



One of the most popular parts of the annual show is the noon barbecue held in Stanford Park in Plains. This is the time that most visitors are able to see

to attend. Tickets for the meal will cost \$1.50 for adults and 75¢ for children and will entitle purchaser free admission to the Saturday night rodeo performance.

Other entertainment to be on hand at the big show includes quadrille routines by the Plains Rough Riders. These youngsters have become well known in the area for their fine performances and have won several parade trophies.
