

#### FHA Serves 237 People In Yoakum County

Credit programs of the U.S. Farmers Home Administration helped more than 237 people in Yoakum County improve their homes, family farms an communities during fiscal year 1968 Supervisor Homer P. Cole of the agency's county office in Plains said today. FHA loans in the county totaled \$741,770 in 1968.

It was reported that the Farmers Home Administration, which supplements all other credit available to rural people, has added \$1,536,270 to the county's resources with loans the past two years through a range of programs.

With the turnover of funds invested by borrower families, the agency's work is estimated to have a \$10,753,890 impact on the county's economy during 1967 and 1968.

Cole said that \$168,390 of the 1968 fiscal year lending total through his office was accounted for by Farmers Home Administration insurance of loans funded by private len-

An estimated 23 people benefited from loans for construction or improvement of five family homes in the county during the year. Housing credit has grown from no activity in 1960 to \$72,700 loaned in 1968. Loans made for housing credit since July 1966 have totaled \$119,940.

Family farmers who lacked other sources of credit turned to Farmers Home Administration for \$100,500 in loans to secure farm ownership and improve their farms and \$263,540 in loans for operating purposes during 1968.

Many of the 18 farm families served by FHA might have been forced off the land except for this last resort sources of financing.



mits encephalitis to man. It usually bites at dusk, or just before sunset. If necessary to be out in the open for any length of time, be sure to use a good mosquito repellant or spray officials warn.

Citizens are urged to repair all screens, spray shubbery and around the house with a residual spray which can be bought at local stores. Other precautions include searching premises for standing water where mosquitoes might breed and drain and treat all places found. Keep cesspool and septic tank vents covered with screen wire to prevent entrance of mosquitoes.

Officials also stated that a tablespoon of Pine's Oil in the air conditioner once a Week will prevent mosquitoes breeding there.

Political pollsters have recently predicted that Wallace could force a compromise with both of the major parties, because of the surprising strength he has shown. While he was originally credited with having little chance to carry more than three states, he is considered to have a good chance to carry 10 states, including Texas and Indheavily infesting numerous grain sorghum fields in Yoakum County . However, the overall simuation does not warrant control measures at this time reports Leo White, county agricultural agent.

In fact, spraying at this time would also drastically reduce the populations of beneficial insects which are beginning to build up, he points out. These insects should be given a chance to work in reducing the number of greenbugs.

White adds that if control measures are taken, more than one spraying may be needed since reinfestation is highly possible due to the buildup of greenbugs throughout the area. However, this buildup should slow down during the hot weather which the area is presently experiencing. The rapid greenbug development over the past few weeks has been a result of relatively cool weather which is conducive to greenbug reproduction.

Although greenbug counts are running as high as 2,000 to 4,000 per leaf in many sorghum fields, the greenbugs are mainly on the bottom lea-

ing little damage, says the agent. On grain sorghum Which is in the pre-boot stage or later, research has shown that the insects do not cause enough damage to justify control measures.

White advises, however, to keep a close Watch on their fields and evaluate their particular situation. If the greenbugs move to the upper leaves and begin causing considerabl3 damage to these leaves, control measures may be neces-

Small grain sorghum, that which is less than about 14 inches high, may be severely damaged by heavy infestation of greenbugs, emphasizes White. Control measures may be necessary on such small sor-

Insecticides available for controlling greenbugs include phosdrin, endrin and parathion. Extreme care should be exercised in applying these materials, cautions the agent. The waiting period from the time of application until harvest is as follows: phosdin, 3 days; endrin, 45 days; and parathion, 12 days.

## Rep. Mahon Explains Farm Payment Changes

The following news release was issued this week by U. S. Rep. George Mahon, Chairman of the House Ap-

propriations Committee: The House of Representatives last week approved a one-year extension of the present farm program. The major controversy on the bill mit government payments to producers.

A report from Representative George Mahon advises that he spoke against and voted against the limitation of payments, but supported final passage of the bill in order to give the Senate-House Conferees a chance to work out an acceptable bill.

The Senate, on July 20, had passed a four-year bill without limitations. Mahon said that by sending the House bill to conference with the Se-

nate, he felt most hopeful that a one-year extension Without limitations would be worked out in conference and later submitted to the House and Senate for final approval. He advised that if the farm law extension carried With it a limitation on payments, he was convinced that the bill would be enacted into law.

The farm program expires at the end of next year and it is generally felt that a oneyear excension would assist farmers with their long-range planning and at the same time give the next Congress more time to work its will on improved farm legislation. Mahon stated that he felt

reasonably confident that a one - year extension without payment limitations would be approved before Congress adjourns this year.
