## State Liquor Board Denies Local Permit

For the second time since April the acting administrator of the Texas Liquor Control Board has denied the application for permit to operate a private club located at Bronco, according to County Attorney Vernon A. Townes.

In April, an application bearing the names of Anita Field, Coy Maroney, and Leroy Henson was filed for a private club but was refused because of incorrect information contained in the application and this application was refused.

In June, a second application for a permit to operate a private club, to be known as the Loner Club, was applied for by Anita Field, Ralph Henson and Hugh Holmes. This application was refused by the Board in Austin July 15.

A copy of the refusal order of the acting administrator reads as follows:

"BE IT REMEMBERED, that on the 15th day of July, A. D., 1968, there came on for consideration the application of the Loner Club for a private club registration permit for the premises located at starting at intersection of Highway 380 and FM 769 in Bronco, Texas, then South, the third building on the East side of FM769, City of Bronco, Co-

nty of Yoakum, State of Texas, by O.N. Humphreys, Jr., Acting Administrator of the Texas Liquor Control Board, and the Acting Administrator after having reviewed the application and the protests requesting refusal thereof, is of the opinion and has reasonable grounds to believe and finds the following to be true:

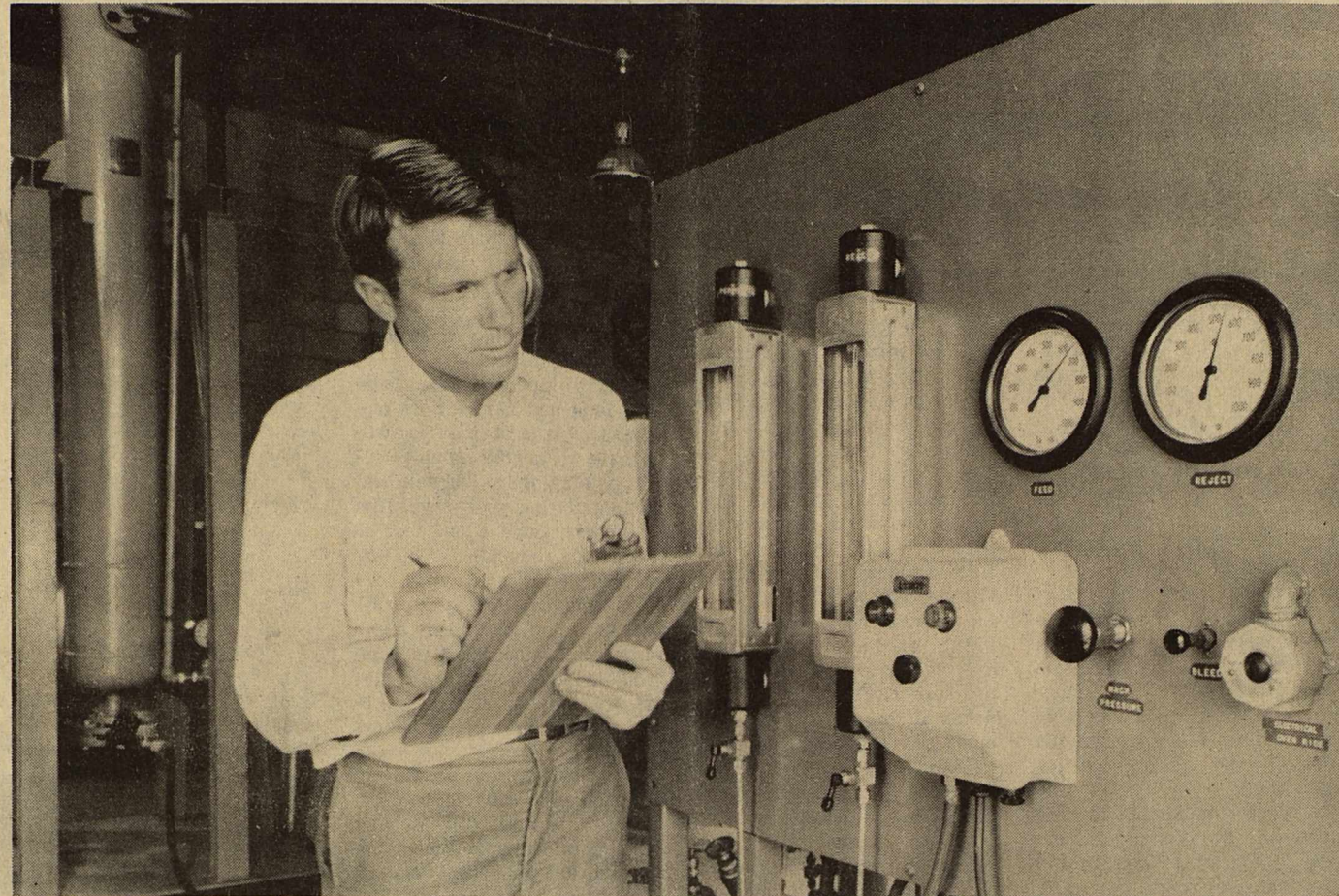
That the place and manner in which the applicant may conduct its business is of such a nature which, based on the general welfare, health, peace, morals and safety of the people and on the public sense of decency, warrants a refusal of the permit applied for.

