


Reg Martin and Lewis Waters were re-elected to the board of directors during the business meeting.

TOMMY BEAL INJURED IN TRUCK-MOTORCYCLE ACC

son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Beal, received serious leg fractures Tuesday afternoon when he was involved in a motorcycle and truck accident three miles east of Plains on the Brownfield Highway.

Tommy was attempting to pass the large van truck when the accident occurred. Sheriff Olan Heath reported that a wind current was the probable cause of the accident.

Sheriff Heath reported that the truck driver and Tommy were both going east and there was plenty of room for passing. It was thought the current sucked the motorcycle under the truck with the rear wheels running over the youth's left leg crushing the ankle and causing other fractures. The motorcycle was

determined a total loss. Sheriff Heath also reported that the wearing of a crash helmet' probably saved the boy's life. The impact with the pavement was hard enough to break the straps off and heavily damage the helmet. The driver of the truck,
