

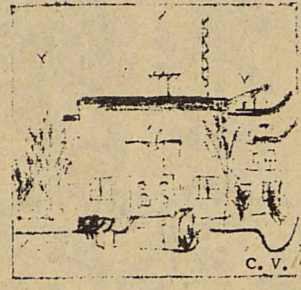

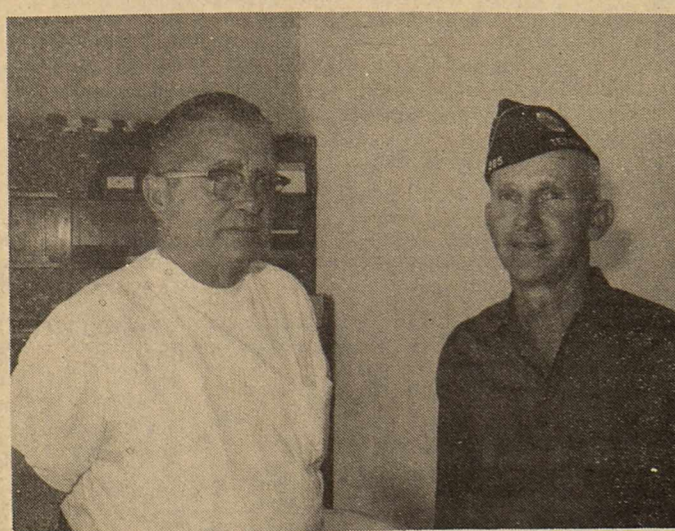

In special session Monday, June 24, the Yoakum County Commissioners Court approved to recommend to the Texas Liquor Control Board in Austin to turn down application for a liquor license regarding a private club to be located in Bronco.

The recommendation read "WHEREAS, Hershel A. (Anita) Field, Ralph S. Henson and Hugh Holmes have filed an application with the Texas Liquor Control Board for an original permit or license for a private club permit for a business to be located in Yoakum County by the name of "The Loner Club" with the exact location of this club to be the third building on the east side of FM # 769, and Highway 380 and, WHEREAS, the club above described is proposed to be located at Bronco, which is a rural community in Yoakum County, Said Bronco community does not consist of any municipal form of government but constitutes only a rural community settlement and has no law enforcement agency of any nature, and said community is located approximately eighteen miles from Plains, the county seat which is the nearest incorporated town and which is located the only law enforcement officers,

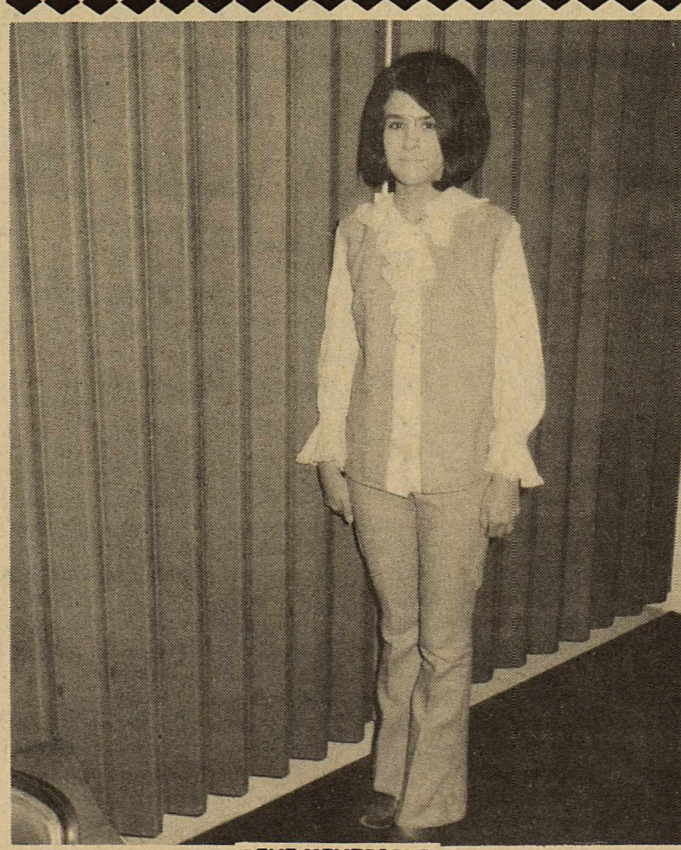
WHEREAS, the establishment of a private club at the community of Bronco would create an additional and needless burden upon law enforcement officers in Yoakum County and unless additional expenses for law enforcement are incurred by Yoakum County there could not be proper police supervision of such private club; NOW THEREFORE, the Commissioners Court of Yoakum County, Texas does hereby recommend to the Texas Liquor Control Board that the application for a private club permit be disapproved and that no private club permit be issued." The above recommendation was duly signed and approved