The Acting Administrator finds, therefore, that the issuance of the permit applied for to the applicant would be in conflict with the requirements of the Texas Liquor Control Act and is of the opinion that the application should be refused and denied.

It is Therefore Ordered, Adjudged and Decreed by the Acting Administrator that the application herein described be and the same is hereby refused and denied."

The private club application was formally protested by county commissioners court along with County Attorney Townes.

# PLAINS NAMED FIRST CITY FOR DUPONT DESALTING PLANT

Availability of commercial size 'Permasep' permeators from pilot facilities and start of construction on a new \$5 million plant for their manufacture were announced today by the DuPont Company, Wilmington, Del. These devices utilize specially developed nylon hollow fibers for desalting brackish water and for other liquid and gas separations.

Permeator tests have been conducted in the city of Plains since November when DuPont selected the city as one of few for initial tests.

Climate and the brackish water supply plus the interest of citizens in a better water supply were main reasons for DuPont setting a test station here.

The tests have been at no cost to the city nor is it expected to be when Plains becomes the first city to house a 1,000,000 gallon per day municipal desalting pilot plant planned for this fall. This particular plant unit will furnish approximately half the city with soft water during the summer and the majority in cooler weather.

Locally, tests have been conducted on a very small scale with the permeator being housed at the local power plant. DuPont has announced plans for a larger unit but the plant can be easily expanded to meet future demand, according to Robert Wright, Jr., manager for 'Permasep' products in DuPont's organic chemicals department.

The development of the concept of the 'Permasep' permeator was first announced in late May of last year in Washington at the International Conference on Water for Peace. Since that time, DuPont has made significant strides in bringing the concept into commercial reality through research, development and field testing efforts.

Extensive research has resulted in the development of 'Permasep' permeator attractive for a variety of applications. Hollow fibers make possible maximum surface area per unit volume--as much as two acres per permeator. This large area combined with the low energy requirements typical of the reverse osmosis process provides minimum operating costs.

Other polymers are now being studied for improved performance characteristics and economics. Polymers which provide potable water from seawater have already been synthesized and commercial development is under way.

In addition to water desalination, DuPont has made test installations and has undertaken research for a large number of other applications. These include industrial chemical separations, pollutant removal and water reuse. Pollutant removal and water reuse tests have involved the use of industrial and municipal water streams as well as agricultural drain water.

A broad spectrum of industrial applications is under investigation with the sugar, paper, pharmaceutical and chemical industries.

Citizens wishing to examine the small test permeator at the power plant may do so and are invited to taste-test the treated water for comparison.

## Plains Scores 79 Points at Summer Tract Meet

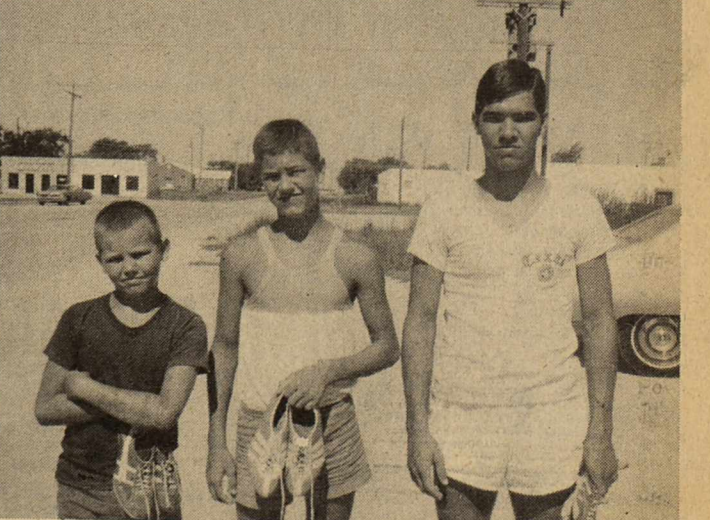
