor each to approve the recent tax reduction proposed recently for Yoakum County property owners. This reduction in rate and basis will mean a savings of more than 20 percent to the average taxpayer.

The current basis of assessment will be reduced from 16 percent of true property value to 13 percent and the current tax rate will be reduced from 80 cents per \$100 of assessment to 77 cents per \$100 assessed value.

Not included in the reduction is the county's 30 cents per \$100 of assessed value from the farm-market lateral road special tax. This rate will remain the same, making a total rate of one dollar and seven cents.

Taxpayers can begin to pay the new rate in October if they desire, so the discount can be obtained as in the past. The tax reduction will be used in effect of the 1969 which will be set up in July or August of this vear.

County Judge Gene Bennett reported that 25 representatives of major companies met with the Board Monday. He stated that everyone was very satisfied and most cooperative in the reduction matter.

Mr. Gus Butterowe and his staff of county evaluation engineers headed the Monday meet. They are with the Thomas Y. Pickett Co., the firm holding Yoakum County's evaluation contract.

Judge Bennett also related the increased valuation, caused by oil field waterflooding and secondary recovery operations, projected mineral reserves and increased oil allowables, prompted the tax

reduction. During the past year, figures showed the real value of properties in Yoakum County rose from \$443,750,000 to \$621,846,153. The revenue figures are based upon collections reflecting prompt payment discounts and delinquencies. Because of the increase in real values, the county can reduce the basis of assessment and tax rate and still

gain additional revenues. Judge Bennett added further that on a \$10,000 home the reduction would amount to \$2.79 from a current \$12.80 per year to \$10.01. These figures exclude the 30 cent special road tax levv.

The current 16 percent basis and 80 cents per \$100 of assessed value provides a tax assessment of \$71,000,000 which produces \$556,596 in revenues. The 13 percent basis and 77 cent rate will provide a tax assessment roll of \$80 --840,000 and yield \$610,080 in revenues, making an increase of \$53,364.

Joyce Warren Attends Girls State

Joyce Lynn Warren, a Citizen of the American Legion Auxiliary Bluebonnet Girls State in Austin at Saint Edwards University, was elected as Councilman, Place 4, Sock City, in the recent election. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Warren and was sponsored to Girls State by the local American Legion Auxiliary. Non-partisan and nonpolitical, the purpose of the Girls State program is to provide citizenship training for girls of high school age, to afford them an opportunity to live together as a self-governing group and to inform them of the duties, privileges, rights and responsibilities which they will assume when they become adults. They learn the problems of government by performing the same duties as real office holders in the everyday world.

The 1968 session of the American Legion Auxiliary Bluebonnet Girls State has grown from an experimental conference of 94 girls, held at Baylor University in 1941, to become the largest single extracurricular educational program for high school girls in Texas. This year, 420 girls are in attendance making a total of more than 8,000 girls in Texas who have participated in this top-level citizenship program. Citizens are elected at local levels principally on a basis of charac-

ter and leadership from students who have just completed their junior year in high school. Since 1963, two Citizens from Mexico City have attended the session each year.