Aug. 15 Final Date to Certify at ASCS Office

It is again the producer's responsibility to certify to his crop uses and land uses states W. M. Overton, office manager of the Yoakum County ASCS Office. The final date for certifying is August 15, 1968. Some farm operators have paid the estimated cost for measuring service and the requested crop and land use measurements will be made by ASCS employees. However, they must certify to their acreage by August 15, 1968, also. "For the past two years, farmers have been measuring and reporting their crop and land use acreages to the office and generally speaking, we feel they have done an excellent job," Overton added. However, some few were found to be out of compliance to such an extent that they lost all or part of their payments. Therefore, all farmers are urged to carefully measure their crops. It is recommended that after they have made their measurements with a tape, chain, etc., they should double check their measurements. Counting rows would be a good double check where applicable. Operators are urged to turn in their measured acres at their earliest convenience; however, they must keep in mind that adjustments cannot be made after certifying to their measured acres and they have until August 15 to make the report. Much has been said about under reporting or over reporting the crops and land uses. Producers can lose payments by being too far out of line either way. Therefore, operators should do a good job of measuring and reporting their land uses and crops. Producers wanting information Continued On Page Two

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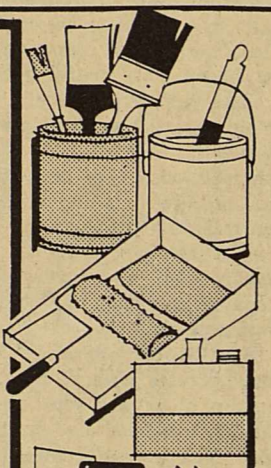

ion in the county office in regard to aerial map measurements etc., should feel free to call at the office any time.

Farmers that have peanuts planted should measure the acreage and report the measurements to the county office not later than August 15, 1968, also.

According to reports from farmers over the county, it appears that most all of the crops, cotton and feed grains, have been planted. Some have replanted one or more times. Again, attention is called to all farmers that they are not required to replant cotton after June 15 or feed grain after July 1 to receive program payments and history credit if the proper documents are signed by the farmers and approved by the County committee. Farmers having lost their cotton or feed grain crop by natural disaster too late to replant by the above cotton and feed grain replant dates and do not want to replant should file the proper documents with the ASCS office before replanting to another crop. Farmers planting their cotton land in feed grains should remember that losing their cotton does not change their feed grain base or feed grain permitted acres. Producers that have not turned in their allotment or base crop production records for 1965, 66 and 67, are again

reminded that the county committee will soon be setting up projected yields for 1969 and the production records will help them to set a better yield for all farms in the county.

LOAN AND PRICE SUPPORT RATES ANNOUNCED BY LOCAL ASCS OFFICE.

According to information received by the local ASCS office the loan and price support rate for 1968 crop grain sorghum has been announced and will be \$1.63 per hundred weight for Yoakum and other nearby Texas Counties. This compares with a \$1.59 for the 1967 loan and price support program. The rate schedule is for grain sorghum grading No. 2 and better except for mixed grain. The price support will be available to grain sorghum producers participating in the 1968 feed grain program. The price support payment of 53 cents per hundred weight will be made to producers participating in the program

and is based on the projected yield and planted acres, not to exceed 50 percent of the feed grain base.

Loans will be available at the local ASCS office and producers will be notified at harvest time the final date for obtaining loans, maturity date and other information.

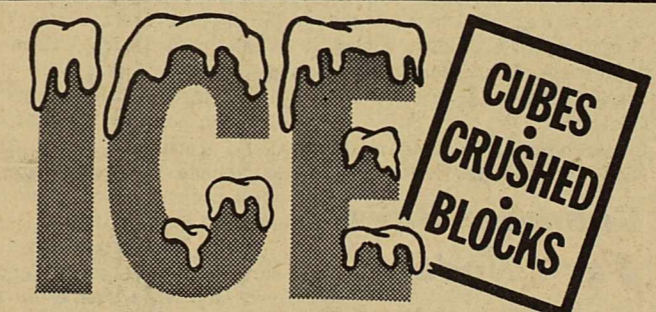

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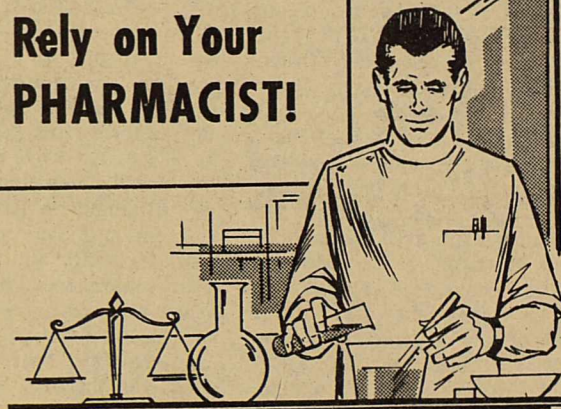

