

In special session Monday, June 24, the Yoakum County Commissioners Cout approved to recommend to the Texas Liquor Control Board in Austin to turn down application for a liquor license regarding a private club to be located in Bronco.

The recommendation read WHEREAS, Hershel A.

(Anita) Field, Ralph S. Henson and Hugh Holmes have filed an application with the Texas Liquor Control Board for an original permit or license for a private club permit for a business to be located in Yoakum County by the name of "The Loner Club" with the exact location of this club to be the third building on the east side of FM # 769, and Highway 380 and,

WHEREAS, the club above described is proposed to be located at Bronco, which is a rural community i n Yoakum County. Said Bronco community does not consist of any municipal form of government but constitutes only a rural community settlement and has no law enforcement agency of any nature, and said community is located approximately eighteen miles from Plains, the county seat which is the nearest incorporated town and which is located the only law enforcment officers.

WHEREAS, the establishment of a private club at the community of Bronco would create an additional and needless burden upon law enforcement officers in Yoakum County and unless additional expenses for law enforcement are incurred by Yoakum County there could not be proper police supervision of such private club;

NOW THEREFORE, the Commissioners Court of Yoakum County, Texas does hereby recommend to the Texas Liquor Control Board that the application for a private club permit be disapproved and that no private club permit be is-

The above recommendation was duly signed and approved

by the Court.

Sheriff Olan Heath, being in close contact with the Lubbock office of the Liquor Board, informed the Record that such an application has not been acted upon in any way as

of late Tuesday. In the later part of April, application for a private club registration permit was filed for a corporation by the name of Fields and Marney, Inc., with the address of Box 43, Bronco, Texas.

This application was refused a permit. County Attorney Vernon Townes contacted the Board on such application that a public hearing be held before the permit was issued. As the permit was not allowed, the hearing was not called.

In other business during the special session, the Court approved to accept an order on El Paso Natural Gas. Co. waste water. This will provide the county free use, for irrigation purposes only, of such quantities of cooling blowdown water as may from time to time be available at the Wasson Plant and Plains Compres-

sor Plant. The court accepted the terms and conditions of the agreement and will obtain from the Texas Water Pollution Control Board such waste water disposal permit as necessary tok

comply with the agreement. A bid of \$365 was accepted from C & C Fence Co. of Lubbock for a fence provided that the fence be completely installed by July 10 on the south side of the local show ba-

Other business included setting a tax rate for 77 cents and setting July 4 and 5 as holidays for county officials and employees.



Again, attention is called to all farmers that they are not required to replant cotton after June 15 or feed grain after July 1 to receive program paymens and history credit if the proper documents are signed by the farmers and approved by the County committee. Farmers having lost their cotton or feed grain crop by natural disaster too late to replant by the above cotton and feed grain replant dates and do not want to replant should file the proper documents With the ASCS office before replanting to another crop. Farmers planting their cotton land in feed grains should remember that losing their cotton does not change their feed grain base or

feed grain permitted acres. Producers that have not turned in their allotment or base crop production records for 1965,66 and 67, are again







YOAKUM SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICT

by C. Murrell Thompson

Every farm has some acres that are not alloted, are diverted, or for some reason are not planted to regular crops such as cotton or grain sorghum. These are the acres that we sometime forget until it is too late and they are the ones that start blowing first in the spring.

It is easy to plant a crop that will not only hold the soil but will add needed organic matter and give good protection. There are several good crops that will get the job done: sorghum, small grain such as rye, wheat, oats, and barley are good.

Harry Vetch is a good soil protector and will add organic matter and nitrogen; however, it has not been used very much in our area. This last year Lee Roy McCravey had about 10 acres that was very pretty to look at and it made a good cover and lots of pasture.

Cowpeas are used by lots of people as a soil builder. When properly inocculated they do add nitrogen to the soil in the amount of 20 pounds per acre or about \$2.00 worth. If the cowpeas make good growth, they will add some organic matter to the soil but not nearly so much as one of the sorghums. By planting cowpeas we almost insure that the land will have to be plowed and this of course means only clods for protection against wind erosion.

The crop we plant NOW wi-Il mean a lot in the kind of protection we get next spring when the wind blows. The added nitrogen may be pretty costly, and in fact there may not be much of it left after the land blows for two or three months.

The theme of the meeting stressed the volunteer's role in organizing and explaining local cancer control programs. More emphasis was placed on programs of public education and service to community cancer patients.



Awards for outstanding programs of public education and successful fund-raising Crusades were presented at the luncheon along with three directors from District Two to the State Board.



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
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
