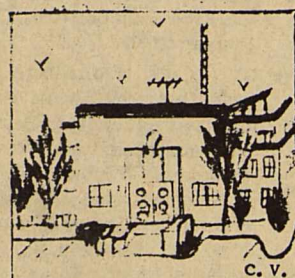

# 15TH ANNUAL OLD SETTLERS CONCLAVE AND RODEO TODAY

The 15th Annual Old Settlers Reunion and Rodeo will get underway today at 5:30 p.m. with the parade leaving Anderson Grain Company and proceeding through town to Pic and Pay Grocery.

Rodeo fans will see the big show get underway at 8:30 p.m. at each night's performance. At press time, approximately 70 entries had been received for various events.

It has been reported that the pens and arena are in good shape and ready. Stock for this year's show is being furnished by Rodeo Corporation of Crosbyton.

Queen candidates are still selling tickets and the results will be tabulated Saturday after the Old Settlers Reunion and Barbecue in the park.

Seeking the 1968 queen's title are Lynne Fitzgerald, Joetta Warren and Rene Hendricks. Miss Peggy Rushing is the reigning queen. The public is urged to support their favorite candidates by buying tickets for the saddle to be given away Saturday night.

The books will be located at City Hall and will be moved to the arena each night during the rodeo performances.

The official 1968 saddle and belt buckles are on display at Moore and Oden's Department Store on the west side of the square in Plains.

One of the most popular parts of the annual show is the noon barbecue held in Stanford Park in Plains. This is the time that most visitors are able to see old friends. Everyone is urged

to attend. Tickets for the meal will cost \$1.50 for adults and 75¢ for children and will entitle purchaser free admission to the Saturday night rodeo performance.

Women are again reminded to bring potato salad or cobbler for the Saturday barbecue.

Other entertainment to be on hand at the big show includes quadrille routines by the Plains Rough Riders. These youngsters have become well known in the area for their fine performances and have won several parade trophies.

The Bluecoats of Shamrock, a four piece band from Shamrock, will provide the public fine entertainment during the day Thursday. The group will be located at Curry's Drug and after the parade they will be playing at the Longbranch.

A new fence has been installed around the concrete slab at the livestock barn where a dance will be held nightly following rodeo performances.

Music for this year's dance will be provided by local talent, Smokey Harrelson and his Drifting Playboys. Admission to the dance will be \$1.50 per person per night.

Officials of the Rodeo Association extend an invitation to come out for the rodeo and barbecue.

A tax reduction for Plains Independent School District property owners has become a reality according to G. D. Kennedy, superintendent of Plains Schools.

The tax rate for 1968 has been set at \$1.85 per \$100 assessed valuation compared to \$1.90 for 1967. These reductions in the tax payer's bill will amount to approximately \$90,000.

The Plains School District will become debt free on December 15, 1968 at which time final payment on its last Bond Issue will be made. Under present law this will

The Plains School Board has reduced the basis of assessment from 24 per cent of true property value to 22 per cent.

The tax rate for 1968 has been set at \$1.85 per \$100 assessed valuation compared to \$1.90 for 1967. These reductions in the tax payer's bill will amount to approximately \$90,000.

The Plains School District will become debt free on December 15, 1968 at which time final payment on its last Bond Issue will be made. Under present law this will

automatically reduce the 1969 tax rate to a maximum of \$1.50 per \$100 assessed valuation.

Several items of school plant improvement are planned for the next two years. However, no bond issue will be required for the items. Projects planned are as follows:

Addition to Primary Building. Four classrooms are to be added to the northwest wing. One fourth grade section is now housed in the Junior High School Building. It is anticipated that an additional second grade section will be needed within the near future. Special Education teachers are needed and no rooms are presently available for them.

Remodel Vocational Agriculture Department and Improve Junior High School B-

Building. One classroom, a science laboratory, and two student rest rooms are to be added. At the present the Junior High School Building has no student lockers, only two student restrooms and a very small science laboratory.

Miss Long was named first alternate in the senior division.



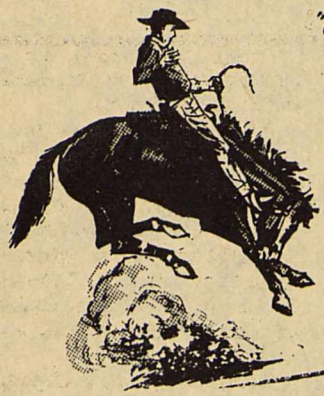