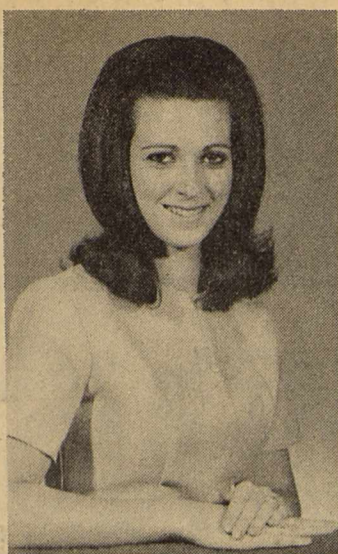

YOAKUM SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Every farm has some acres that are not allotted, are diverted, or for some reason are not planted to regular crops such as cotton or grain sorghum. These are the acres that we sometime forget until it is too late and they are the ones that start blowing first in the spring.

It is easy to plant a crop that will not only hold the soil but will add needed organic matter and give good protection. There are several good crops that will get the job done: sorghum, small grain such as rye, wheat, oats, and barley are good.

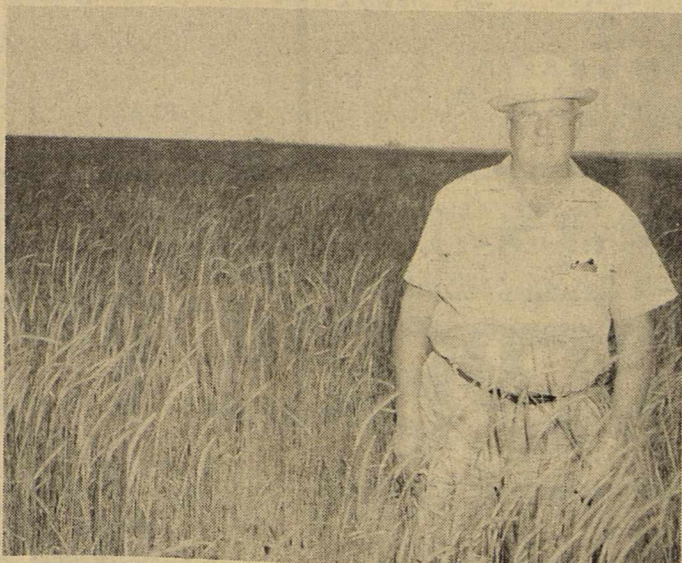
Harry Vetch is a good soil protector and will add organic matter and nitrogen; however, it has not been used very much in our area. This last year Lee Roy McCravey had about 10 acres that was very pretty to look at and it made a good cover and lots of pasture.

Cowpeas are used by lots of people as a soil builder. When properly inoculated they do add nitrogen to the soil in the amount of 20 pounds per acre or about \$2.00 worth. If the cowpeas make good growth, they will add some organic matter to the soil but not nearly so much as one of the sorghums. By planting cowpeas we almost insure that the land will have to be plowed and this of course means only clods for protection against wind erosion.

The crop we plant NOW will mean a lot in the kind of protection we get next spring when the wind blows. The added nitrogen may be pretty costly, and in fact there may not be much of it left after the land blows for two or three months.

To the liquid, add 3 1/2 tablespoons of sugar, 3 1/2 tablespoons vinegar and a few cloves; boil down to about half. Add 2 tablespoons of butter and the cooked beans, then reheat. Serves four.

Sudie Thompson CHDA Says...

Green beans have a snappy way of telling you when they are fresh.

Pick up a pod and snap it. If it snaps cleanly, it's a fresh bean. That's the quick and easy test for freshness. Easy to prepare, they rate tops as a summer vegetable.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture points out. And green beans will soon be in abundance from our gardens, fields and markets.

Steaming snap beans is one of the most appetizing ways to prepare them. Since they are mostly water, they provide their own moisture. Salt the beans, coat them with a bit of fat, and cook them slowly in a heavy skillet until they are tender. Top with melted butter and they are ready to serve.

If you want to be a little

fancy, snap beans can be prepared with a little more style. Here are a couple of recipes you may like.

Green Beans a la Sour Cream
1 cup of mushrooms
2 tablespoons butter
2 cups cooked green beans
1/3 cup sour cream
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons chopped parsley
Sauté mushrooms in butter. Add beans, sour cream, and salt. Heat and sprinkle with parsley. Serves four.
Green Bean Succotash
1 lb. green beans, cut in 1-inch pieces
1 1/2 cups diced, peeled tomatoes
4 tablespoons minced onion
3 tablespoons salad oil
1 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 cups cooked or canned wholegrain corn
Combine all ingredients

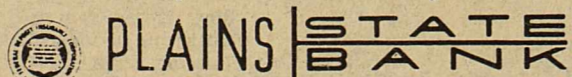
